Inside this issue...

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Faster Broadband Latest

Representatives from the local villages met with BT on 1 December to discuss how and when broadband speeds would improve as a result of winning BT's Race to Infinity.

The overall effect will be to make 90% of lines in the Blewbury exchange area capable of speeds of 15Mbit/s or more, with the remaining 10% capable of 2 to 15 Mbit/s. This means that everyone will be able to upgrade to services delivering speeds at least three times faster than what they're getting today.

Fibre to the Cabinet (FTTC) will take fibre to Upton, and then use existing copper connections to reach individual properties. This will provide most of Upton with the range of faster speeds mentioned above. If you're lucky, you could get up to 40 Mbit/s initially and up to 80 Mbit/s in the not-too-distant future.

The technical work on the FTTC cabinets should be completed between the end of December and early March, with Upton probably the first to go live. As soon as your cabinet goes live, you will be able to order your new fibre-based broadband service.

Rectors Reflections

Well, it's that time of year again. Carols, mince pies, nativity plays, and so much more besides. Once more we will hear the story of the birth of Jesus, and picture Mary and Joseph, with the baby Jesus, surrounded by shepherds, and with the Wise Men kneeling in adoration.

I wonder what we really think of the familiar story of the birth of Jesus? Do we really think that Jesus was born of a Virgin - or do we think that this is simply another one of those beautiful Christmas fairy stories?

It might interest you to know that some Christians believe that there was, in fact, never anything particularly unusual about the birth of Jesus. Like the rest of us, he had a real live father (Joseph), a real live mother (Mary), and a real live pregnancy. Jesus was a human being, just like you and I. He was also so intimately connected with God that he was not only a human being - he was God as well. This is what matters - in Jesus, God showed that he loved us human beings so much that he was prepared to become one of us.

Just because Jesus was - and is - God, doesn't mean that he had to come into this world in a way which was different from the rest of us. It is true that some of the early Christians had other ideas, in part because of their ambivalence towards sexual intercourse. In such a climate, many thoughtful Christians would have assumed that sexual intercourse could not possibly have been involved in Jesus' coming on to the scene. But that was 2000 years ago, and people understand things differently nowadays.

Others Christians have felt that the evidence clearly points to there being something very unusual about the birth of Jesus - the absence of a father. The early tradition is clear that Jesus had a mum, called Mary (actually, Miriam, the Hebrew form of the name we know as Mary). But the same early tradition also suggests that Joseph was never really Jesus' dad - at best, Joseph was Jesus' step-dad. Ah well, you say, clearly the identity of Jesus' real dad was kept secret! The problem with this hypothesis is that there were lots of people around who had an interest in destroying Jesus' credibility, and they were willing to fling whatever dirt they could find - but none of them were ever able to come up with the identity of Jesus' "real" dad.

And so we come face to face with the possibility of a miracle. Jesus rising again from the dead was a miracle - the miracle of miracles. Why might his birth have not also been miraculous? Jesus was unique - a man with a uniquely intimate relationship with God. There was

never a man quite like him before; and there has never been a man quite like him since. As Jesus was and is unique, there is nothing illogical in believing that the circumstances of his birth were also unique.

At its heart, the question of the Virgin Birth is a question about ourselves, and the way we look on the world. Are we so sure of ourselves that we can say with confidence what happened to a particular Jewish woman some 2000 years ago? Fortunately God's loving action in our lives and in our world is not limited to what we might think is possible. Thank God!

December

At the beginning of October - it looked like a severe winter was on the way, however, I see the ladybirds are still out and about. If they have not hibernated below or at ground level, it isn't going to be a hard winter. If they are in crevices about 3 ft (1m) above ground then it's going to be a mild winter, but take care not to disturb them. When should they hibernate to indicate a hard winter is a mystery, but they will be on ground level or below. The ladybird was traditionally a predictor of the harvest, according to the number of the spots on the ladybird - the harvest was going to be good or poor.



