Parish Council News

We are very pleased to advise that the hardcopy distribution of the *Upton News* has been secured, with UPC agreeing to support printing cost going forward.

This will ensure that all those that wish to receive a printed copy through their door will continue to do so. We would like to thank Sarah Sayers for her two years as Editor, and Brian Rippon for volunteering to take on the role. We would also like to take the opportunity to thank those volunteers who distribute *Upton News*.

Following proposals submitted by Mr Mike Tibbetts, a sub-committee has been established to look at siting a permanent all weather table tennis table in the recreation ground. Funding for the project has been secured from the monies raised by the "Uptonogood?" Mountain Bike Challenge.

It's all been quiet on the planning front, however we have been informed that Mr Leslie Wells has now launched an appeal to the Secretary of State concerning the stable block behind the George and Dragon, on which the Vale of White Horse District Council has placed an enforcement order to demolish.

Parish Council News ctd...

The A34 interchange at Chiltern is to be enhanced with the addition of northern access and exit slips. Funding is now in place and work is expected to start within 18 months. The work will replace a previous scheme that would have seen a new road built from the Kingswell Hotel to the Harwell Science Campus. Improvements are also to be made to the Milton Interchange.

A consultation is currently underway on home to school transport provision. This could result to the loss of the Upton to Blewbury school bus service that was established when Upton lost its own school. Please see www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/consultation for details and to have your say.

Your local PCSO Mike Clayden (michael.clayden@thamesvalley.pnn.police.uk) is currently running a campaign to help prevent burglaries by simply giving the impression that somebody is home. Simply leaving a light or radio on when you're out, could make all the difference to you becoming a victim of crime. He has also advised on the existence of "SmartWater" that can be applied to properly to help retrieval should it be stolen. A kit costs £15 and can be used to invisibly mark and identify innumerable items. Please contact Mike directly on these or any other police matters.

From our PCSO

Hello, since my last update I'm sure village residents have now seen the 'Bright Idea' posters that I have been putting out recently posted around the village. Indeed, I have noticed there seems to be more homes with lights on in the evenings so I'm really pleased that residents are taking our advice and making their homes a little safer. Another good tip is to not leaving any Xmas parcels and presents on show in your living rooms as unfortunately at this time of year there are thefts from dwellings where presents have been stolen. Obviously this can have a devastating effect on a family who have saved hard to give their families special gifts for Christmas. On 18th November I attended the Upton Parish Council meeting and gave my area beat officer's report to the parish council members and attendees, details of which can be found on the minutes of the meeting on the village website.

Road closures are a headache as we all know and there have been a fair number in the area recently. One such closure was the Milton Interchange on 26th November, which was attended by a number of PCSO's including myself and roads policing officers.

The north bound A34 had been closed due to a serious accident involving a HGV. The Road was closed for a number of hours and this caused severe delays in the area. We would like to remind drivers to be patient at these difficult times and to be aware that

on these occasions officers on road closures may not necessarily have area knowledge when asked for directions.

Officers are there primarily to control traffic flow and keep vehicles moving if and when possible. Drivers stopping on a busy carriageway to ask for directions are putting themselves and other drivers at risk of an accident as well as causing further delays to the congested area. If you are lost, seek a safe place to pull over, e.g. service station, a lay-by or nearby village. Stay calm and check your map, Sat-Nav or ask someone for directions who may have local knowledge. Or as they say on the telly-"phone a friend". Personally, I don't believe anyone ever gets lost. We might lose our way from time to time but inevitably we do get home, though somewhat later than expected. So on that note, I would like wish you all a merry Christmas and a happy safe new year.

Wines for Christmas presented by the Oxford Wine Company

The original Oxford Wine Company was founded in 1840 and traded from 125 High Street, Oxford until 1914. The name metamorphosed from The Oxford Hamper Company through The Oxford Wine And Hamper Company and finally to The Oxford Wine Company in the spring of 1992.

Our evening began with four whites: a sparkling from California by the Roederer Family (£19.99), a nice alternative to champagne on Christmas morning.

This was followed by white wine from France, a Touraine Sauvignon Blanc (£9.99) and a South African Delheim Gewurztraminer (£13.99).

The reds began with a Morandé Pionero Pinot Noir (£8.99), a lovely Burgundy alternative from Chile. However, this was topped by a full bodied Trapiche Cabernet Franc, a superb red from Argentina. Italy came on the scene next with a Terredora Aglianico (£13.99) from the south, and the evening was completed with a delicious dessert option in the form of Nectar Pedro Ximenez (£14.65).

Upton Village Hall—help required

As a newly appointed trustee and committee member of the Village Hall Amenities Trust, I'm keen to do my bit to make our hall something of which every villager can be truly proud.

The trustees recently established a sub-committee which Jacqui Reid and I are chairing, tasked with the renovation of the kitchen, and we are already working on that project. We are delighted to have the support and expertise of four non-members of the main committee (Ben Amos, John Haworth, Lucy Mason and Derek Vokins), a principle which the trustees would like to encourage. The team will be consulting with all the regular users of the hall as well as the village at large as to what they think we should incorporate in the redevelopment, and we will be keeping you up to date with plans, news on fundraising etc.

The kitchen is just one area where refurbishment and development is required - there are many more aspects of the hall which need updating either to meet present day expectation levels, or to improve the amenity in terms of appearance, comfort or energy efficiency. Not only do we need to do so for the benefit of the village, but also in order to offer a competitive product

to external hirers who have an ever-increasing range and quality of halls to choose from.

Development requires funding, and as well as the grants for which we will be applying, we will need to review our pricing policy in order to raise revenues.

