

120 YEARS AGO

Friday August 31, 1883. Buried at Upton, 6.30pm George Hazell. He was a ganger over the permanent way Navvies and dropped dead in the Railway cutting on Wednesday morning. At the Coroner's Inquest it was elicited that he really belonged to Churchill near Calne, but had deserted his wife and children three years ago. He was passing under the name of George Brown and was about to marry a young woman of Cold Ash! He resided at Chilton but was buried at Upton, as the inquest was held at the George & Dragon where the body was taken. His wife came from Churchill and recognised the body but would not follow the funeral. I proceeded from the churchyard gate straight to the grave and the corpse was not taken into the church. (Excerpt from the diary of Reverend Richard Hooper, Upton's first vicar.)
