## VILLAGE BOY WINS IN MALAYSIA

Carl Davis at 16 Fieldside went to Malaysia in July for the Tae Kwon-Do World Championships and came away with a Bronze medal in the 13—17 year-old category. He went over to Kuala Lumpur with his parents and the rest of the England Team.

There were an amazing 36 countries competing. Carl's Dad, Neil Davis says: 'To win a Bronze medal at a World Championship is a tremendous achievement and Carl is very happy with his success over the past two years.

He also took part in the Welsh Open Championship in September and won a Gold medal, and he has been undefeated in national competitions for over two years. He is hoping to go to the British Championships in November, then to Dublin for the European Championships.'

## Curate's Jottings

This summer I spent a week with my cell group in a house in the south of France. It was a large and lovely town house, with three *boulangeries* just two minutes walk away, so fresh baguettes were present every day at breakfast straight after our morning eucharist.

Just a stone's throw away was the village square, cafés rubbing shoulders with the parish church, the florist and the *tabac*. One night, while we were eating out, a band was playing in the square, and perhaps a hundred villagers were dancing in large, slow-moving circle dances. It was such a pleasant occasion, and though we didn't join in the dancing, we were glad to be a part of the evening.

Social life is strong in villages here too, but what struck me about that particular night's dancing was the impromptu nature of it all. It seemed as though a few instrumentalists had got together on the spur of the moment, and, hearing the music, the villagers had turned out of their houses suddenly ready to dance. I'm convinced this way of living is bound up with the immediacy of the daily bread. Baguettes that aren't eaten for breakfast are thrown away rather than eaten, already stale, at lunch-time.

All of this is a far cry from

the meticulous planning of shopping and social life for weeks in advance that I'm so used to. I am rather obsessive about organizing and planning my time (as anyone who's seen the intricate coloured charts on my digital diary will testify). It was good for me to spend a week that wasn't highly timetabled, and to experience a little of the French village life that seemed so spontaneous and relaxed. **Russell Dewhurst**
