Theatre Club

The Upton Theatre Goers went to the Oxford Playhouse in November to see *Rough Justice* with Tom Conti as James Highwood and a small supporting cast. The author is Terence Frisby. Who he? Well he had a career of writing for the cinema and screen and *Rough Justice* is the creation of a master craftsman. It is a courtroom drama, with the clever and occasional insertion of the Courthouse cell where we are privy to the thoughts of James and his wife, and their solicitor.

We were gripped from the start. Tom Conti takes the part of a television journalist who has made a career of challenging the British Justice System. Now it is he who is challenged. He stands in the dock as the result of the death of his youngest child. Aged two years the child is catastrophically handicapped as a result of congenital brain damage. The outlook for his future is grim. James enters a plea of Manslaughter. He describes the evening he placed a pillow over his son's body, and presses down until the child is still.

The battle for the outcome is for a sentence of Life or Leniency. The Judge, the prosecuting Q.C. and Highwood representing himself are the protagonists.

The Judge stresses that the sentence whether Murder or Manslaughter is entirely in the hands of the jury. Then we find that the audience is to be the jury.

It is the last twist of a truly dramatic evening.

Yuletide Recipes

Honey & Mustard Sausages

- 1lb small chipolata sausages (or a pack of 8, each one chopped into 3)
- Honey
- Wholegrain mustard

In an ovenproof dish, put about a tablespoon of honey on the base of the dish and then add about 2 tsp of wholegrain mustard and mix together.

Add the sausages and ensure they are coated in the honey & mustard.

Cook in the oven at 160o (turn once) until brown.

Drain off the excess fat. Serve with cocktail sticks (beware, can be very hot).

Mulled Wine

Adjust quantities and sweetness according to taste. It is recommended that you forewarn anyone who may be driving about the brandy content as this can get masked by the spices.

- 2 bottles of red wine
- 1 orange (sliced)
- Cloves
- Cinnamon stick
- Dash of brandy
- Sugar (to taste)

Put about 1 oz of sugar in a pan. Add the red wine.

Add the cinnamon stick and the orange slices studded with cloves.

Simmer until warmed through, but do not allow to boil.

Add a slug of brandy (to taste).

Allow the flavours to infuse.

Serve in glasses (put a teaspoon in the glass before pouring in the hot liquid to prevent the glass from cracking).

Rectors Reflections

Christmas in a Word

I wonder, if you had to sum up Christmas in just one word, what word would you choose? Carols? Crackers? Snowmen? Tinsel? There are so many words to choose from!

If you were to ask me for the word I would choose, I think it might well be the word "Surprise". Why might I choose this word?

Surprise was at the heart of the very first Christmas. At the time that Jesus was born, pious Jews knew that God was present with His people, and many felt that He was present in the Temple in Jerusalem. But no one expected God to take human flesh and become a human being. The theme of surprise runs as a thread through the stories surrounding the birth of Jesus, stories familiar to us from the lessons read at carol services, and from the words of countless carols. Much of the later life and teaching of Jesus came as a surprise - to his family, his contemporaries, and even to his closest followers. For many, Jesus came as too much of a surprise! Many found His actions and his teachings far too challenging. And the greatest surprise of all came at the very end of Jesus' life. Most people would doubtless have predicted that Jesus was going to come to a sticky end, because he challenged the assumptions and pretensions of those in authority, both the political elite and the religious authorities. But, in the event, Jesus' execution proved not to be the end, but rather the



beginning- the beginning of Jesus' new life, as the resurrected Lord, claiming power and authority over all creation.

When we encounter Jesus, we meet God at work, constantly surprising us with the depth of His love, and the challenge of His truth. God wants to challenge our assumptions, to open us to new experiences, and to help us grow as human beings. All of God's surprises are the surprises of love, the surprises of someone who wishes only the very best for us. God is not in the business of playing tricks with us. Rather, God is in the business of providing us with new beginnings and new hope.

When times are dark, and hearts are heavy, let us remember the wonderful surprises which God has in store for us, not only over the Christmas period, but in the year and years ahead.

Upton News Survey

There were 28 responses, and although more would have been better, by MORI standards this should have been a statistically representative sample. However there were disproportionately more responses from electronic subscribers... Of those who answered a given question:

- 93% lived in Upton
- 89% were on email
- 67% receive an electronic copy, 37% a printed copy (some receive both)
- 20% receive a printed copy but would like to receive an electronic copy
- None receive an electronic copy but would like to receive a printed copy
- 89% like the current A5 format
- 59% preferred colour, 11% black and white, 30% didn't mind
- 4% would like to revert to the two page black and white version
- 88% would like to receive it monthly, 12% quarterly
- 4% thought it too short, 85% about right, 11% too long
- 7% thought the content poor, 15% fair, 52% good, 26% excellent
- 44% were willing to submit articles
- 19% were willing to sponsor printing
- 75% would like us to include adverts to pay for the printing, and 23% were prepared to help find advertisers

welcome anyone in the village who wants to join us for our last Carol Service. Listen to the choir and sing some of your favourite carols.

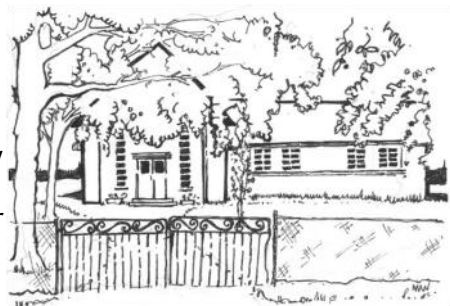
