NEW ROUND OF FUND-RAISING FOR MUGA


This month the Parish Council is re-applying to WREN (Waste Recycling Environmental) for a contribution towards the cost of constructing the Multi Use Games Area. WREN distributes landfill tax credits to local projects in the counties where these taxes are generated. Other sources of funding will also be approached to meet the total cost, now estimated to be in the region of £57,000.

We have been obliged to reduce the original project in order to obtain funding. The design has been changed by removal of the sportswall and reduction of the size of the hard surface by 20% to 18m x 33m. The markings on the adjacent plan show there is still plenty of room for playing football, tennis, netball, basketball and children's games (eg hopscotch, other suggestions welcome). As before, the MUGA will be surrounded by a 2.8m chain-link fence.

The sportswall could be added once the MUGA is completed, subject to further funding being obtained.

This project represents extremely good value for money. For a relatively small outlay, Upton will get a fantastic amenity that would provide villagers with social, health and environmental benefits and be a welcome sporting focus.

D-Day celebrations on our doorstep

Last month Upton Parish Councillors were invited on a minibus tour to learn about how the decommissioning of UKAEA's nuclear facilities at Harwell was progressing. We climbed iron ladders inside ex-fuel reactor cum museum DIDO twin of PLUTO, watched radio-active rubbish being sorted by robotic arms manned through 4ft thick glass, and came away with a picture of a venerable nuclear campus, heyday 1950s — now safely mothballed, though that seems a mind-bogglingly endless task — transmogrified into a grassy and impressive new science and business park.

On Saturday 5 June from 2-7pm — to celebrate the 27-acre site's older, airfield

history, there will be a free public event commemorating a 60th anniversary: in 1944, on the evening before D-Day, British troops flew from RAF Harwell across to France.

The annual open-air service at the Harwell Stone will be a bigger affair than usual. It will commence at 5.30 with a low-level flypast by four Gazelle helicopters of No. 7 Squadron AAC(V) Netheravon, and lasts about 30 minutes, during which the colours of Royal British Legion Units in Oxfordshire will be dipped in salute and wreaths laid. *The Last Post* and a *Lament* will be played by soloists.

Senior managers from UKAEA, Rutherford Lab and Diamond Light Ltd. will lay wreaths

on behalf of their staff and it is hoped that Chilton schoolchildren will take part.

During the afternoon the public can look at exhibition displays and take tea in a large marquee set up on the South Rugby Field adjacent to the Stone. Arrangements are being made for a local band to play, and the bells in nearby Chilton church will be rung in honour of those who died for the liberation of Europe.

Ten years ago at the 50th anniversary over 800 people attended the service, and large numbers are expected to do so again. Local TV, radio and press will be there, and interviews with veterans are already being done. It will be the first of a series of special services taking place throughout Europe that weekend.
