RECTORS REFLECTIONS



A Word Beginning With M

As I have been out and about during the last couple of weeks, and admiring the beauty of our trees, shrubs

and flowers in their late summer splendour, I have been struck by the number of different shades of green there are in our natural environment. There are dark greens, lemony greens, pale greens - in fact, virtually every shade of green one could possibly imagine. And as the wind rustles the leaves, and the sunlight falls at different angles, yet more shades of green are created. How lucky we are to live in a world with such variety.

There's a lovely, but now rather old-fashioned, word which springs to mind. It is used in the traditional version of Psalm 104:

"O Lord, how manifold are thy works: in wisdom thou hast made them all; the earth is full of thy riches".

God's creation is indeed "manifold": it is full of multiplicity and variety. Let us give thanks to God for His manifold creation. Let us also give thanks to God that we have been given the ability to appreciate this manifoldness, to explore it with our minds and treasure it in our hearts.

And, if you have the opportunity, do look up the rest of Psalm 104. It is a beautiful celebration of the manifoldness of Creation, and a great out pouring of praise to the Creator. It has been used in worship for well over 2000 years, and it is particularly appropriate at this time of year when we begin to turn our minds to thoughts of Harvest Festival. "O Lord, how manifold are thy works"- how manifold indeed! Praise be to God!

COMMUNITY RESPONDERS

Continuing from last month with ways that you can help your Community Responder Group. If you are unfortunate enough to need a member of the group to visit you in an emergency please help us to find you.

As all the volunteers live in the village they are more likely to know where you live than will members of the ambulance service but they will only be given the name or number of your house and the name of the road. Not all volunteers can be expected to know the names of all the houses so please make sure your house name or number is prominently displayed and can be seen and read from the road. If you have called the emergency services it may save valuable seconds if you get someone out in the road to wave down the volunteers and the ambulance. If it is after dark switch on as many lights as you can so that your house can be quickly located.

Last month I asked for donations towards the cost of our equipment. Please note that I should have said that our equipment has been made available to us by the South Central Ambulance Service League of Friends and it is this charitable organisation that we are looking to repay so that they may continue to assist other groups to start up in the district. If you are prepared to make a donation towards the £1600 cost please give me a call or come and have a chat with one of us at the Fete where we will be pleased to talk with you to explain our role in helping to provide our parishioners with medical help in an emergency.
