Two more sad farewells...

NORMAN BONNER 1920 - 2003

On 28 October St Mary's packed 128 people in for a Thanksgiving Service for Norman — testimony to the number of activities he was involved in.

Born in Greenwich and educated in Dulwich, Norman was a civil engineer in the Ministry of Works before joining the RAF and serving in the Middle East. After the war and back in the Ministry, he was involved in planning AERE. In 1948 he met Edna got married and lived in Wantage.

But they spent 11 years in Risley before he was transferred to the staff of AERE. Then in the 60s, having bought a piece of land in Upton, they built their own home down Frog Alley. Edna recalls that when they move in, they were Upton residents no. 201 and 202. Their son Adam was born when Upton school was the centre of social life: should a child be absent. someone would be round to make sure all was well.

Together with Brian Arnold and Tony West, Norman helped to design and build the Village Hall.

His interest in lapidary led to designing and making jewellery. He qualified as a gem cutter in Germany and was invited to work there, but declined. During the 70s he and several other village craftspeople formed Upton Crafts, which traded above the shop.

He was cremated in Guernsey where he died, and his ashes were scattered on the Oxford golf course .Our sympathy goes to Edna, Adam and his wife Hannah, and their son, Nathan.

ROY BROWN 1927 - 2003

"Nobby" was born in Compton and worked outdoors all his life. He came to Upton in the early 60s he married Mabel Greenough, a widow with two sons, Howard and Kelvin. Two more sons, Stephen and Darren were born in the 60s. Nobby played football for Didcot Town, which saluted his memory by a minute's silence before last Saturday's match.

Once, when 10-year old Stephen was asked what his father did he said with great pride: 'my father is a fencer, a craftsman, not one of those cowboys!'.

The family writes:-

'Nobby Brown passed away suddenly on Wednesday 26 October at his home. He had been diagnosed with chronic lung disease earlier in the year, but he still lived life to the full and was regularly seen out and about in his truck. He had a big heart and always had time for everyone. He liked nothing more than a good singsong down his local pub, and will be remembered with great affection. It is a tremendous loss to all the family and we would like to thank everyone for all their cards and kind wishes. Nobby you will be greatly missed. God Bless you.'

The village echoes these words. Many will remember the jobs Nobby did — the patios laid and fences erected. Always a good job at a good price. His funeral was held at St Peter's Didcot. Our sympathy goes out to Stephen, Darren, Angie, Julie and Laurence, Stephanie, Katie, Adam, Jamie and Mia.
