The Parish Council meets every two months. In between our regular meetings we have to arrange ad hoc extraordinary meetings in order to discuss planning applications. Our response to planning applications has to be made within two weeks of receipt. A notice is always posted on the main village noticeboard by the bus shelter and generally the applicant and neighbours are notified. It is not always possible to post a notice on the web due to time constraints. Please keep an eye on the noticeboard.

The following planning applications have been discussed at recent extraordinary Parish Council meetings:

P12/V0759 - conversion of former milking parlour and redundant farm building into stables and groom's accommodation. Applicant Mr H Bucknell. The PC had no objection to this application.

P12/V0566: proposal for temporary planning application for mobile home at Sine Nominee (to be on site for 6 months). Applicant Mrs K Fletcher. The PC had no objection to this application.

P12/V0682 - erection of an agricultural building for the storage of hay and straw at Inghams Farm, West Hagbourne. An extraordinary PC meeting is being held on Tuesday 1st May to discuss this application. Clare Lightfoot

Blewbury School Ofsted visit

On 6 March, with only two days' notice, the inspectors arrived to complete a full inspection of the school. The picture of the school the inspectors formed is best reflected in their own words:

"This is a good school because pupils, including those who are disabled or have special educational needs, achieve well and make good progress."

"Teachers typically have high expectations even for younger pupils, who are expected to work and move to different tasks independently."

"Teachers know the needs of pupils well because of good assessment and the effective tracking of pupils."

The inspectors were clearly impressed by the themed approach the school uses when delivering the curriculum, as well as the international links and the wide range of extra curricular activities available.

Ms Mills (Headmistress) and her staff clearly walk the knife edge of making the school rigorous in its pursuit of academic success whilst providing a broad experience in a happy environment. To do this takes huge commitment, skill and endless energy, for which I thank them all.

Closure of the Spring Line Methodist Church

Worship will end at both Blewbury and Upton Methodist Churches Easter 2013.

It may seem very early to make this decision public, but closure of a church takes a long time. This decision was taken by the Spring Line members at their February Church Council Meeting, and was approved by the Methodist Circuit (South Oxfordshire group of Methodist churches) meeting in mid-March, so it is now official. As you can imagine this has not been an easy decision and there are many heavy hearts. We are very clear, however, that sometimes being faithful means moving on and what has served well in the past is not necessarily right in the present.

There are two reasons for making the decision to close both churches: the number of regular worshipers at our Upton Centre is low, and in spite of support from the Community the Spring Line Church is not financially viable and we would need to ask for financial support from the Methodist Church if we carry on beyond spring 2013, and this did not seem right, so



we have decided to move on and to support other churches. The next 12 months will enable us to make all the preparations we need for the change, practically, emotionally and spiritually.

We would like to thank the Community for responding to our plea for more Community Use over the last 12 months, and hope you will continue to use our buildings until the closure date. The actual process of closing the church and decisions about the future of the two buildings is undertaken by the Wantage and Abingdon Circuit, not by Spring Line Church members.

Rectors Reflections

Eight Flying Elephants

Yes, you have read the title correctly - eight flying elephants! I met them the other day. They're in Wickham church, a few miles from Newbury. I popped in to have a look around, and there they were suspended from the roof beams in the north aisle. In case you were wondering, they're made from papier maché. The story goes that a Victorian gentleman saw 4 of them at an Exhibition in Paris, and thought they would look rather good adorning the roof of Wickham church. So he acquired them, ordered 4 more, and there they have remained ever since.

I wonder when you last experienced a surprise? The world is actually full of surprises, but often we close our eyes and our minds to the possibility of the totally unexpected. We tend to want to live our lives according to our own agenda, our own set plans. "Being religious" is a lot about allowing God to surprise us with new glimpses of His love, His joy, and His peace. We might well value a particular religious routine - perhaps saying prayers in a particular way or going to a particular sort of church service. But this religious routine can sometimes get in the way of being open to the good surprises which God has in store for us in our lives. We need to season the routine with the unexpected.

Many good and holy people looked at Jesus and felt that his life and teaching was a surprise too far they had their religious routine, and they preferred to stay with what they knew. But there was an even greater surprise in store - Jesus' coming back to life after he had been killed on the Cross. To think that God could actually bring back to a life a man who had died - why, that would be like thinking that you could wander into a little church in Berkshire and see elephants flying in the roof!

Jesus challenged assumptions, and especially the assumptions of religious people. It is the same today. Jesus continues to challenges our assumptions, to encourage our minds to be open to what God, in His great love and goodness, might have in store for us and our world. I wonder what good thing God has in store for us in the weeks and months that lie ahead?
