Upton Wine Appreciation Club

We now have 66 members with an average attendance of 41 during the past year when 75 different wines were tasted. At the AGM Frankie Jacklin presented the audited accounts which showed that the club was on a sound financial footing. No increase in annual membership or meeting costs was proposed. Mike Collins remains as chairman and Ellie Bunston has joined the committee, replacing Chris Traynor. The wine tasting followed the theme of "Let's Try something Different". We tried an Upton version of Kir Royale made from Undurraga Sparkling Pinot Noir (Chile) and Blackcurrant Schnapps (Germany) which helped to lubricate the AGM formalities. The subsequent wines were taken from parts of the world that had not been previously been explored in the Club's tastings. Among them the following stood out:

A Goteoldal Single Vineyard Pinot Grigio from the Hilltop Estate, Hungary (2011) with a full ripe, and truly flavoured pinot grigio, impressed the club and was at a reasonable price (£6.25). We have never before tasted a Valpolicella wine from Italy. This had gained a poor reputation through over exploitation in the years after 1968 when the DOC regulations were introduced. Changes made in 2003 have reversed the trend. The wine tasted, Torre del Falasco, Valpolicella Superiore Ripasso, 2010, DOC, made a good impression on tasting, with the ripasso process adding complexity and concentration. At £8.95, it was thought good value. Since this wine was tasted blind, we were amazed that one cognoscenti present accurately identified the wine!

Massaya Classic 2009 from the Bekka Valley, Lebanon also impressed the club. This wine, 60% cinsault, 20% cabernet sauvignon and 20% syrah had been made with the help of experts from Burgundy and the Rhone in France and clearly showed their influence. At £9.95 it was well received.

The evening was brought to a close by a magnificent dessert wine, Seewinkle Eisiwein 2008, made by Jana Klein in Austria from the Gruner Veltliner grape. The concentrated exquisite flavours stood out and compensated for the very high cost of a wine (£20 for 50cl) which most of us would not normally ever taste.

Next meeting is Wednesday 17th October when I will introduce wines from the Southern Rhone. Anybody interested in joining the club should contact Mike Collins (tel. 850989) or Kevin Jacklin (851404).

St Mary's Church Fete

A very big thank you to all who helped make the day special. Another lovely social occasion, blessed with fine weather too. The gymnastic display from Chris Seelig's club was a joy to watch. Who knows some of them may be our future Olympians.

Then there was the dog show, raising funds for Air Ambulance, always a worthy cause, at the same time providing great attraction for the fete.

The "TEAS" - how would we survive without them. A special thank you to all who provided the lovely cakes, always a success.

On average the fete raises £2,000 for church funds. This year it was £1,946.01 (the mysterious penny!). It is very remiss of us that we haven't—up until now - let everyone know how these funds are used.

Fundraising, along with regular income from the congregation, including those who may not necessarily attend church services plus the occasional donation, is used to pay our annual Parish Share of £7,700 to the Diocese of Oxford.

This goes towards the paying, training and housing of the clergy. We also have our share towards the Benefice office of £260, for the administration costs of running a large benefice. Then there are the usual expenses, insurance, electricity, churchyard plus cemetery (may we offer an apology at this point for the long grass in

both, this year, and give a big thank you to Harry Prior for rescuing the wooden seat from oblivion by strimming away the growth from along the wall).

As a church we feel it is right to support three or four charities, not always the same ones each year, by donating £1,000.

No, we do not receive enough regular income to cover these annual costs, but over the years fundraising has allowed us to have the wooden area of the floor repaired in 1999, the roof retiled in 2002, new lighting and heating installed in 2006. In 2009 the interior walls were re-limewashed and at the same time the old lime wash was removed to expose the lovely stonework of the chancel arch and two of the older windows. Two old gravestones in the churchyard became unsafe and had to be repaired professionally. Still to be done, trimming a couple of the yew trees, repairs to a small window and remedial work to the font. We are slowly eating into our reserves just to cover annual outgoings.

We certainly appreciate all the help and support that is always willingly given at fundraising events.

From Mr Alex Fry, formerly of the Manor House

Letter from Alex Fry (after reading the Upton web site and seeing the photos).

I am the nephew of Susan & Sophie Fry and my late father Joseph Lawrence Fry lived in the Manor House in the 1940's/early 50's. A third aunt (Esther) became a nun in Hawick in Scotland. I spent some time there also. My aunts were unmarried and very talented. They often conversed in ancient Greek & Sophie was also an accomplished botanist. My father joined the household in about 1933. We were all living in Wiltshire where my father and mother had a small holding near Avebury. I was the youngest of 3 boys. My father was a Captain in the Royal Field Artillery in the first War and a holder of the Military Cross. Unfortunately my mother died at a young age of 32 in 1932. The small holding went bust so the Aunts invited him to live in the Manor with them. I ended up in boarding school in East Sussex and visited the Manor in school holidays but mainly boarded out elsewhere. During WWII my father was officer in charge of the local home guard, Upton and Blewbury. Later on when I was a cadet in the Royal Sussex Reg't I joined in with the "Dad's Army" and witnessed some amusing events. The Upton bombing rang a bell. My father pulled one of the Aunts away from the window when the incendiaries landed in the orchard. The Aunts remarked "what pretty lights!". I remember well the eccentric Miss Partridge down Frog Alley. My Aunts at exactly the same