Our hire prices have failed to keep pace with inflation, let alone energy prices. An immediate task for the committee is therefore to hold a pricing review, and we are looking for assistance. Our research has resulted in a lot of data which needs to be analysed by a panel of 'business minds' with the objective of formulating a new policy. The tasks will include competitive pricing, pricing structures, booking policy, potential effect on revenue, evaluation of risk etc. Would you be interested in helping? If you are please contact one of the trustees. Finally, the UVHAT committee is looking for a new Treasurer to replace Ros Caffyn who is standing down in March as the result of work and family pressures. Would you be willing to do this job, ideally as a trustee but possibly as an external role? The task would clearly best suit someone with accounting or book-keeping skills.

Recipe of the Month

Chocolate, Cranberry and Macadamia Brownies

Ingredients:

- 150g dark chocolate, broken into chunks
- 200g butter
- 200g soft brown sugar
- 150g self-raising flour (or gluten free self-raising flour)
- 40g cocoa powder, sifted
- 3 large eggs, beaten
- 50g dried cranberries
- 100g macadamia nuts
- 60g cranberry sauce

Method:

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4 and line a 20x20cm baking tin with

baking parchment. Melt the dark chocolate with the butter in the microwave or in a heatproof bowl over just simmering water.

Mix together the sugar, flour and cocoa powder and stir in the melted chocolate and butter mixture, followed by the eggs. Stir through the dried cranberries and macadamia nuts, then swirl through the cranberry sauce.

Pour into the tin and smooth the surface. Bake for 25-30 mins. Allow to cool before slicing.

Didcot Station

Redevelopment of adjacent land?

A public exhibition of proposals for the redevelopment of land located opposite the entrance to Didcot Parkway Station was held at the end of November.

The proposal includes the provision of a new public square south of Station Road, opposite the entrance to Didcot Parkway Station, traffic calming on Station Road and a small public space to the north of the

former Jet garage. It comprises a mixed use development including a hotel, serviced apartments, offices, retail, restaurant, a children's nursery and residential units including apartments and houses – together with associated car parking, including a multi storey to the north of Station Road, and servicing arrangements.

Note from the Allotment

November has lived up to its reputation, with a lot of misty, dank and dismal days, but on the other hand, not very cold so far; however, I gather we are in for a sharp frost next week and possibly even snow on the high ground - ah well, it will crisp up the sprouts!

These are starting to look really sprout-like now, and to encourage them to bulk up it's a good idea to cut off their top-knots, which make very good eating as healthy steamed greens. Also on the brassica front, I've been pleased that cutting a cross in the stump of my summer cabbages has had the desired effect, with a little wreath of fresh leaves growing; they won't stand the frost though so I'd better whip them off. I may also lose the late-sown Savoys, but will attempt to prolong their growing season with some fleece, which may help. The sprouting calabrese is still soldiering on, I think I have had several months of meals out of them, I shall definitely grow them again. I've now sown some broad beans, as deep as I could get my dibber to try and thwart the mice and frost; hopefully they will survive the winter and give me an early crop next year. In addition to the onion sets already planted, I've done a tray of the smaller sets in my small insulated greenhouse, for planting out in the Spring as well.

I eventually harvested half a small sack of Maris Piper potatoes, grown from some sprouting spuds in my kitchen cupboard! Waste not want not...

I'm amazed how long the raspberries are hanging on, still fruiting despite the darker days, but I daresay the next frost will do for them, at which time the fruiting canes can be cut down to the ground. I've only just taken out my runner bean foliage, and chopped it up into little pieces so it will compost down quicker. There were the inevitable few remaining beans hanging onto the vine, so I've managed to save a good handful of jumbo size seeds to take into next year.

It's time to gather up fallen leaves from the allotment (where there are trees); if you haven't got a dedicated leaf pile, heaping them around fruit bushes will help to keep the weeds down and they can be allowed to rot in situ.

Rectors Reflections

A Gift at Christmas Time

I am about to suggest that you give a particular gift at this coming Christmas time - and that you give the gift to yourself!

In case you're worried about the bank balance, don't worry, the gift costs nothing. You don't have to go a particular website, or visit a particular store. And, in case you're wondering, I don't get any commission!

You'll be pleased to learn that the gift is delivered to you in person, but you've got to be in the right place to receive it. You can receive it if you go somewhere quiet, and simply wait, with open mind and open heart. Listen to the sounds around you, feel the air filling your chest as you breathe in and out, slowly and deeply.

The gift is the gift of stillness, a stillness that connects us with all that is profoundly true about ourselves and our world. We spend so much of our time rushing around that days, weeks, months can pass us by without any experience of stillness in our lives. We feel that God is a million miles away and couldn't care less about our lives. But how can God get a word in edgways, amidst all our frantic busyness?

A time of stillness allows God to give us the gift of ourselves - the gift of our true selves. And in giving us the

gift of ourselves, God also gives us the gift of Himself. "Be still and know that I am God"- these were the words of an ancient poet, writing one of the psalms over two thousand years ago.

Some two hundred years ago, a poet by the name of Joseph Mohr wrote words which continue the same theme, words which, in their English translation, have become an essential part of Christmas for millions of men and women around the world.

*Silent night, holy night,
All is calm, all is bright,
Round yon virgin mother and child,
Holy infant so tender and mild,
Sleep in heavenly peace,
Sleep in heavenly peace.*

*Silent night, holy night,
Son of God, love's pure light,
Radiant beams from thy holy face,
With the dawn of redeeming grace,
Jesus, Lord, at thy birth,
Jesus, Lord at thy birth.*

May we all know the gift of stillness this Christmastime, and may God speak to us in that stillness of His great love, of His mercy and His tenderness to us and to all humankind.
