Parish Council News

As a result of the cold and snowy winters we have had the past few years, the Parish Council has taken up an offer from the local authority for a free tonne of salt. This will be stored in the garage building on the recreation field and may be used to refill existing salt bins or apply to road surfaces directly. To aid this we have also purchased a small hand propelled spreader.

It is not the intention of the Parish Council to take on the responsibility of salting roads. However we wish it to be known that both salt and the means to spread it are available to any individual in the village who would like to use it to salt public roads during icy or snowy conditions. Heather and I had 6 dogs stolen from our kennel in Upton on Tuesday 27 December at 3.40pm whilst I was returning from a walk with other dogs. I witnessed the theft but was too far away to prevent it happening.

One of the dogs turned up on our doorstep at 10.00pm that night and the next day the police returned one in the afternoon who they found tied up outside a caravan on a travellers site in Tadley near Basingstoke. Another was returned that night having been found wandering in the same area and taken to the police station.

Friends set up a Facebook page called Missing Tibetan Spaniels which now has over 2300 members all over the world which provided many ideas to follow up. The Thames Valley police together with Dog Lost and Dog Watch Alert have been amazing and as a result of everyone's efforts two more were found in the same area on 6 January. We now have just one 8 month old puppy bitch missing, Alice who is red with a white chest and a white ruff.

All our dogs were micro-chipped so we would advise all dog owners to have this done whatever the age of your dog as well as having an up to date photo as these help so much in the recovery of lost dogs.

A New Year's Resolution

You've probably already thought about your New Year resolution, but in case you haven't, may I suggest one? The resolution is quite simple - to take a daily walk. Nothing very exciting about that, you may well say. But why have I suggested this? Well, of course, to start with, a bit of gentle physical exercise every day does us the world of good. But there's more to it than that. A walk is a great opportunity, in the midst of our busy lives, to find the space for some quality time with God. It might be that we walk with friends, or alone. In course of our walk, we might notice something beautiful, or meet someone we never expected to meet. We might meet no one at all,

but somehow the process of walking has helped us to feel more at peace with ourselves and with the world.

The Bible is full of references to walking- sometimes these refer to a literal walk, and sometimes to a figurative walk. The Bible uses the metaphor of a walk in two main ways. The first way refers to how we interact with another person - how we "walk with them". The second is a way about speaking about a lifestyle. When we go on a walk, we choose to go in a particular direction. Similarly, we choose how we are going to live our lives, the goal we're aiming at - it might be the goal of helping someone else, or it might be the goal of pursuing our own selfish advantage.

The earliest reference to walking in the Bible is a reference to God Himself. The author of Genesis pictures God “walking” in the Garden of Eden in the cool of the day. God later promises to His people, that he will “walk among them and be their God - a promise fulfilled in the life of Jesus. There is a wonderful story about Jesus meeting two disciples on a walk from Jerusalem to Emmaus - but the

disciples don't recognise him until the very end of the story!

Sometimes we think we're walking through life alone. But we never walk alone, because God is always there with us. We might not recognise him, or even notice him. But he is there, our companion and friend, walking beside us through the good times and the bad.

Since the news of the cuts, the Board of Directors has been assessing new ways of working and have decided in order to ensure a sustainable future for the company, OTC will be taking a break and will not be touring next year. During this time a restructure will be planned to work through other sources of funding and hope to have a decision by early summer 2012.

January & February

February is the last winter month, and the adage 'ring around the moon - snow soon' is the one to watch. Just after Christmas the adage was "as the day gets longer - the cold gets stronger". However, the frost hurts no weeds. The winter months are also the ploughing months, and it should be finished before April, as anyone ploughing after this was considered in a very derogatory fashion. Plough Monday was the first Monday after Epiphany when ploughing resumed after the Christmas break. However, most of the ploughing is now done in the autumn. The ploughmen always considered themselves "boys" and there were various songs relating to the poor ploughboys working in storm and tempest. December, January and February are usually associated with wind, rain and snow. Many of the sayings associated with clouds are from these months. They apply ashore as well as at sea. Willow wisps and mares tails (high cirrus clouds) - tall ships shorten sails. The "Hadley" cell of strong

winds in the stratosphere are reflected in strong winds on the surface, frequently in the opposite direction. The high cirrus was a starting feature for the warm front.

