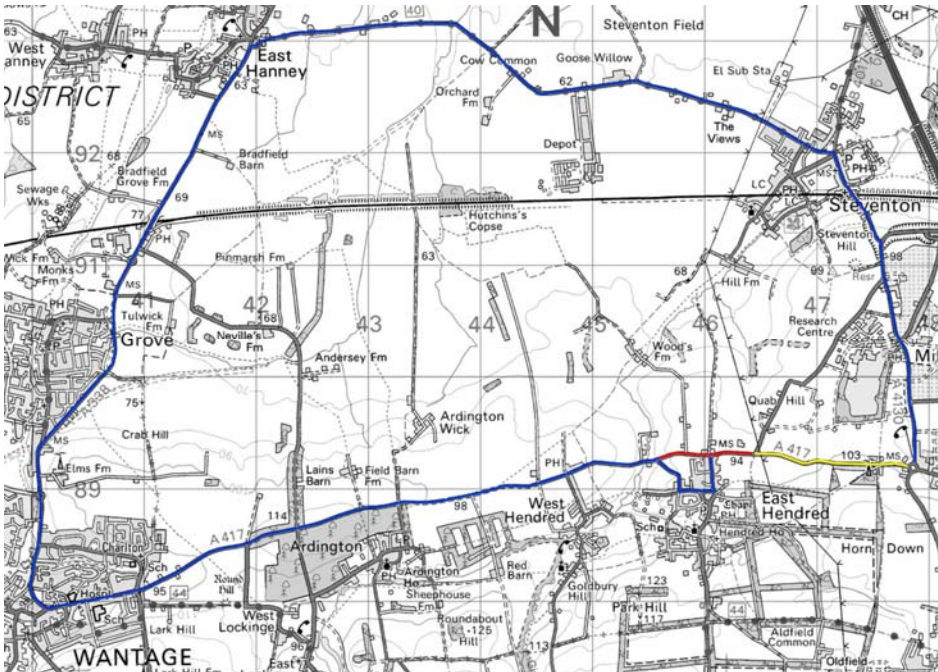

Road Closure - East Hendred ... and restrictions beyond Blewbury

The A417 at East Hendred, from Featherbed Lane to the 2nd access into East Hendred on the left, if approaching from Rowstock, will be closed between 9.30am - 19.30 from 11th - 15th February. This closure will cause major disruption as the alternative route is a long one. Thereafter, a temporary 30mph limit and 2.3m vehicle width restriction on the A417 between Bessels Way and the double junction with Halfpenny Lane and Westfield Road on Kingstanding Hill, from February 20th for 8 days. Post Office News

The Royal Mail has announced new restrictions for international mail, basically anything that could pose a danger to aircraft or people, so no aerosols, alcohol, batteries (unless Lithium ones already installed in an item, max 2) and packed securely, corrosives, electronic devices, flammable liquids (which include perfume and nail varnish) and a whole lot more. If you are sending something abroad, you will be asked what is in your parcel. Leaflets are available in the Post Office, or go to www.royalmail.com/restrictedgoods for the complete guide.

Blewbury Garden Market producers are continuing bringing freshly baked bread and cakes on Saturday mornings, and there a few jars of preserves during the week too.

We would like to remind parents on the school run that the village hall car park is also used for the Doctor's surgery and the Post Office and therefore access should not be blocked.

Thames Valley Police are advising dog owners to be extra vigilant following a spate of nearly 20 dog thefts from several counties in the past month with thieves targeting pedigree breeds. DOGWATCH was founded 5 years ago to help combat rural crime and the theft of dogs in particular.

Spring Line Church Council Meeting

A reminder to church members that the Council meeting will take place at 7.30 pm on Tuesday 5th February 2013, at the Upton Centre. This will be our last Church Council meeting before the closure of the Spring Line Church in April. Any non-members who attend the Spring Line Church and those with an interest in our church are invited to attend.

Closure

As you read this, the Spring Line Methodist church will have celebrated its last ever Carol Service and Annual Covenant Service.

Preparations for the closure of both Upton and Blewbury churches are in hand (to be marked at services over Easter 2013). It's a time tinged with sadness; but also blessed in the realisation that Christian witness has always been about dying and rising again. Churches (especially village churches) are closing across the country now; it's easy to feel that this is a mark of failure - loss yes, but failure, no.

So much has been put in place over the lifetime of these churches; society has been transformed by their presence. They came into

existence when we had no NHS, no welfare state; in a time when education was selective, for the few. They were planted with a job to do - and that job has been done. They challenged society to embed Christian principles and they have done that. In a very profound way, the closing of churches is a mark that says 'job well done'.

