For the last three months, and without warning, the parish has received thousands of tons of excavated spoil which has been used to 're-surface farm tracks'.

Many people, particularly walkers using the footpaths, have been alarmed by the noise, pollution and potential danger of the 16-tonne lorries used for the operation.

Sadly extensive work has been carried out in Mead Lane and Common Lane, the last of the old, unspoilt green lanes in the parish.