Aside from the ladybird - December is a month of superstitions. Burn a Yule log on Christmas Eve for a year of good luck. There are always problems associated with December. On occasions when the weather is mild in late December, the birds feel the need to build nests and mate and then the January wet and damp or the February frost wipes them all out. If the blackbird sings before Christmas, she will cry before Candlemas. The new moon is on Christmas Eve this year - a dark Christmas and a heavy wheatsheaf - so it should be a good growing year next year. One item to watch for is the old adage 'Christmas meadows green - Easter meadows white', implying that if it's mild at Christmas, there will be heavy frosts at Easter time.

Recipe of the Month

Christmas Dried Fruit Compote

(serves 8)

This Delia Smith recipe is, if you like, all the Christmas pudding flavours without the pudding. It is light, fragrant and very fruity. Serve it well chilled with some lightly whipped cream or better still with cinnamon or vanilla ice cream and some macaroons.

I sampled this pudd and it is delicious with many different flavours and would be perfect after a large portion of turkey & stuffing!

4oz (110g) no soak dried apricots
4oz (110g) no soak dried figs, halved
4oz (110g) no soak prunes
4oz (110g) raisins
2 oranges
10fl oz (275ml) cold water
12 fl oz (350ml) tawny port
To serve: 2oz (50g) sliced almonds, lightly toasted

Rinse the apricots, figs and prunes under cold, running water, then place them in a large saucepan. Next scrub one of the oranges, slice it into very thin rounds, and cut each round into four. Add these, together with the raisins, to the rest of the fruit in the pan, pour in the cold water and simmer (covered) for 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, squeeze the juice from the other orange and when the fruit is cooked, stir in the orange juice and the port.

Leave the compote to cool, and before serving chill in the fridge for 24 hours so all the flavours can develop.

Serve sprinkled with toasted nuts.

Policing Update

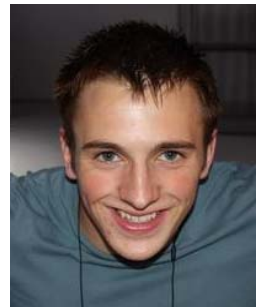
Warnings are given to anyone who hires a skip to watch out for theft of contents -thieves remove items of scrap metal from your skip, strip the valuable scrap metal then fly tips what is not needed.

Home security - By using plug in timer switches and eco friendly light bulbs in the house, you can convince any potential burglar that you are home. Timers on lamps are great, don't just have the hall light switched on when you're out, and have the lamps switching on in various rooms like the bedroom, lounge or kitchen, at different times. Don't limit the use of lights to evenings; it is often dark enough during a winter's afternoon. A plug in timer for the radio would make a sound as if someone was home, tune the station which has more talking than music. Plug in timers are available from most supermarkets or DIY stores.

Upton Wine Appreciation

Kevin Jacklin presented wines of Argentina and opened the evening with a question - 'which country drinks the most wine per head?' No not France nor Australia or even the Scots - it is the Vatican City, maybe all the left over communion wine!

He started the evening with a Torrontes, made by Michael Torino from the Calchaqui Valley, Salta, available from Majestic at £5.99 - a bargain and very nice. The Torrontes grape is the white signature grape of Argentina, producing aromatic perfumed spicy wines of which this is a good example.

The Catena Chardonnay, produced in Mendoza, with high altitude surroundings at the base of the Andes that help produce this very quaffable wine. Nicolas Catena the wine producer was voted *Decanter* Man of the Year 2009, the first



person from South America to win the crown. I personally enjoyed this wine as I quite like oak but it may not be to everyone's taste although all appeared to enjoy on the night. A little more expensive at £9.95 from the Wine Society.

The reds were equally as interesting, providing strong flavours with good prices. The Cabernet Sauvignon/ Bonarda, produced in the Famantina Valley, the grapes are organic and produced by small growers who have formed a co-operative, helping to provide much needed enterprise to the small village of Tilimuqui, who also benefit from the fair trade initiative. Price £6.99 at Waitrose.

The Las Moras Eduardo Casademont, from Mendoza Supplier Naked Wines was the most expensive on the night at £17.99, this was a great wine, absolutely gorgeous, I could have carried on all night drinking this, but alas we get thrown out at 10pm. You can apply for discount to get a third off the wine at Naked Wines, so at £11.90 it was not such a deal breaker.

Next meeting 7th December - Fiona and William Betts on Sparkling wines and Dessert wines.