time went daily without fail with a large basket of food to Frog Alley to feed the large population of cats resident at Miss Partridge's cottage. My father was an accomplished musician and composer. Quite a few Upton residents tuned in to the wireless when my father's composition was being played at the BBC. During the war musical events at the Manor were carried out. I can remember an American turning up for a get together. My father also played the organ at the Catholic Church in Didcot. I lost contact with the Manor when I married in 1952 and moved to London, I was in the Royal Marines up to 1954 and then joined the London Fire Brigade. I believe Aunt Sophie passed away first and Aunt Susie was knocked over by a Job's milk float by the front gate, just a nudge, but due to old age she died. My father went to live in S Wales with my eldest brother where he died in 1955. A lot of the names mentioned on the Upton web site rang a bell, Butler, Belcher, Greenough, Keep, Saunders etc. I have a newspaper article in the 1960's all about Frank Napper wishing to pull down the Manor as it was an eyesore! He lost his case.

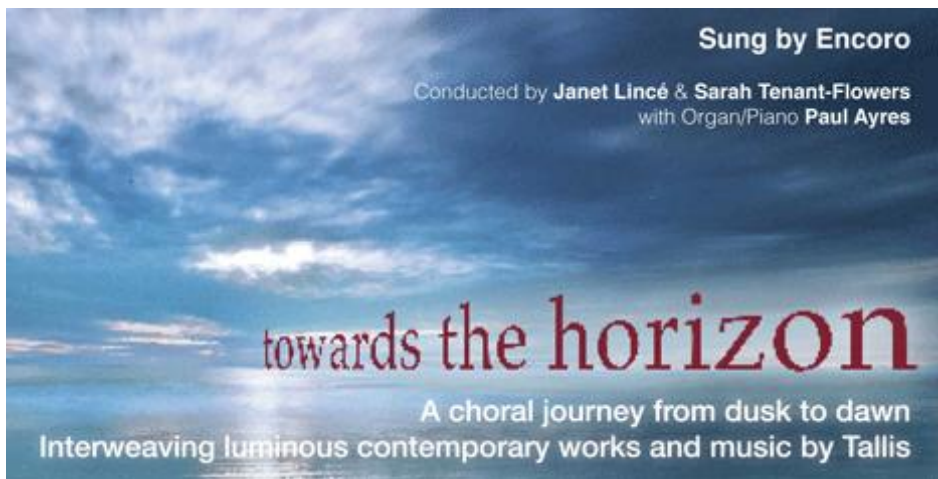
Village Produce Association

From the Parish Council Meeting, Tuesday 18th September

County Councillor's Report:

A full traffic study of the A417 will be carried out in association with the development of the UK Science Enterprise Park. Mr Lilly has put in train the following: 30mph VAS sign on western approach to the village, refresh road markings on A417, remove 50mph sign close to village approach. These actions will be completed as his budget allows. He will consult with Highways on the "wish list" of proposals for traffic calming as drawn up by Mr Norman. Great Western Park developers wish to increase the size of the food retail outlet by 2½ times in the "central village area".

Planning

- (i) P12/V1392HH - garden room at Cherry Tree Cottage - decision awaited
- (ii) P12/V1482/O - outline application for 3 properties at Maslina. This application will be taken at the Vale's planning committee in October.
- (iii) Wattle Cottage: an enforcement order has been issued to stop the work proceeding. The landowner has appealed against the refusal of the application.
- (iv) Details pursuant to condition 9 & 10 of planning permission UPT/3451/15-CM - Prospect Farm, Chilton. Councillors to research this application and forward comments to the clerk in order to formulate a response to OCC. The PC was in agreement that "in any event there should be no detrimental effect on the AONB."

Councillors' reports

Pound Lane: flooding & overgrowth issues. A "round robin" letter had been sent to residents requesting attention be given to overgrowth and the necessity of keeping the ditch cleared.

Coffin Way: a watching brief is being kept regarding the footpath to Blewbury. The planting of a hedgerow across Coffin Way was mooted. The RHS is offering trees as part of a national campaign to plant more trees.

Village Hall: Caravan Meet requested for Easter 2013: a number of issues were raised. After discussion the Chairman said that the Rally needed to be managed. Clerk was asked to contact Mrs West with the request that a meeting be held between a Parish Councillor and the Caravan organisers. Dr Lott will draw a map defining the area in which the caravans are to be parked. Access to the playground should not be impeded thus preventing village children from using the facility over the Easter holiday.

