NO RULES FOR ROAD DIGGERS

We may count ourselves lucky to live on the Icknield Way; but unfortunately today's giant telecom companies also find the A417 the best route for laying fibre-optic cables along 'to get up the country'. Last year Torch and City of London Telecoms shared a trench (September Upton News) now Scottish and Southern Energy are laying more ducts along our main road and churning up the verges.

No one can stop them. But as Mark Francis, Highways Inspector at the OCC Highways office at Drayton explained 'We monitor and and oversee the work. He is having a busy time: only the other day Scottish Energy and Cable and Wireless were both digging at once at the top of Steventon Hill.

Maybe that is why he hadn't heard that on 26 January the contractors, Murphy's, drilled through a main BT cable crossing into Prospect Road outside the George & Dragon — an accident that deprived 100 Upton households of their telephones for nearly a week.

Apparently BT hadn't provided the 'A55s' that indicate 'where plant is in the ground'. Also, Murphy's say, below the road is getting congested.

The only condition laid down is that the contractors must leave the carriageways and verges as they found them. If asked Mr Francis prefers the verges to be dug, because resown grass soon grows.

As for BT, when the Upton lines were restored a man in High Wycombe telephoned each number to apologise. It was a major fault and took time to repair because a weekend intervened. Residential customers will be compensated for being more than two working days offline. Luckily, at the pub Chris and Sue Linney, who 'lost a fortune' in bookings, are insured against disruption to business after only twelve hours.
