

PURCHASE OF BURIAL GROUND EXTENSION

The Parish Council is happy to announce that on Tuesday 20 July 2004 it finally completed the purchase of an extension to the Upton Burial Ground. It is now the responsibility of the Parish Council rather than the Church to organise such matters.

The late Sheila Parker set the ball rolling by taking up a generous offer from Guy Napper to sell a section of land adjacent to the existing cemetery. That was more than four years ago, but the bureaucracy we endured

to get various permissions has been at times wearing.

However, it is all completed. When the harvest is in and the field has been ploughed we shall enclose the area — roughly the size of the existing cemetery — with a post and rail fence. Access will be through a small gate off the footpath down the field. Eventually another entrance will be opened between the old and new burial grounds.

To begin with we intend to plant meadow grass and wild

flowers, and possibly trees and/or a hedgerow. It will not be needed immediately, so we can look upon it as pleasure garden.

To cover the purchase, the Parish Council has taken out a long-term loan. We have also been setting aside funds for some years, so there will be only a small increase in the precept. We felt that this extension was a good offer and it was important to secure such an asset for the future of the village.
