# **MULTI-USE GAMES**

This is just to keep everyone in the village posted about the progress on our MUGA.

The position and type of facility have now been agreed on and approved by the Parish Council. The multi-use games area will be situated parallel to the football pitch and between the pitch and the embankment. The wall section will be at approximately the half-way mark of the existing pitch and being end-on should not be any sort of an eyesore. The dimensions are 18m wide by 40m long. We have had to extend the length and width somewhat in order to allow for run-off areas which are necessary. It's also been decided to have surround chain link fencing (rural green naturally!) in order to give the benefits of continuous play by holding the ball in rather than having to chase all over the recreation ground.

The area will accommodate 5-a-side football, basketball/netball (shooting boards at both ends) a practice wall for tennis and football and on the outer grass side of the wall a provision for cricket stumps.

Carol Hall made a presentation to Sport England during August and our request was looked on favourably. They will probably provide 50% of the funding, assuming that we can raise the other 50% from various other funds. There is currently a huge push by Government to revitalise existing facilities and more importantly create new ones. Whilst we're not after a massive development our project is just the kind they're looking to fund.

We're now submitting applications. There are several funds available and we shall ask as many as possible. Once this funding is in place we can go back to Sport England. They will hopefully give the balance and the project can begin. It is obviously going to take a few months but with any luck by next spring we should have at least a major part of the funding in position. At that point we will be asking for a working party to clear the trees back to the embankment to facilitate easy access around the new sports area.

## **DIDCOT'S MASTERPLAN**

For four days in September, Bryant Homes and Wimpey, the developers of the proposed 'Great Western Park' in Didcot, mounted an exhibition of their Masterplan for building 3200 homes on the west and south sides of the town. We attended the exhibition, our main concern being how Upton and other villages would be affected by traffic increase. Two quite encouraging points emerged:

- 1. Building work is to start from the north (ie from the A4130 opposite the power station) and may not reach the southern tip, at Park Road, for eight years.
- 2. The access to and from Park Road, we were assured, will be blocked by a'bus gate' and used only by the residents in the southernmost corner of the development. How many houses this will mean is not yet clear, nor whether there will be ways round the gate for the determined rat-runner. But it seems the developers are very much aware of the threat to villages such as the Hagbournes and the A417, which may be overwhelmed by extra traffic
