A hearty welcome for a Parish Plan

On Saturday 29 November, despite the rain, as many as 30 villagers attended a meeting in the Village Hall. The purpose was to find out more about how residents can influence and shape the future of Upton using a Parish Plan. **David Fisher** from the Oxfordshire Rural Community Council (ORCC) presented the case for producing one.

Firstly, to get an idea of our views, everyone was asked to write down one thing they liked about the village, one they disliked and a suggestion for improvement. The 'likes' included Upton's tranquillity, friendliness and lack of street lighting. The 'dislikes' included obstruction by parked cars, the danger of the A417 and the lack of a village shop. Other suggestions were the need for more social activities, traffic calming and better provision for young people.


David explained what a Parish Plan was, and answered questions. Essentially it is put together and owned by the community, rather than stemming from the Parish Council. It is a statement of the residents' vision of their village and an outline of the steps needed to achieve this. The plan should represent the views of as wide a selection of people as possible and once produced it would be used to influence and steer the village's future.

STEERING GROUP

A unanimous show of hands supported the idea of having such a Plan. The next move was to form a Steering Group to manage the project. There was an enthusiastic (mostly male) response to a call for volunteers, so the Steering Group consists of **Austin Maytham, Derek Whitmell, Mike Collins, Julian Sayers, Kit and Caroline Maunsell, David Curran and Allan Macarthur**. **Mike Brown** is the Parish Council representative. A first meeting is planned before Christmas.

Do not be concerned if you missed the initial meeting as there will be many opportunities to put your views and/or volunteer to help produce the final plan.

UPTON JOINS CYCLE NETWORK

The cycle-path on the former railway embankment linking Upton with Didcot was formally opened in November. Representatives of Didcot and the villages, along with county and district councillors and pupils from St. Birinus and East Hagbourne schools, assembled at Lake Bridge Road, where a tape was cut. Many of them braved a fierce headwind and bicycled to Upton. The survivors were made welcome with refreshments.

Considerable dismay was registered by some villagers about the allegedly irretrievable environmental impact of the earthworks. **Simon Pratt**, the local Sustrans officer, explained that bare patches would be re-seeded and a watchdog group from the villages was being formed to report on vandalism and minimise litter. Notices at access points bar the use of motorised vehicles.

Whatever reservations may be felt, the new track provides a valuable route for cyclists both for work and leisure, linking up with the National Cycle Network. It is already being used by increasing numbers of cyclists and pedestrians.
