

# SEPTEMBER 2001 Vol.2 No.16 CLOSURE OF THE A417

As everyone must know by now, the County Council are about to embark on a major work programme to resurface and improve the drainage of the A417 between and including Upton and Blewbury. Work will start on 17 September and is expected to take about eight weeks. For most of the time, traffic will pass through and be controlled by traffic lights.

However, it will be necessary to close the road completely for a period of three weeks, expected to be from 4 to 24 October. This is necessary because the machinery used is too wide and the road too narrow to allow even single track traffic at certain points without contravening Health and Safety Regulations. While the road is closed, emergency services and buses will be allowed to pass through.

The County officers and contractors have made it clear that access will be possible, as far as is practicable having regard to the progress of works, to land and premises that can only be reached by the closed road. In practice, I understand it is likely that access to a particular point may be problematic for a day or two when work is being carried on outside the property. Assurance has been given that everything

Who's for a games wall?

Plans to provide the recreation ground with better sport facilities for young people (and dads) are moving forward. Having taken advice and decided what to aim for, the parish council now needs to consult with villagers. If we are to raise funds of around £25,000 — from Sport England, other charities and benefactors and the Vale of the White Horse — it is vital to have feedback from people who welcome the idea of a games wall and all-weather hard surface, as suggested on this map. Without this kind of positive support the lottery money from Sport England, who say they would bear half the cost, will not be forthcoming.


Both the 'slimline' brick wall and hard court would be marked out for many sports: basketball, five-a-side football, tennis, roller blading/hockey. The hard surface could also be used for skateboarding, and soccer goal-scoring and cricket could be practised on the grass on the other side of the wall, which has goal-posts and a cricket wicket marked out. We will soon be lobbying all secondary and top primary school children in the village with a questionnaire. ## Parking correctly

The Parish Council has been asked to request all villagers to kindly respect neighbours and other road users when parking their cars.

Please park in driveways, not on the roadside. If this is not possible, please park outside your own and not a neighbouring property, remembering to leave access to/from driveways. The narrow lanes are easily obstructed — please remember to leave sufficient space for large vehicles to get by. Emergency and farm traffic and fuel and refuse lorries should be able to pass along all roads at all times.

#### **Insulation Grants**

The District Council has for many years offered grants to improve the insulation of houses in the Vale. This not only makes homes warmer, it reduces fuel bills and energy use. The grant is open to people aged over 70 and/or in receipt of an incomerelated benefit. Applicants must have lived in their properties for a minimum of three years, although this does not apply to people renting. ## Mrs Marjorie Baker 1909-2001

Hazel Cornish writes: Mum was an extremely well balanced person. Her placid nature helped her to adjust to many changes of abode — she never really had a home until she married as she was fostered. Life in service at the age of 14 was more regulated and luckily she had good employers.

She married in 1934 and became a full-time housewife. In spite of having to be very thrifty she was perfectly happy and my brother and I grew up in a house where there were no cross words. They moved to Upton in 1967 and mum was in her element, quickly becoming absorbed in village life and revelling in it. The sudden death of father 18 years later was a bitter blow.

The broken hip in 1989 was the start of her hospital trips and over the last 10 years we all got used to hearing, 'I can manage', knowing very well she would have been better off accepting a little help.

So far I've obeyed her firm instructions. 'Don't cry when I pop off, I've had a jolly life so there is no need for tears'. However, I know they will fall soon. She has left a gap that cannot be filled, but also a legacy to live up to.

Ann Dendy writes: The village will remember Mrs Baker, Mrs B or Madge for her devotion to St. Mary's church. For many years she was solely responsible for cleaning it. She also acted as sacristan, finding peace and tranquillity in her duties.

As she grew increasingly frail she loved to have visitors. Sometimes she would talk about her early life, graphically describing the various homes she lived in. I shall retain the memory of her walking across the fields with Don to attend Evensong at East Hagbourne. She had a great belief and longed to meet her Maker.
