December 2013 brought tragic events to the village of Upton with the case of the missing teenager Jayden Parkinson.

As events unfolded, focus was quickly moved to Upton and it became necessary for the Police and its search teams to move into the village and set up an operations point near the church. This story has no happy ending, as we know that tragically Jayden's body was eventually discovered at a location in Didcot. During the time the Police were in Upton there were many officers present along with Police vehicles. I myself along with other PCSO's from Milton Park and other stations were placed on reassurance patrols in the village.

I have to say I was struck by the patience, understanding and compassion that was shown by villagers that we met on our patrols. During this sad time, the residents of Upton behaved impeccably and offered their help to the police on many occasions.

Thames Valley Police would like to thank all members of the public who offered to help or gave their support in the search for Jayden Parkinson.

NOTES FROM THE ALLOTMENT

Everything plant-wise has slowed down; true, the onion sets have sprouted, but are not looking very vigorous. No sign of the garlic, nor the broad beans - mind, I did plant them about half a mile down. The leeks are still spindly, I think I put them in far too late; however, they will still make good soup and stews. Other than that, it is brassicas all the way! I'm just waiting for a frost to sweeten up the sprouts, the calabrese is still soldiering but nearly finished now, and the half a dozen savoy cabbages are still growing on nicely, so that's a bonus. If your family can't abide sprouts, try cutting them in half and stir-frying them with some lardons of bacon - they are a different vegetable when still crunchy and don't have that sulphurous whiff that you get with prolonged boiling.

I tried celery for the first time this year and obviously did it completely wrong; I dug the trench and put in the seedlings but then neglected to wrap them in newspaper or cardboard to blanch them and earth up. It would appear that I had more plants than I suspected, because when I dug up a vigorous looking clump there were about 6-8 plantlets in the bunch when there should have been one! And because it is not blanched, the stems are rather bitter which is a shame. However, they are still ok in small batches for flavouring the aforementioned soups and stews. I shall try again, because it is a vegetable that I buy on a regular basis, so worth persevering.

Rural home-owners with oil-fired heating systems are being urged to be aware of oil thieves this winter.

In recent years oil thefts have increased due to exceptionally harsh winters and higher fuel prices.

The trend is expected to continue during the colder, darker months of January and February with the number of thefts increasing as home-owners replenish their tanks.

The Oil Firing Technical Association (OFTEC) - the body representing the oil heating and cooking industry - is urging home-owners to take precautions to protect their fuel oil.

The post-Christmas period, with people feeling the pinch after the festive season, made the early new year a popular time for thieves to strike.

Have you thought of becoming a Parish Path Warden?

Do you like walking in your local area? If so you probably know your paths well, and know also when they are not quite as they should be.

Oxfordshire Ramblers, supported by OCC Countryside Access, are setting up a network of Parish Paths Wardens to monitor, look after, and to report any problems. Many Path Wardens work with their parish council and solve issues together. This is how one Path Warden sees the role:

'I like being a path warden because you can choose your days and times, you don't have to liaise with anyone, you've got the specific task of making sure the paths are clear and passable for everyone... what better on a sunny day than to wander down the country paths pruning here and there, and noting deteriorated stiles or fallen trees to report on later... all the while seeing and hearing the peace of the

English countryside around you.

You have to be able to follow a map - to know where the rights of way are and which are 'yours' - and you have to feed back occasional reports on your 'patch' so that this can be collated and sent on to Countryside Services of the County Council who have the statutory responsibility. You might take your responsibilities further and liaise with landowners and councils.

But most of the time you're on your own, or in my case, with my dog, going at your own pace and enjoying the beauty of nature while doing something essential for all users of paths.'
