# **MUGA Project Progress Report**

Over the past twelve months the Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) Project, long planned by the Parish Council as an important new facility for the Recreation Ground, had some disappointments with grant funding applications. This led to further discussions with various organisations and we modified the design to reduce the initial capital cost but retain all the robust low maintenance cost features. The only really significant change is the omission of the sports practice wall; however, the current design still allows this to be added at a later stage, albeit at an overall increase to the original total cost. Provision for playing tennis has also been deleted; although this only has a small impact on capital cost it does considerably reduce the managing of the MUGA.

As now designed, all the sports and games the hard surface will be marked-out for can be played without requiring additional furniture. For the more serious competitions, goal nets (soccer, hockey, basketball and netball) will/may be made available. Balls, hockey sticks, rounders bats, hopscotch slates, pucks will not be provided!

Currently some £23,000 has been pledged/donated including professional services for the design, surveying and managing of the project. A further £1,000 is expected from voluntary labour for preparation of the site (clearing back of scrub bushes and re-aligning of the soccer field) prior to the contract award.

The MUGA committee has received positive support from Nick Garnett, director of the Vale's Leisure Services. He recently allocated Mary Lambe, the department's landscape manager, to provide assistance, in particular with fund

raising. Mary has visited the site and is extremely enthusiastic for the project to be successfully realised.

The MUGA committee has submitted two further grant applications (one to the Vale District Council) to which responses are expected early in 2005. We are also working on two more applications which will be considered in April 2005. Further discussions are on-going with other organisations and local businesses. These, together with some village fund raising event, are to cover any small shortfall in anticipated funding by the end of April/early May.

Our schedule indicates completion at the end of September 2005. Encouragingly the Vale DC endorses this, given our present level of progress with funding. The schedule includes an eight week construction period, which was accepted by the contract bidders for the original design. All bid documentation will be ready to issue to selected contractors by early March, and this will be done as soon as funding is in place.

I began to get to know Upton residents through the Short Tennis classes I ran. I'd hardly recognise those children now, as 15 years have elapsed! It was a pleasure to meet villagers at the Harvest Supper, and Upton mums with very young children have been attending the monthly pram service over the years.

The Benefice is striving to enable St. Mary's to become a stronger focal point. The aim is to keep the church open during daylight hours, allowing people to come in for private prayer. Every Tuesday, Morning Prayer is being said at 8.15am and Evening Prayer at 5.30pm. These services last for 20 minutes and the clergy welcome others to join them. Eucharist will be celebrated on Thursdays at 11am. Pastoral visiting is by the clergy and lay people, and the church always welcomes requests for visits and prayer needs. # THE LAST OF A LINE

Gwen Greenough came from an old Upton family. The first mention I can find in the parish register is in 1724 with 'Henry ye son of Henry and Elizabeth Greeniph baptiz.', followed in 1733 by: 'Will son of Henry and Eliz Grinif baptised April 8.' Gwen's mother was a Winter, and this family goes back even further to an entry in 1596. It reads, 'Thomas the sonne of Robert Winter baptiz 9 Sept'. This is followed in 1598 by a daughter, ffrancis, and in 1602 'Lewes Winter widow was buried 23 April.' Since parish registers only became a legal requirement in 1588 it is quite possible that Robert Winter was living in the village well before this date. From then on Greenoughs and Winters continued to live in Upton. It is always sad when the old names die out, and Gwen was the last Greenough to Juliet Gardiner live here.

The respect held for Gwen in the community was reflected in the generous donations in memory of her life. The total amount of £660 will be divided equally between Didcot Hospital and Upton Methodist church.
