#### **Finance**

The finances of the Parish Council are exactly where we would want them to be with several more commitments to meet in the near future. It has been decided to keep the small portion of your Council Tax that is returned to your Parish Council at the same level as it has been for the last three years.

## **Grass Cutting**

The Parish Council is very grateful to the nine volunteers who have offered to help out with cutting the grass in the Recreation Ground. It is now very likely that the Council will purchase its own mowers and organise the grass cutting 'in house'. The estimated saving to the parish is £600 per year over the next five years.

Two or three more volunteers would be much appreciated, you can see the difference you can make.

If we achieve a saving of £3000 over the next five years it will go towards further improvements to our amenities.

## Children's Playground

It has been agreed that the council will spend up to £1300 on further improvements to the children's playground in the next year. We are very grateful to Infineum for donating £400 and to Vic and Sheila Dawson for raising £300 towards the cost of the work. Much of the funding will be spent on improving the safety surfaces but it is intended that we purchase one new piece of play equipment.

#### **STANLEY LYNCH 1921-2008**

Stan Lynch died on 7<sup>th</sup> January 2008 after a short spell in hospital.

He was born in Salford in 1921. He struggled with school and as soon as he was able to, he left and took an apprenticeship with an electrical firm. When the Second World War started, rather than waiting to be called up Stan decided to enlist in the Royal Navy.

Stan had quite a distinguished career in the Navy during the war, serving a lot in North Africa, and he was awarded the British Empire Medal. Towards the end of his time in the Navy he was promoted to Petty Officer and became an instructor at the Chatham Torpedo School, where he taught the intricacies of minesweeping. After the war Stan left the Royal Navy and joined the Merchant Navy sailing around the world on some of the luxury liners, mostly with the Cunard Line as an Electrical Engineer Officer.

After his time at sea and having moved around the country quite a lot with various jobs Stan took on a most challenging project, to create what is now known as The Upton Fruit Farm. In 1968 Stan bought the 16-acre meadow in Upton, he planted the cider apple trees in the early seventies, and in 1973 he got permission to build himself a thatched house in the young orchard. The cider apples were at first sold to the Taunton Cider Company and used to make Blackthorn Cider. In 1983, Stan decided to make his own cider in his orchard and formed the Upton Cider Company. In 1999, aged then 78, he decided to slow down a little and sold the business but he continued to live in the orchard and to help with the annual cider making. His advice and knowledge led to Upton Sweet Cider being judged by CAMRA to be the best English Cider in both 2004 and 2005.

Having helped with the harvest for the past several years I understand completely the pleasure and peace that living and working in the orchard provides. The annual harvest will never quite be the same again. Stan will be sorely missed.

#### THE WAITING GAME

Tim is waiting for a new home. Tim, age 11, has been with short-term foster carers for over a year.

Emma has been living with foster carers for 3 months. She originally went to live with them on an emergency basis. After just a few days of going to live with her emergency foster carers, it became apparent that the problems at home would take a while to fix and that Emma would need to remain in foster care for some months. Local independent fostering agency, familyplacement.com, is working to help Tim and Emma and other children like them. The agency seeks to do this by recruiting foster carers for children in or near to their home area and by encouraging people to consider fostering as an alternative to work outside of the home. Foster carers are paid a professional fee in addition to a child maintenance allowance. This allows some people to give up work to start a new career in fostering. Proper rewards do not stop foster carers from loving the kids. All of the agency's foster carers are also provided with high level support and ongoing training to help them to develop their parenting skills to a higher level.
