## PARISH COUNCIL

### Public Meeting

The planning application to erect a house in Beeching Close was discussed at a committee meeting at the District Council last Monday. It is understood that permission will be given to construct the access which drops steeply down off Station Road near to the highest point of the road. Permission for the house will be given if after the access is completed, it is deemed to be safe to carry the construction traffic.

Two members of the Parish council attended that meeting and are so concerned at errors in the information put before the committee and at the way they reached their decision that we are asking that you attend an urgent public meeting in the village hall on Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> Nov at 7.30. The construction of the access is likely to cause considerable disruption to traffic using Station Road.

There is no appeal against the District Council's decision. Your Parish Council is looking for direction from you as to how it should proceed.

### Planning Applications

UPT/20226/1 – Erection of 2 chalet bungalows at Hitherto, Church Street for Mr & Mrs Dyer. The Parish Council decided unanimously to object to the type and colour of the tiles, the use of timber-boarded construction and to the large glass gables that overlook surrounding properties.

### Bonfires

I suspect that most of you are aware of the strict regulations controlling bonfires, please be considerate to your neighbours.

If you do have problems with smoke from persistent bonfires you should log the dates and times and call the District Council Environmental Officer on 540466 for his advice and help.

**DO NOT** call this number, as this is a mail scam originating from Belize.

If you call the number and you start to hear a recorded message you will already have been billed £15 for the phone call.

## YOUNG ACHIEVERS

In the next few months I intend to include notes on the quiet achievements of some of our young residents. Wherever you look in this village you see young people achieving so much both academically and in their chosen sport.

**Brodie Miller** aged 11, who lives in Chilton Road started playing Badminton when she was 8 years old, it all started when she was lucky enough to train locally with Graham Wells who is a very keen junior coach. With Graham's help Brodie progressed quickly and was then able to train with the ex-Olympic Badminton team manager Paul Whetnall in Winchester, and has subsequently worked with many great coaches at a variety of locations. Currently she trains at Milton Keynes, Winchester and Hounslow and plays at Compton.

Brodie is the current Essex and Berkshire U12 champion and is now involved in playing all of the Badminton England national gold tournaments. The first of these was held at Milton Keynes in September where Brodie reached the semis in the singles and mixed doubles and along with her partner Joshwey Bong won the girls doubles.

Brodie has just achieved a major milestone having recently represented England as part of an U13 team in Denmark where she lost to the eventual winner in the quarterfinals of the singles and was runner-up in the mixed doubles. As well as her badminton, Brodie is also a keen member of Abingdon Amblers and regularly runs for them in a range of events and has also been selected for the Berkshire U14 Netball County Academy (she attends a Berkshire school).

A short message from Brodie to anyone keen to make similar progress - You will need a lot of enthusiasm, commitment and dedication and you will also need to eat well and give up about 5 hours of your time each week for practice and play. As both the training and the tournaments require so much travelling you will often have to do your homework in the car whilst being driven around by super and equally dedicated parents.

Good Luck Brodie, keep us informed of your future progress.

## VILLAGE HALL EXTENSION

As usual, there is bad news and good news.

### The Bad News

In May we entered a competition being run by WREN, hoping that our scheme would be selected to win a contribution of £82,000. We succeeded in getting through the first round, when half of the competitors were eliminated, and were then placed in a group of four applicants competing for a prize in this part of the country. Unfortunately, we have since been eliminated at the semi-final stage.

### The Better News

We are now submitting applications for the same amount under other schemes run by WREN and TOE. (These organisations administer the distribution of Landfill Tax funds to worthy causes such as ours.) We hope for decisions by the end of March.

### The Good News

1. Two weeks ago the District Council awarded us a grant of up to £9,020. This is conditional on WREN and TOE approving our applications in full.

Councillors were impressed by the fact that 45 households in this village have promised to contribute a total of £5,555 when the scheme goes ahead. This demonstrates Upton's commitment to the scheme in a remarkable way. It is very helpful to be able to refer to this when applying for grants.

2. We have recently received two cheques for £100 from former residents. Clearly they have happy memories of the years they spent living among us.

3. As stated elsewhere, "Memorable Meals" raised £477. This is the latest of a series of events this year, including the jumble sale and "Open Gardens", through which a total of £3,427 has been raised.

## EVENING OF POETRY AND FOOD

The most enjoyable entertainment for many a day took place on 25 October to raise funds for the Village Hall Extension. Peter Gardiner, and other literary villagers, performed an evening of poetry dedicated to Memorable Meals. As the title implies, this was no coffee-and-biscuits evening: Jessie West insisted that the performance should chime with a slap-up supper, with the readings interspersed between courses.

She produced — in her inimitable way — a delicious three-course menu for 50 people: olives, piquant peppers and breaded mushrooms for *hors d'oeuvre*; Ox tongue, Ham, Salami Sausage, Chicken Elizabeth, Caesar salad, French beans and hot Rosemary potatoes as Main course, and Heavenly pumpkin pie with cream (made by Maggie Maytham) for Dessert. Peter kicked off with an *Invitation to Supper* by Ben Jonson, adapted to include pumpkin pie. Charmian Whitmell read Virginia Woolf's *Sole and Partridge*, then became the Dormouse in Lewis Carroll's *Mad Hatter's Tea Party* with Geoff Summers and Hilary and Simon Powell. Geoff read a puke-making Jerome K. Jerome sketch on the contents of an Irish Stew (Alfresco). Later with alarming gusto he performed a prose item called *Rat*, from Dan Mannix' *Memoirs of a Sword Swallower*. With tremendous verve Malcolm Wright read Lawrence Durrell's story about an ambassador who swallowed a moth at an Embassy Dinner. Hilary Powell — in ankle-length velvet overcoat and feather boa — read Hilaire Belloc's *Little Bits of String*.

Then Geoff narrated Damon Runyon's short story about a piece of *Pumpkin Pie* and Peter performed a rousing finale with Louis Simpson's *Chocolates* — accompanied by a box of Thornton's mints.

Sarah Tenant-Flowers provided background music, including *The Vegetables* by the Beach Boys, in which they scrunched carrots and Cab Calloway's *Everybody Eats When They Come to My House*. Carol Hall hung a set of school pictures on *The Art of Dining* around the walls. £477 was made through the sale of tickets and a Raffle, run by Celia Summers.
