Upton and Blewbury Methodist Churches. 1826 - 2013

It was a sad day when both Upton and Blewbury Methodist Churches closed on 14 April, but at the same time we (the church members) were glad that our final services were so well supported. The last full service for Upton was on Easter Sunday, a Communion Service led by our minister, Rev Richard Bittleston. It was well supported by regular attendees and visitors to the village, and Upton chapel was completely full for the short service there on Sunday 14th April. Rev Bittleston wanted to emphasise that Blewbury and Upton Methodist churches had

combined 3 years ago to become one church, the Spring Line Church, So we started with a short service in Upton, then many of us walked along the old footpath to continue the service at Blewbury chapel. Members of Blewbury Brass Band volunteered to play at the Blewbury service (very fitting, because one of the founders of the Band was a Methodist local preacher and chapel trustee for 35 years). The chapel was full to overflowing and the singing raised the roof. Richard asked us not to feel sad at the closure of the chapels but to remember everything they had done in the past, in particular revolutionising the Victorian attitude to children's education by building their chapels with a school room. Methodism thrived in Oxfordshire Villages through the two world wars, but times have changed and the number of members has fallen, so we have to accept that it is time to move on. "Even as we let go of these cherished places, God remains with us"

We would like to thank everyone in the community who has used our buildings in the past few years - your financial support enabled us to continue as long as we have.

Parish Council News

Extract from the minutes (available on www.uptonvillage.co.uk):

Clare Lightfoot has stepped down as Clerk to the Parish Council after seven years and has been replaced by Angela Hoy. John Dickens (Chairman) has announced he will be retiring and a councillor vacancy has resulted.

Discussions were ongoing with the Land Agent for the Coffin Way footpath and proposed hedge-planting, and it was noted that Blewbury Parish Council and Sustainable Blewbury were interested in being involved and a joint approach is being considered. The village notice board had been repaired and was about to be reinstated outside the Village Hall, thanks to Ralph True for his work on this.

The financial position of the PC was considered healthy, and included £5000 for the new cycle pump track about to be installed.

A new 30mph VAS sign has now been installed on the west side of the village and road markings refreshed; There had been several recent problems with the new bus service, with buses failing to stop to pick up people or not arriving by the scheduled time. It was suggested that a local minibus service be investigated similar to South Stoke, subsidised by OCC. The aim would be to cover Upton, West Hagbourne and the Astons which were poorly served

at the moment; this would be in addition to the existing Blewbury/ Didcot route but much more frequent. This was not the same as the Dial-a-ride service which provided a service to individual parishioners on demand.

New village hall equipment is needed, such as three electric hand driers. There is a plan to remove the wall between the kitchen and the small adjoining room to give improved storage facilities and install better appliances, for which a £5000 grant was available from the late Theo Gordon's estate.

At Blewbury School there are 153 pupils attending the school and they are planning to get involved in a European Comenius project with Poland, Germany and Italy.

Fr Geoffrey Borrowdale will be leaving the Church benefice. Church services were being well attended and charitable events had been well supported. The PCC had recently held a meeting to discuss raising the profile of St Mary's, including using the Church for concerts and other events. An inter-village tug-of-war was suggested.

It was reported that at the UKAEA Stakeholders Meeting the treatment of the remaining nuclear waste with plans to move it to Sellafield by 2021 were discussed. Outline plans were being submitted to demolish existing UKAEA houses on the site and erect 120 new houses.

Upton Wine Appreciation Society



The Wine Club enjoyed another entertaining evening this month.

The theme this time was pairing cheeses with different wines and with all of the Committee members introducing the wines. All nine of the cheeses were purchased at Grey's in Pangbourne and particular favourites were the Cerne Abbas which was paired with a Chardonnay (Alamos Catena, Mendoza) and the Delice des Cremier (a soft cheese paired with a Pinot noir). The Stinking Bishop cheese had very mixed reviews although the dessert wine (Calcaia Muffa Nobile Dolce Orvieto) with which it was paired was well received. The tawny port which ended the evening seemed a particular hit. On 22 June we will have the annual BBQ and, as places are limited, please book early to avoid disappointment.

Notes from the Allotment

With a new team at the helm, Blewbury Village Gardens Association has launched its brand new section at the allotments. Our friendly farmer has performed miracles on the clay, plots have been marked out and it is now almost ready for planting. I saw a water pipe sticking out of the ground, so I imagine the water supply will not be far behind. Back on the main section, it is a hive of activity, and it is great to see half a dozen cars parked indicating lots of eager gardeners getting stuck in. If the weather would be just a little more accommodating, we could all progress in leaps and bounds.

On my own plot, I have now dug up the last of the leeks (yum, leek and

potato soup) - sadly the celeriac was not worth processing, tiny and slug ridden.... I'm not sure whether I will bother this year. There is still some purple sprouting to be harvested and the perpetual spinach has revived itself after its winter doldrums. So onto the new season! I have FINALLY planted my second early potatoes, what a struggle to get that patch of ground into fit condition; and the bit next to it is so weed strewn that I am going to have to cover it with black plastic so that I will have at least a fighting chance of cultivating it later in the season. Carrots, salsify (weird plants!), broccoli and parsnips are all sprouting in the raised bed, and in the main legume patch, the broad beans are looking really lush, so I had better protect them against whatever pest will take a fancy to them next. I purchased some mange tout from the Blewbury Garden Market and have popped those in, and seem to have a decent crop of red onion sets coming along. The runner bean and climbing French bean trenches are ready for their occupants; I must harden them off before they go outside! I have been given some lovely tomato seedlings, which is just as well as only one of my seeds sprouted; but I am excited about growing cucumbers for the first time - apparently the stem can rot if you put too much water near it, so I am advised that planting them in a bottomless plastic pot and then watering outside the pot area will prevent this happening. Church News: A Challenge



I wish to pose a challenge, not least to myself!

As you will doubtless be aware, over the next 20 years, this area of South

Oxfordshire is due to see significant change. Some 7,000 new homes are due to be built, mostly in and around Didcot. The houses on Great Western Park have already started to be built. In planning circles, the Didcot, Harwell and Culham area is being referred to as Science Vale. It is expected that over 15,000 new jobs will be created in Science Vale over the next 20 years.

How can we ensure that these new communities will be places where human beings can truly flourish? Of course, houses and jobs are great. But houses and jobs are not enough. We need good schools and good health care. We need leisure and cultural facilities, and a sense of community to overcome loneliness and isolation. We will need a working transport infrastructure. Finally, there are issues of social justice, for example the provision of affordable housing.

It is very tempting to ignore these questions. We tell ourselves they are far too complicated to sort out and frankly we are too busy anyway- let others sort them out. But these questions are not trivial. They are about the sort of communities we wish to see in this area in the years ahead. Yes, of course our politicians, civil servants, and planning

consultants are applying their collective minds. But we all have a vital role to play. All our thoughts, insights and concerns need to be fed into the process.

So go on - share your thoughts and concerns with the local councils and with the developers. The more we share, the better our future will be. At this point, you might say to yourself- what has all this to do with Christianity? Everything! Jesus has told us to love God and to love our neighbour. As Christians, God asks us to serve our communities; to champion the cause of the most vulnerable; to challenge injustice; to be peace makers and peace keepers; and to be good stewards of God's wonderful creation.

And so I repeat the challenge, to myself as much as to anyone else: what are we doing to ensure that the new communities being built in our area are places where human beings can truly flourish.
