Upton Public Transport

Upton is well served by public transport. In particular the **Thames Travel bus 134** provides an hourly service to and from Didcot Broadway and railway station, on weekdays and Saturdays. The timetable can be obtained from the bus itself, the Tourist Information Centre in Lower Broadway, or Thames Travel on **01491 937988**.

In addition, the Vale DC runs a minibus service, **Ring-a-Ride**, for people unable to use ordinary buses, for instance those with permanent or temporary disabilities. The bus

can be used to take you to work, further education, shopping or visiting friends. It will pick you up from your home and return you later in the day. Travel tokens are accepted. To book, telephone **01865 744478** between 9.30 and 12.30 Monday—Friday. Note that it *cannot* take you to hospital appointments or day care; this is carried out by the Ambulance Service and Social Services.

The Oxfordshire Rural Community Council is anxious to discover *if there are any further needs for public transport in the village*. New facilities at the Post Office — so please make use of them

During the last few months there have been some major changes in the Post Office banking service. Customers who use Alliance & Leicester, Girobank, Barclays and Lloyds TSB can now get balances, deposit cheques and cash, and withdraw money with their card and pin number. This saves going to town to the bank. Some other simple bank accounts will allow you to withdraw cash with a card.

Another forward movement is that stamps can be bought with a debit card, also currency and travellers cheques (excluding sterling) can be bought with no commission.

With the government's new policy of stopping pension and allowance books, post office trade is

going down. It is therefore very important that business continues in other ways, as I can see Upton Post Office being closed in the future if we don't look busy.

The opening hours have not changed, but in case you don't know them they are: Monday 1-3 and 4-5pm, Tuesday 1-3 and 4-5pm, Wednesday 1-3pm, Thursday 1-3 and 4-5pm.

Our extra emergency supplies are cards, eggs, sweets and stationery. Finally, my holiday is coming up and the Post Office will be closed on 8, 9, 10, 11 September.
