The Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde

**Watermill Theatre, Bagnor—
Tuesday 28 May 2013**

There were some very last minute worries about whether we would manage to sell all the tickets, and even then somebody didn't make it because of illness. Nevertheless, all drivers arrived in good time and the Watermill worked its usual enchantment - not quite a balmy summer's evening but an enjoyable occasion and an excellent production. (ctd.)

Quite why anyone would want to make Stevenson's horror story funny might be debatable, but the Rhum and Clay Theatre Company (all three of them) worked with Beth Flintoff to create a breath-taking, eye-dazzling and rib-aching show. It was intended as something completely different, and the three talented young actors conjured the essence of a Victorian adventure with colourful costumes and versatile set.

Versatility indeed - one actor played Jekyll-cum-Hyde, the other two played the rest of the cast - friends, servants, townsfolk, victims, with an array of minor costume changes, an enviable variety of accents, and such inventive mime and improvisation it was almost exhausting to watch. We were seated in the front three rows, so could easily appreciate the split-second timing and constant pace of the action. And somehow, despite the undoubted, even slapstick, comic moments, the serious moral commentary on a man giving way to his darker impulses was not shirked. This trio were recommended by the Box Office when I booked the tickets. They are certainly well worth watching.

NOTES FROM THE ALLOTMENT

I confess I felt somewhat hopeless at the state of my allotment after all the weather has thrown at it; what with driving rain, 50 mph gales and very little sun, everything seems to be standing still - when it is not being blown at a strange angle. The weeds, of course, are having a lovely time; after a week away, the grass on my plot was nearly waist high.

The only bright spot is the broad beans, which despite the wind are still standing tall and strong; time to nip out the tops before the black fly take a liking to them, as there is already a goodly amount of flowers starting to set. But I will have to start again with the runners and climbing French beans - although I planted out a healthy looking set of seedlings at the beginning of June, they have nearly all been eaten by slugs or snails, or bashed to pieces by the wind. I thought erecting a mesh screen would help protect them but all that happened was that the wind flailed it against the poor little things.

In the fruit patch, the tayberry that I inherited has really got into its stride and lots of fruit is already setting. The raspberries have also taken off this year, I think they do like a lot of rain and they are looking lush. Even the old gooseberry bushes that I was going to turf out because they were old and full of grass have responded well to a severe hair cut, and are covered in fruit; maybe I will give them another year. New gooseberry, redcurrant and blackcurrant bushes are getting established too.

I read some useful tips about when crops are ripe in my Garden Organic magazine; we are advised to “rootle around the potato haulm” to see if the potatoes are ready (I’m really looking forward to the first new potatoes). Also garlic is ready for pulling when five or more leaves are beginning to turn yellow. Most vegetables are best eaten young and tender, but beetroot can stay in the ground until you are ready for it, and rarely becomes ‘woody’.

I bought a tray of mixed salad leaves including a Cos lettuce; I’ve been picking the outer leaves while waiting for it to heart up, and noticed to my delight that new little clumps of leaves have grown at the base of the detached leaf! Twice the crop!

The veg plot is taking shape, with beans already halfway up their canes, courgettes, tomatoes and squashes are also flowering, and the lettuces, sweet corn, carrots, parsnips and peas are coming along nicely.

We have no meeting in August, and we return on Wednesday 4th September, for "Rare Plants in West Oxfordshire" with Ken Betteridge. The annual show on the 14th September is shaping up well, we are having a "squash" festival this year, with many varieties being grown by village gardeners, and mine are growing in the compost bin, and coming along very nicely thank you.

Rectors Reflections

A Precious Gift Which Costs Nothing

Recently, I've been thinking a lot about a very precious gift - the gift of friendship. Our friendships are so important to us, aren't they?
