Neighbourhood Watch

'Vamoose' burglaries often happen when car keys are left next to an open door or window of a building. In some extreme cases, thieves have put a long stick or fishing rod through letterboxes to hook the car keys and make off with the vehicle. There were two such burglaries locally where high value vehicles were stolen. The owner was in the garden and the offender(s) gained entry to an insecure property via a front door and stole car keys from a handbag in the hallway before stealing the vehicle. In the other, the offender(s) gained entry by unknown means and stole two sets of car keys and took the cars from the driveway.

Advice that can be given to try and prevent a vamoose burglary can include:

- Park your car in a well-lit area - either on your driveway, or on the road under a street lamp, for example.
- Make sure that your vehicle is properly dead-locked and that the alarm is fully activated.
- Lock all car windows and doors.
- Keep your car keys away from any windows and doors to prevent them from being "fished" through letterboxes, or seen from outside to tempt the thief but make sure you know where they are in case of fire

Residents are advised to ensure that all windows and doors are left secure at night and when the property is unattended. Please make sure any house keys are not left in view of windows, doors or letterboxes where they can be easily obtained from the outside of the property and to store keys out of sight especially overnight.

Thames Valley Police are warning local residents after several reports of a credit card phone scam have been received in the Vale of White Horse and the Oxford area.

Residents are being phoned and told that their credit cards have been used fraudulently and asked to phone back on the number on the back of their bank card. However the fraudsters do not hang up so they are still connected and pretend to be the credit card company. Residents are asked various questions including the pin number and are then asked to put the credit card in an envelope which will be picked up by a courier. The cards are then picked up and used fraudulently.

If you receive any suspicious calls do not give out any details especially your PIN number and report to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or if the offender is coming to collect the cards call the police on 101.

Rectors Reflections

Why are there no clocks in Heaven?

What a joy it has been watching the combine harvesters at work on the local fields, gathering in this year's harvest. The yellow straw in the sun, the smell of chaff in the wind, the rough lines of stubble stretching towards the horizon - what a wonderful time of year this is!

It scarcely seems a year since last year's harvest. Soon the familiar cycle will begin again- the children back at school, harvest festivals, Remembrance Sunday, and Christmas before we know it.

All this makes us think of time. I wonder how you tend to think of time? More often than not, we tend to think of it in strictly numerical terms- so many seconds, so many hours, so many days, so many years. But there's much more to time than merely numbers. Time is also about feelings and experiences. If we are over the moon about something, an hour can rush past in what seems like a moment. In other situations, a short time as measured by the clock can seem an eternity.

We can also worry that somehow time is like a bucket filled with a set number of pebbles. Every day or every year represents one pebble. As the day or year goes past, one more pebble is taken out of the bucket. Eventually, there will be no more pebbles left to take out of the bucket- and that is when we die.

But there are other ways of looking at time. The Bible certainly includes the view of time as a series of

numerical units. But it also includes the view of time as something about the quality of our experience and how we live our life. Jesus spoke about the gift of "eternal life". By this he didn't mean life that would go on and on and on in a numerical sense. He meant life that was so satisfying and rich and beautiful and deep that it seems to break out of the narrow straightjacket of minutes, hours, days and years. "Eternal life" is life transfigured by God's life, human life in which God's love and joy and peace shines through. God's gift of "eternal life" is something which we can experience, in part, in this life. But we shall only know it in all its fullness in the life to come.

And this is why there will be no need of clocks in Heaven!

Extracts from Upton Parish Council July meeting

Footpath and Cycle path to

Blewbury: The upgrading of the existing footpath to include cyclists has been a subject of debate in Blewbury and Upton for the past 20 years and both councils would like to see progress. Discussions will take place with a Blewbury resident who has done some previous research. Sustrans (Sustainable Transport) have advised there is no money forthcoming. Chris Kauntz (landowner), had offered a strip of land alongside the A417 as a cycle way but this had been rejected as being too dangerous for children and only goes up to the White House on the Upton boundary. Since the most recent approach to the landowners (2011/12) two sections of land had changed hands and it was thought worth investigating whether the new owners might be more favourably inclined. The path was discussed in the most recent Upton Parish Plan and given priority in the list of Aims. It was noted that there was considerable enthusiasm for the path to be upgraded and many local residents stated they would use it on a regular basis for walking, pushchairs and cycles if the surface was more even and better maintained. The potential problem of motorcycles using it was not considered significant. It was suggested that it could be upgraded to a bridleway, which would open its use to horses as well as cycles. After discussion, it was suggested that a joint meeting of both parish councils as well as the local landowners should be convened.

Parish Plan: Ben Shaw had agreed to review at the most recent Plan and suggest what still needed to be achieved. It was suggested that a list of achievements could be circulated via the Upton News, asking the population what they felt was needed.

Planning: P13/V1019HH - The Gatehouse, Reading Road, renewal of planning permission PO4/V0708, proposed extensions and adaptation of existing house. The plans having been previously circulated were discussed and it was noted that the plans had been changed extensively since the original application.

A letter was received from a resident regarding overgrown brambles and hedges in Upper Stream Road, requesting the council to take remedial action with the owners of the properties.

Village Hall committee are keen to purchase hand dryers for the toilets and requested the PC to purchase these, which could be paid for by fund raising. £2000 has been set aside towards improvements to the kitchen. Uptonogood had given a donation of £2000.

Winter preparedness - we still have more than adequate supplies of salt in the garage.

Chatsworth Buccaneers FC, Didcot, have requested to use the recreation ground for Sunday morning football.