We chose to close at Easter because that is the time when we acknowledge the need to 'die to rise again'. How that takes place is in the hands of the creative force that sits behind all this. It is yet to be revealed; but it will happen (I write this as a person who lives in a Methodist chapel, closed and converted into a place that continues to breathe its heritage in a most unexpected way).

Join us as we give thanks for the miracles that are Upton and Blewbury Methodist Churches, and let's all realise that - without the energy that has been held in these places - life would be that much poorer.

Hoax Emails

Notwithstanding the genuine risk of scams perpetuated via the Internet (see *Avoiding Scams*), we have all received well-meaning emails from friends trying to educate us or warn against some peril. Unfortunately many of these are inaccurate or plain wrong.

One that's doing the rounds again at the moment says that entering your PIN code in reverse at an ATM will summon the police. *This is not true.*

When you get such an email, look for the five telltale signs of a hoax:

Urgency: a subject line using language and punctuation such as WARNING!!!!!! , IMPORTANT!!!

Tell all your friends: share the 'important information' with as many people as possible

This isn't a hoax: it's been confirmed by some nameless official or an employee of Microsoft

Dire consequences: answering the phone will cost you £150, or your hard drive will explode

History: lots of >>>> in the message itself indicating that it's already been forwarded multiple times.

If you're still not sure, google the subject, e.g. 'reverse pin' or 'premium rate phone email'. Sites such as snopes.com or hoax-slayer.com will soon tell you whether or not it's just an urban legend. Many of these emails have been circulating for 8 years or more.

If it is a hoax, just ignore and delete the email.

Rectors Reflections

The Wood and the Trees

I think sometimes we all find it difficult to see the wood from the trees. Our lives tend to be a mix of the essential and the inessential, and often it is hard to know which is which. And what is true of us as individuals is also true of organisations, communities and countries. For example, I wonder what you think is essential to us as a nation? Being a world player, politically and economically? Being a democracy, in which everyone is treated fairly, and all are subject to the rule of law? Being a country which cares for its most vulnerable, and provides access to education and health care to all?

All of us can benefit from times set aside to think about our priorities, to try and see the wood from the trees. In the Christian tradition, there is a period of 40 days set aside for precisely this purpose. In English speaking countries, the period is known as Lent. It starts on a Wednesday, in February or March, called Ash Wednesday, and finishes the day before Easter Day. This year, Ash Wednesday falls on 13th

February and Easter Sunday falls on 31st March.

A particular tradition on Ash Wednesday is to come to church and to be marked on the forehead with a cross made from ash - hence Ash Wednesday. As the priest makes the sign of the cross, the priest says the following words : "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ". Sobering words.

Jesus took time out to think about his priorities. We tend to imagine that Jesus' life was always a life of preaching, teaching, and healing. In fact, he only seems to have started doing this when he was about 30; before then, he probably worked as a carpenter.

Before Jesus started his new life, he took time out. He went into the desert for 40 days, to think things through - hence the 40 days of Lent. Few of us, I think, would be able to take 40 days out to think things through, to help us see the wood from the trees. But what about 40 hours, or even 40 minutes? It's worth a try.

Upton Wine Appreciation Club

December meeting - Sparkling and Dessert Wines

Our annual favourites Fiona and Will Betts were persuaded to do another talk on sparkling and dessert wines.

Fiona began with a theme of comparing Supermarket sparkling wines and described the process of tank and traditional method wine production with the aid of hand-outs for making sparkling wines and first up was the Underraga Brut (12%) from Chile (£5.99 reduced from £9.99). A Club favourite and a blend of Pinot Noir and Chardonnay. This wine went down well again with the members.

Sainsbury's "Taste the Difference" Cava 2009 (11.5%) £10.49 was next up. Made by the "Methode Traditional" (the same process as Champagne). Made from Chardonnay, Macabeu, Parellada and Xarel-Lo grapes. You could really "Taste the Difference"! Citrusy and biscuity and I got cloves on the nose. I don't think this one will be a Club favourite by some of the comments in the room.

Tesco's Finest Premier Cru NV (12.5%) £14.99 reduced from £19.99. A blend of the classic and well known Champagne grapes Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier. Fresh, dry and with a good mousse this wine went down well with the members.

Sainsbury's Blanc De Noirs NV (12%) £18. Made from only the black "Champagne grapes" - Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier. A nice bright wine with a little yeast detected by

my taste buds.

