## VILLAGE HALL EXTENSION

More good news! The South East England Development Agency has just awarded the Parish Council £27,000 towards the cost of extending the hall. The Council's application was successful largely because of the efforts made by so many people in the village, including those responsible for the preparation and execution of the Parish Plan, the provision of the wide range of organised social activities, and the many local fund raising events. The most recent event, the "Open Gardens" on 6th September, raised £298.

All of this means that the Village Hall Amenities Trust and the Parish Council will soon be able to let contracts for the work to commence. The Trust still needs to raise a few thousand pounds, but the end is in sight.

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## PARISH COUNCIL

### Extraordinary Meeting

You will have seen above that it is intended to place the contracts for the extension to the Village Hall in the next few weeks. The Parish Council will be holding an Extraordinary Meeting on Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup> October to agree the actions necessary to set the Council up to be able to place, monitor and pay for some very large contracts.

The Council will also discuss proposed changes to the play area, and the area adjacent to the hall where it is proposed to extend the car park, construct a patio and plant some shrubs.

At the last meeting of the Council it was proposed that the mounds in the recreation field be removed to allow for easier mowing of the recreation field using the ride-on mower. The mounds can only be trimmed or sometimes cut with the hand mower if the grass is not too high and the ride-on mower has to be manoeuvred around them. As you are aware a voluntary work force from within the village cuts the grass in the recreation ground and this takes considerable commitment, removal of the mounds will make the task less onerous.

It was also suggested that in order to effect a relatively small decrease in the cost of the hall extension that the bricks needed to be removed from the end wall of the existing hall should be recycled as "hardcore" for the village hall patio and the top and sub soil removed as part of the extension construction could be used within the recreation

ground. A suggestion for use of the sub surface and top soil is that a low flat grass platform could be created adjacent to the extension. The platform could be used both as an easy to maintain play feature for the youngsters and maybe for the occasional outside theatre/music performance.

If any parishioners have any ideas or opinions relating to these proposals the Parish Council will welcome your input such that it can be taken into account when making decisions at the meeting on October 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Please contact any member of the parish council with your thoughts.

## RECTORS REFLECTIONS



### Rectors Reflections

#### On Christenings and Post Offices

Do you like riddles? Well, if you do, how about this one: what is the

connection between a Christening and a post office - or more precisely, between a Christening and a new initiative in the provision of post office services?

It is always a joy to welcome new members into the church through Christening or Baptism – these two words mean exactly the same thing. Some people tend to use the word “Christening”; others tend to use the word “Baptism”. But it doesn’t matter which word you chose: the meaning is the same. When a person is Christened or Baptized, they are made one with Jesus Christ, who died to win for us forgiveness of our sins, and who rose again from the dead in order to share with us God’s gift of eternal life. You are never too old or too young to be baptized, as the love of God in Jesus Christ is available to us all - it doesn’t matter whether you’re a child or an adult, just as it doesn’t matter if you are rich or poor, male or female, white or black, highly educated or a graduate with honours from the university of life. The love of God in Christ is for us all.

So, you are doubtless thinking to yourself, where does the link with the post office come in? Well, you may or may not know, that in a new initiative, post office services are now available in the Astons. Every Tuesday morning in the village hall, 9.30am to 12.30pm. I believe there used to be a post office in the Astons some years ago, and it is wonderful that post office services will be available in the village once again. There is also a cafe open in the village hall on Tuesday mornings, with various stalls. So you can refresh yourself with a welcome cup of coffee and a slice of cake, after the exertions of inquiring about the rate for posting a letter to your great aunt in Outer Mongolia.

This new provision of post office services in the Astons is a pointer to what God is up to, in our own lives and the lives of our communities. For God is the God of new beginnings, and He is continually offering us the chance to make a fresh start. A Christening is also a sign of God’s work, bringing new beginnings into our lives. But it is more than a sign. For through our Baptism, God actually helps us to make a new start. He gives us forgiveness of our sins and the gift of His Spirit to inspire and enable us to make this fresh start.

There is a wonderful verse in the Bible which sums all this up. In the last book of the Bible, the Book of Revelation, Jesus says: “See, I am making all things

new!”. God is continually at work through Jesus to make all things new, in our lives as individuals and in our communities. Let us be open to God, and allow Him to bring these new beginnings into our lives.

## COMMUNITY RESPONDERS

The last of my bits on how you can help your local Responder Group

If you are living alone and feel that after making an emergency call you will be unable to answer your door please be aware that it is not permissible for a volunteer, or an ambulance crew, to use any force to gain entry to your property. Do you need to consider your present arrangements, if you live on your own why not ask someone living local to you to hold a key or know the details of your keypad. If you do have to call the emergency services and you are immobilised you may then also call your key holder such that when a volunteer or the ambulance arrives someone will be there to let them in.

Please consider making myself aware of who your key holder is such that I can draw up a confidential list for use by the volunteers. It is possible that having called the emergency service you may be unable to contact your key holder, if that is the case it is absolutely vital that we know who to contact such that the volunteers and the ambulance service can gain immediate access to you otherwise valuable minutes will be lost waiting for the police to arrive.

Our thanks for the generous donations that several of you have made towards the cost of the equipment supplied to the group by the South Central Ambulance Service League of Friends. So far we have received £235 from parishioners which together with a donation from the Parish Council of £250 means that we are almost a third of the way towards the cost of the equipment supplied to us.