The end of December usually brought the end of "winter blues" - also known as seasonal affective disorder (SAD) - a winter phenomenon. The summer equivalent doesn't exist, but "it never rains but it pours" comes from getting depressed in damp and dark rainy days. The winter activities in the drying barns, or blacksmith forge were also places to generate country lore, certainly about drying barley. There are some relating to fires, - "sunshine puts out a fire", if a fire is hard to start - cold heart, and a fire crackling is said to be walking with snow. Now is the season for "a wise man to carry his cloak - and a fool to want his". If you follow the weather on 27 February - the 12 hours can be divided into 12 months, and that is how the year's weather will pan out. However, I've never found it to be that accurate.

Feeding the birds

At this time of year, put out food and water on a regular basis. In severe weather, feed twice daily if you can: in the morning and in the early afternoon.



Birds require high energy (high fat) foods during the cold winter weather to maintain their fat reserves to survive the frosty nights. Use only good quality food and scraps.

Always adjust the quantity given to the demand, and never allow uneaten foods to accumulate around the feeders. Once you establish a feeding routine, try not to change it as the birds will become used to it and time their visits to your garden accordingly.

Big Garden Birdwatch

The Big Garden Birdwatch takes place at the end of January - it's easy to take part in, and your results will really help the RSPB.

All you need is a pen, a printout of the bird ID sheet reproduced in *Upton News*, and an hour to spend watching the birds in your garden, or local park, on either Saturday 28, or Sunday 29 January 2012.

Simply make a note of the highest number of each bird species seen on the ground (not flying over) at any one time, then visit www.rspb.org.uk/birdwatch to report what you saw.

Pierre Victoire has the style of a typical brasserie and is the antidote to the large chains which dominate the high street restaurants.

LEAF Funding

(Local Energy Assessment Fund)

The government has just announced a £10 million funding pot which is open to community groups and parish councils but needs to be spent by 31st March 2012.

The fund is designed to help communities to accelerate their activity on energy and climate change. It can pay for energy surveys of buildings, energy saving demonstration projects (exemplar homes or community spaces), workshops to help local people take action to save energy, reports on what more needs to be done in your area (in the way of energy efficiency), engagement events ahead of the above studies to generate interest. Where the above has already been done the funding may be able to facilitate: area-wide renewable energy studies (to see what would work), feasibility studies into specific renewable energy projects.

The money is not available for installing technologies which would benefit from Feed in Tariffs or the Renewable Heat Incentive, but could be used for studies into whether those technologies would be suitable.

Upton Wine Appreciation

Sherry and Italian wines

John Scarborough has now developed remarkable skills in providing us with an appealing range of tastes from the Sherry world. The first was actually not a sherry but a marsala, a Pellegrino Marsala Superiore DOC Denominazione di Origine Controllata, available from Waitrose £7.75 18%. This is an alluring drink, light but complex at the same time, useful in cooking and can be used as a dessert wine. The grapes Grillo Catarratto are harvested in September, aged for at least 2 years in oak casks and refined for at least 4 months in the bottle and then over to us.

The Hidalgo Pedro Ximenez Viejo 'Napoleon' Sherry - £12.99 Majestic 17% was a real revelation and a taste that I feel was quite unique and a wonderful find. This sherry appears almost black in colour is remarkably viscous and tastes of raisins molasses figs, caramel and nuts. It has prolonged length and sweetness and I would recommend for next Christmas, or any time really!

The Italian wine Teruzzi & Puthod Vernaccia, San Gimignano with the grape 100% Vernaccia, which was virtually saved from extinction by the wine maker Enrico Teruzzi, and is grown in Tuscany. I first sampled this wine over 10 years ago, as we holidayed in a villa just next to the vineyard and sampled the wine as it was sold on the road side. It has an elegant nose of apples and minerals, medium bodied, a bit of a Chablis finish. You can now buy this wine from Waitrose, at £8.99.



The Torre del Falco, made from the Nero di Troia grape a native grape of Puglia, that last bit of Italy at the very southern tip. I have to admit to a bit of a cheat on this wine as I was watching Saturday Kitchen, and this was one of the wines that they tried and raved about, so off I went to buy. The wine is from Waitrose normally around £7.00, mine was on offer for £5.00 13% so a bargain. I found the wine quite complex and full flavoured, according to the experts it should be drunk young as it does not age well, the one we tried was a 2007. Still young in my eyes.