Bollinger Special Cuvee (12%) £32 Majestic Wines. Fiona explained the different Cru's of Champagne and the hierarchy of the vineyards that grow the grapes for the production of Champagne. Fiona also explained that Bollinger along with other Champagne producers strive to produce the same wine year on year despite different yearly weather conditions and keep wine back year on year to blend for new vintages. Overall a nice wine.

With Fiona's voice managing to get through the sparkling wines Will got up to show the sweet and stickies beginning with Wehlener Sonnenuhr Riesling Auslese, 2007, JJ Prüm (7%) £27 (The Wine Society). A good wine with a low ABV due to the fermentation being halted early to keep the sweetness of the wine.

Went well with Chris's mince pies! The sparkling Moscato D'Asti by Elio Perrone, 2011 (5%) £6.50 (The Wine Society) made by the "Asti Method" in the Piedmont region of Italy. Sweet chilled and fizzy an interesting wine.

Next was The Society's Exhibition Sauternes, 2009 (14%) £18 The Wine Society. Made by the father and son team Pierre and Denis Dubourdieu in Barsac from 75% semillon, 20% sauvignon, 5% muscadelle this was the favourite of the evening. Will explained the intricate and time consuming process of selecting the rotting grapes bunches and even individual berries which goes in to making this wine and helps to explain why these style of wine cost as much as they do. (cont'd)

Finally Will finished the evening with Henriques & Henriques Malvasia, 10 years old Madeira (20%) £17 (The Wine Society). You could feel your teeth melt with this one! Nice sweet and sticky with a slightly dry touch which will go well with Christmas cake, mince pie and cheeses.

A big thank you to Fiona and Will for their research on the wines and preparation of the food to go with the wines and thanks to Emily for her help with the smoked salmon Blinis and Chris for her mince pies! Next meeting is Wednesday 20th February 8pm in the Village Hall.

The University of the Third Age

The University of the Third Age in Didcot is off to a flying start!

U3A is a dynamic, outward looking organisation which has a positive and creative approach to life after full-time work. It is unique because everything is done by its members. The U3A in the UK was founded in 1982. There are currently more than 870 U3As with over 295,000 individual members and growing daily. One in four of the population is in the third age! The first age refers to childhood and dependence, the second age to full-time employment and parental responsibilities and the third age is that which follows where one is retired or partially retired. Didcot & District U3A believes that the third age should be one of creativity, fulfilment and friendship.

Our first meeting in January was a

tremendous success with over 150 people attending. 115 people joined and wanted to take part in at least 30 interest groups. We meet on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. Visitors are welcome to come to one meeting as a taster before joining. The next meeting will be held on Tuesday 19 February at 2pm at Didcot Civic Hall and its topic will be May Day to Mummers: Oxfordshire Seasonal Customs.

Anyone in the third age can join Didcot & District U3A and this includes people who are working part time. No qualifications are required, and none are given. There is no lower or upper age limit for membership. Its national representative body is the Third Age Trust (Registered Charity No 288007).

Community First Responders—Volunteers Wanted

Community First Responders are local volunteers trained and equipped by the ambulance service to attend certain types of 999 emergency calls within their local community. They carry a medical kit that includes an oxygen cylinder and masks, airways, a defibrillator and other first aid equipment. CFRs are trained in life support to help patients with chest pain, in cardiac arrest, breathing problems, severe bleeding, diabetic emergencies and unconscious casualties; all incidents where seconds count.

Unfortunately, the team for various different reasons has seen their numbers fall and now would appreciate some additional volunteers to help cover the village and surrounding areas.

Studies have shown that the early response to medical emergencies such as cardiac problems greatly enhance the patients chances of recovery. For example, following a cardiac arrest (where the heart stops beating) a person's chance of survival decreases by 10% for every minute they wait for help to arrive.

Following a '999' call, the CFR is contacted by mobile phone with details of the call and at the same time an ambulance is dispatched. The CFR will deliver immediate medical support then hand over to the ambulance crew on arrival and continue to assist as necessary.

CFRs receive 2 days of initial training, have monthly training update opportunities and are re-assessed every 6 months.

Upton formed a CFR team back in 2009 initially with nine trained volunteers and we have been asked to provide occasional support to the surrounding villages of West Hagbourne, Blewbury, Chilton and Harwell. The team to date has been involved in over 90 calls in the local area.

CFRs are volunteers and the equipment is provided by the South Central Ambulance League of Friends, the team has raised funds to cover the cost of the equipment and has managed to fund a second kit for the village.
