Please be vigilant and ring me if you see anyone behaving in this anti-social way (850989). In the meantime, we will henceforth be reporting every such act to the police.

As Parish Clerk I receive lots of items of mail that I feel should reach a wider audience than at present. I put them on the noticeboard and/or in the Post Office but I'm not sure how many people actually see them. Recent items include:

1. Oxford County Council would like everyone to know that batteries, light-bulbs, paint, wood, metal, fridges, freezers, garden tools, glass, batteries, computers, TVs, plastic and garden waste can be recycled at all eight of the county's recycling centres. Please don't put these items in your dustbins.
2. Is your electric blanket safe? Free safety check at Abingdon on Friday, 14 October. To book your appointment tel. 01865 815607.
3. The VoWH's Half-Fare Bus Pass Scheme. If you are aged 60 or over and/or have certain disabilities, you could be entitled to a half-fare bus pass. Entitles holder to half-fare bus travel within the VoWH area and Oxford City, including the Park+Ride service. 4. The VoWH are backing Solarsavers — a discounted Solar Water Heating Scheme which gives free impartial advice and free no obligation quotes for installed systems (see notice on board on the green). ## Curate's Swansong

The highlight of my recent trip to Italy was Florence, and specifically, the Fra Angelico frescoes at the San Marco museum. The museum is the old Priory where Fra Angelico and his Dominican brothers lived, and in every one of the thirty or so cells, there is an exquisitely beautiful fresco depicting some event from the gospels: the annunciation, the stables at Bethlehem, the crucifixion, and so on. As a tourist, I looked at them all, in, I suppose thirty minutes total. And most people go round much more quickly. Yet Fra Angelico meant them to be food for meditation for each Friar lasting for months— or even years. He expected a brother to live with the fresco, to see it every day, and still see new things after a year. Yet, despite having travelled to see them, I spent scarcely a minute with each, then rushed on to the next thing on my itinerary.

I feel something similar about my time in Upton and the HUB benefice. I feel like I've scarcely arrived, and only just begun to get to know the people and the area. And there are many people I would have liked to get to know better could I stay longer. But I am called to move

on, to be Priest-in-Charge of St Frideswide in Oxford, and Web Pastor of the diocese's i-church. I have learned a lot, I have shared a lot of experiences with people, but I still feel like I am rushing away. The formative years as a curate as so important for a priest, and though mine have been a little shorter than some, they have been a very full twenty-seven months. I feel a little trepidation, but well-prepared to take up these new responsibilities. Please keep me in your prayers over the next few months. With my love and blessings,
