The Mysteries of Milton

As I write this, I am getting quite excited about a short trip which I am about to take. I am shortly off to spend a couple of days in the little Welsh town of Brecon. As far as I can remember, I have never been to Brecon before. I have enjoyed the challenge of working out how to get there by public transport, have booked my tickets, and thinking about where I will stay. Within a few days I will leave Didcot on a train heading for Cardiff, and the adventure will have begun!

I wonder if you share my love of exploring new places. Of course we don't have to travel far to discover something new. Speaking for myself, there are still plenty of footpaths in the local area which are unfamiliar to me, and there are some local villages which I haven't visited yet. Milton, for instance. I've been meaning to visit Milton for months, but never quite got around to it. Perhaps it's something about its location, squeezed as it is between the A34 and Milton Park, that means one wouldn't normally drive through it on the way from A to B. But one of these days I shall plan a special expedition to the

village, and give myself time to have a good look around.

Thank God for the sense of curiosity which he has given to us human beings! PARISH COUNCIL

Swine Flu

All Parish Councils are being asked to consider putting in place an emergency plan to lessen the impact should the village succumb to Swine Flu en masse. We have looked at a very detailed plan drawn up for a much larger village and have selected just a few of the points that we feel we should be putting in place for Upton.

We are well aware that this village is well blest with people prepared to help others and therefore we do urge all of you who are likely to need medication or other essentials during the time that you may be unwell to seek out a 'Flu Buddy' who will do their best to keep you provided with your essential needs. The problem will come if your flu buddy is also unwell so we are setting up a back up service in which you can ring Maggie Maytham (850126) or Clare Lightfoot (850486) for help. Maggie and Clare will enlist a small team of helpers who as a minimum will provide you with a sandwich and a hot drink to keep you going.

There could also be two significant problems if all the adult members of a household are unwell at the same time.

There may be healthy under fives in the household who will need attention. We are hoping that in such an emergency the Tiddlewinks network of mums (contact Katie 851330) will help one another where they can but obviously this is a service we cannot guarantee as it will almost certainly mean taking the bug into another household where there are other young children.

We must not forget the dogs who will still need to be walked even if you cannot get out of the house. I am setting up a small team of walkers and will arrange for someone to call round to provide that necessary service (contact Mike 850135).

If you think there are other areas where we should be taking action I will be pleased to hear your suggestions but hopefully the bug will quickly pass through this area and that it will not cause any of us a serious problem. So far I understand there have been 7 cases in Upton, it is expected to peak early in September.

FIRST RESPONDERS

I am sure you will be pleased to hear that Upton is the first village in this area to set up its own First Responder Group.

9 volunteers from the village have undertaken a NHS training course and all have passed an assessment to allow them to help out in the case of a medical emergency in the village. The 9 have organised themselves into a rota such that for most of the week, both day and night, at least one of them will be available to be asked by the 999 operator to attend an emergency and handle the situation until the ambulance arrives. It is hoped and intended that by having the right equipment and trained personnel within the village, parishioners will receive treatment much quicker than the normal waiting time for an ambulance and this reduced time will greatly increase the chances of a full recovery from the likes of strokes and heart attacks.

If you require emergency help your first action must be to dial 999 or get someone to dial 999 for you. Do not call one of the volunteers before calling the emergency services unless you require help from the volunteer to make the emergency call. As soon as you call 999 the operator will decide whether a volunteer will be able to assist you and will immediately mobilise whoever is on duty.

Over the next few months I will be including requests for you to do things that will help the team to help you. Unfortunately space does not allow me to include them all this month.

Please be aware that the NHS have made available to our group, equipment to the value of £1600 that could save your life. Whilst we do not have to immediately pay for the equipment the budget for financing groups like ours is very small. If any of you are prepared to make a donation towards the cost of our equipment please let me know and I will be pleased to collect it and feed it back into the system to allow another village to set up a similar group.
