Rectors Reflections

Crossing a Bridge

People have been celebrating Easter for almost two thousand years. Why is this so? What is Easter all about? A quick answer would be that Easter is the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. But what is “Resurrection”?

For Christians, Easter and Resurrection are two words trying to describe the bridge between two fundamental realities- realities which are exciting and challenging, affirming and transforming, familiar and yet profoundly mysterious.

The first reality is the earthly life of Jesus Christ, a Jew who lived in the Holy Land back in the First Century. Jesus was executed by crucifixion, round about 30 AD or so. In his adult life, he had a ministry of teaching, prayer and healing, and he was able to perform miracles. Many have believed that his birth was also miraculous - born of Mary, but without an earthly father. Many have also believed that he was more than just a human being - he was God as well, fully human and fully God.

Although Jesus was crucified, died and was buried, this was not the end of the story. Ever since the first Easter Day, literally millions of people have been convinced that Jesus Christ is alive and active. Sometimes people talk about this ongoing life of Jesus in terms of the Spirit - the Spirit sent by Jesus into our world and into our lives, actively at work to bring healing and refreshment, justice, hope and forgiveness.

So how do we get from the first reality to the second reality? Easter and Resurrection are ways of describing the bridge which leads from the historic life of Jesus Christ, lived in the Holy Land back in the First Century, to the ongoing life of Jesus Christ in the present. The worship and witness of the Church tries to make this ongoing life of Jesus Christ real to us. It seeks to provide a means for Christians to share in the reality of the first Easter and Resurrection.

Because Jesus is alive, He is always our contemporary. The human beings who manage Jesus’ church may sometimes forget this, but fortunately the ongoing life of Jesus Christ is deeper and stronger than the church which carries that life. Jesus Christ is as alive today as he was two thousand years ago- that is my conviction, the cornerstone of my life.

Local Plan

It was recently published in the Vale Community when and where we are hosting our manned exhibition events to help inform people on the Local Plan, explain what it will mean to them and how they can have their say. We have set out the full details of these events below, including the additional, unmanned exhibitions that will remain in place for the duration of the consultation up to 9 May.

The Local Plan Part 1 is the part of the Local Plan that deals with general policies and strategic sites, rather than smaller sites and particular settlement matters which will be dealt with in Part 2 when it is published.

The roadshow exhibition locations are focused on towns and villages with strategic housing sites identified in this draft of the Local Plan Part 1.

- Saturday 13 April, 10am - 3pm Faringdon Corn Exchange

Static exhibitions will stay in place for the duration of the consultation - 9 May:

- Abingdon - Guildhall
- Faringdon - Corn Exchange
- Grove - Old Mill Hall
- Botley - Library
- Shrivenham - Memorial Hall

We hope that as many people as possible in the Vale will find the time to visit one of the permanent or roadshow exhibitions which will explain how you can have your say.

CPRE (Campaign to Protect Rural England)

At the Oxfordshire branch of CPRE we are worried about the Vale of the White Horse DC's draft local plan and its impact on the Vale's rural communities. We very much want local people to have their say. Our job is to keep an eye on things but we need more eyes 'on the ground' who can help us to mobilise and campaign on their behalf should that become necessary.

Help protect the rural Vale

The VoWH District Council published its draft Local Plan in February. It sets out the District's main development plans until 2026, including sites for 1000s of new houses. The Oxfordshire Branch of the Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE) is urging people to have their say and tell the Council how important it is to protect the rural character of the Vale's landscape and villages.

Like most local communities, CPRE supports the right development in the right place. But current pressures mean that large-scale and unsustainable applications are getting through in some places. CPRE is already working with the Small Villages Alliance and the Western Vale Villages Consortium to keep a very close eye on things, but needs the support of local people - your support - to remain vigilant and take action when necessary.

Capt. Joseph Lawrence Fry lived at the Manor House from about 1933 until the 50s. During the second war he was in charge of the Upton & Blewbury Home Guard. The Elgar Society have written to tell us that in the Great War he wrote to Elgar...

Oct 5, 1917

TO Sir Edward Elgar.

Dear Sir,

Though unknown, I feel I must write to you tonight. We possess a fairly good Gramophone [sic] in our Mess, and I have bought your record 'Starlight Express' "Hearts must be star-shiny dressed". It is being played for the twelfth time over. The Gramophone was Anathema to me before this War because it was abused so much. But all this is changed now, and it is the only means of bringing back to us the days that are gone, and helping one through the Ivory gate that leads to fairyland, or Heaven, whatever one likes to call it. And it is a curious thing, even those who only go for Rag-time revues, all care for your music. Our lives are spent in drunken orgies and parachute descents to escape shelling or Bosch aeroplanes. In fact, the whole thing is unreal, and music is all that we have to help us carry on. I think you know my cousin Sir Henry Miers of Manchester University. He will tell you all about me.

Notes from the allotment

I have just visited the allotment to feed my compost bin and noticed that the water is not draining away at all, in fact it is quite difficult to walk up the far end because the grass path is completely sodden (and impossible to drive up it if you have to unload or have manure delivered, as I learned to my cost).

With all the legalities completed we are now able to make use of the new allotments on the adjoining field; and now comes the hard part - making the area into usable allotments! It too is looking more like a lagoon at the moment, and land drains are to be employed to try to rid the area of excess water. I shall watch with interest.

I recently went on a further Master Composter training day in Oxford put on by Garden Organic, and came away with lots more useful facts and a handful of seed packets, including Salsify and Edible Wild Plant mix! I now have the components of the proposed raised bed for the roots, and will put the salsify in there - I hear it tastes like a mixture of parsnip, potato and artichoke? The wild plant mix includes dandelion so must be treated with caution! Having recently moved house I am

way behind with planting and need to get beans, onions and potatoes going, as well as pepper and tomato seeds, or I will have nothing of my own to eat in the summer. I have managed to plant some broad bean seeds and have covered them with fleece to stop mice getting at them. Fingers crossed...

The covered rhubarb is finally getting going, but slower than that out in the open; I learned a useful fact about the leaves recently (which are poisonous to eat), that it can be used as an insecticide; soak them in a bucket of water until they disintegrate, then strain and spray on plants that are susceptible to greenfly; any poison is completely neutralised before the crops are ready to eat.

Digressing from allotments, a friend in Wales told me a sad story recently about his chickens, which had all been killed by badgers. I've never heard this before, and he actually caught them in the act so there is no mistake. I suppose the lure of a tasty meal was too much to resist and they are after all omnivores. So local chicken owners, beware.