Old Playground

“Wish list” of proposals for traffic calming

A pedestrian crossing on the A417, to provide safe access from Alden Farm Lane and Chilton Road to the centre of the village, esp. for young families to connect with the school bus; the location of this may be problematic.

Other traffic calming safety measures (some of which may be mutually exclusive):

widening of the verges on the A417 between the George and Dragon (G&D) and the High Street, to provide improved visibility for pedestrians, cyclists and horse-riders, when crossing from Prospect Road to the Lynchway and the G&D; also for people crossing from High Street to the south side; and for motorists and cyclists using the main road;

subject to the above, the installation of a further pedestrian crossing from Prospect Road to the G&D;

extension of the existing footway alongside the A417 on the south side from the G&D to a point opposite the High Street, thereby providing safe passage from the top of the High Street to other parts of the village;

installation of a new-technology speed camera, when available, at the western approach, also a camera on the eastern approach to the G&D; a mini-roundabout at the junction of Chilton Road or traffic lights;

a chicane to slow down the approaching traffic at either end of the village (as at Cholsey on A329).

Vacancy for Clerk

Upton Parish Council

Upton Parish Council will be shortly looking for someone able to take responsibility for all administrative aspects of the Council and to act as Responsible Financial Officer.

Duties include production of agendas and minutes for all meetings, carrying out all the Council's decisions, advising the Council on procedural matters, producing brief monthly updates for the Upton News and village web site.

Parish Council financial work includes dealing with the payment of bills, managing the accounts and annual audit, budget preparations and dealing with VAT issues relating to Parish Projects. Training is available. Good communication with the Chairman is essential.

The post is part time, averaging 18 hours per month with hours to suit. The Clerk works from home and attends Parish Council meetings which are usually held at 8pm on the third Tuesday of alternate months. The salary is from £1925 pa, (based on 216 hours pa) according to experience.

The ideal candidate will have good organisational and computer skills, including Excel spreadsheets. Broadband internet connection essential.

Neighbourhood Watch

Hare Coursing

Although hare coursing appears to be an obscure offence, it is a major concern and source of alarm and distress for our rural communities. High visibility patrols and operations by Police and Police Community Support Officers (PCSO) are carried out in this area to prevent offences. Illegal hare coursing normally involves a group of people walking a line across a field, most with at least one lurcher type dog each, approximately twenty to thirty metres apart; effectively driving hares in front of them. When a hare is disturbed, one, two or more lurchers will be released and the hare chased until it is caught, irrespective of the time this might take. When a course or chase is over, the injured or dead hare is simply discarded.

This process will then be repeated until such time that there are no hares left in that particular field. Offenders will then move onto another field and start again. The harvest is now in and the hare coursing has started; if you see anything suspicious please keep us informed. The Hare Coursing season is normally September through until March but it can and does occur outside of this period.

Vehicle security

Two cars on High Street were broken into one night last week without any apparent break in, i.e. no broken window or external damage. Some money was taken but no other contents. Please ensure you lock

your cars, remove valuables, watch out for suspicious characters if out and about and report anything untoward to 101 for non emergencies or 999 if a crime is being committed.

Boneless Rolled Shoulder of Lamb with Zesty Orange & Lemon Glaze

Boned rolled shoulder of lamb joint

For the glaze:

50g/2oz of ginger purée
Juice & zest of 1 orange
20g/1oz of brown sugar
30ml/1floc of lemon juice
10g/½oz of ginger - diced
2 x 5ml/teaspoons olive oil

- Mix all glaze ingredients together.
- Roast lamb in centre of pre-heated oven 180C/350F/Gas 4 at 25mins per 500g and 25 mins over (Medium) or 30 mins per 500g and 30 mins over (well done)
- Remove joint from oven 10 mins before end of cooking time, coat with the glaze and return to oven to finish cooking.
- Allow joint to rest in warm place for 10 mins before carving.

Upton Playground

On a hot and sunny Saturday afternoon in Upton, a crowd of all ages gathered for the official opening of the new Upton Play Area.



Members of the Parish Council welcomed Deputy Mayor & Mayoress Axel and Denise MacDonald and Mr. Joe Newby from WREN* to the new play area just before the start of the annual Upton fete in aid of St Mary's Church.

The new play area has been a major project for the village of Upton for the last two years. A grant of £47,060 was awarded by WREN, with the remainder of the funds raised from donations and fundraising from a variety of local sources including Uptonogood?, the very popular annual Upton mountain bike event, that has taken place every summer since 2010.

Featuring a thrilling high level beam walk, free-running trail, zip wire and obstacle course, the play area has already proved a great success with village residents and visitors alike.

Deputy Mayor Axel MacDonald and Mr Joe Newby from WREN unveiled a plaque to commemorate the



opening, followed closely by local competition winner, Maddison Langley, age 7, making a dramatic entrance, flying down the zip wire through a paper ribbon. Finally the Reverend Jason St. John Nicolle of the Churn Benefice blessed the slide with holy water having first climbed to the top of the play frame. He then descended the new slide in great style!
