The managing architect has just reported that "works are proceeding well and currently on programme. Workmanship is good."

Now we have to start paying the bills. In the last few weeks over 40 local residents have responded to requests for the money they promised last year. Over £6,600 has been contributed so far. A few more donations are expected.

Other promises include:

£50,000 from the Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment and the Waste Recycling Group through the Landfill Communities Fund. (This includes £5,500 contributed towards TOE's expenses by the District Council).

£27,000 through Southern Oxfordshire LEADER, half from the European Union and half from DEFRA.

£8,750 from the County Council

£9,020 from the Parish Council.

RECTOR'S REFLECTIONS



Poems at Christmastime

Do you have a favourite piece of Christmas poetry? Whether serious or humorous, a poem can

do so much to sum up the spirit of the season, and perhaps especially so if the words have been set to music.

One of my favourite poems at this time of year was written some 1600 years ago, by a Spaniard with the impressive sounding name of Aurelius Prudentius Clemens. He had been a lawyer and civil servant, and in his retirement he turned to writing Christian poetry. He wrote in Latin, but subsequent generations have felt that he should be read more widely, so his poems have been translated into English (which is jolly fortunate!)

The first verse of the poem reads:

“Of the Father’s heart begotten,
Ere the world from chaos rose,
He is Alpha: from that Fountain
All that is and hath been flows;
He is Omega, of all things
Yet to come the mystic Close,
Evermore and Evermore”.

This verse refers to God the Son, who is the beginning (“the Alpha”) and the end (“the Omega”) of all things. There are at least 6 other verses, and the poem is often sung as a hymn, to a simple but majestic melody. For me, this poem sums up so much of what Christmas is all about. It tells how God, who creates and sustains the universe, willingly became an ordinary human being, so that we human beings could be reconciled to God and be given the power to live the lives that God wants us to live – lives of love, of generosity and mercy, of peace and deep fulfilment. Hundreds of years prior to Jesus’ birth, God spoke through the Prophets, promising that He would send someone to rescue His people, and to bring them new life. The birth of Jesus was the fulfilment of these ancient promises.

There is something profoundly wonderful about the birth of Jesus, and all that it means for us and our world. Its meaning cannot be adequately summed up in a few words, or a quick phrase. It is something that people have been reflecting upon for the last two thousand years. Even today, the celebration of Christmas is not without its mystery and its otherworldliness. God still lets us glimpse this mystery – perhaps through the beauty of a carol, or the smile of a child, or a message of love, given or received.

And what is the mystery of Christmas? It is nothing less than the mystery of God’s love for us in Jesus Christ.

Let Aurelius Prudentius Clemens have the last word:

“This is he, whom seer and sibyl
Sang in ages long gone by;
This is he of old revealed
In the pages of prophecy;
Lo! he comes, the promised Saviour;
Let the world his praises cry!”

WINE CLUB

November Meeting

The wine club had a change of venue for this event, very different and extremely cosy, we had more people attend than at any other time so thanks for your support. The evening was entertaining and informative as ever. Ian Hewson attended with his annual presentation of wines for Christmas. He began with a Picoul de Pinet 2008, from the Languedoc, this was an extremely pleasant white, refreshing and light, good with seafood especially crustacean. The Champagne that followed was equally well appreciated, although some felt that it did not last long on the palate and the bubbles disappeared rather too quickly to make it a classic. We then compared the Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc 2008 Southern Lights with the Jean Reverdy Sancerre 2008. There was a pretty even split among the members, as to preference if it helps the Sauvignon was £3 dearer. The next revelation was a very nice Cabernet Sauvignon from Castilla Spain, I personally liked this wine, but in a blind tasting I do not think I would have recognised it as a Cabernet, very smooth more like a merlot, but very nice none the less. The piece de resistance was the Ribera del Duero Reserva Bodegas Valduera, in my humble opinion, the best wine of the evening, delicious, but a little pricey at £23!!! - but you get what you pay for as they say. The final wine was a desert wine from Australia very spicy and wintery but very popular, a few of us decided to purchase this Seppeltsfield Rutherglen Muscat Cellar No 9. Hope to see you all next month on the 9th for Williams take on Champagne.

Bus service timetable alterations

The road bridge over the railway between South & North Moreton is to be rebuilt necessitating long term closure from 14 December to 12 March, causing a diversion to bus route 95. The Parish Council is awaiting confirmation of revised timetable for this period which upon receipt will be posted at the Upton bus stop and on the village notice boards.

Local Transport Plan 3 for period 2011 - 2030

Over the next year Oxfordshire County Council is determining a set of objectives to decide which improvements are to be made to the county's transport network and how these are prioritised. There are a series of Consultation periods and the

current consultation provides opportunity to suggest schemes for inclusion in the Local Transport Plan. This phase of the consultation ends 18 December. If you would like to take part in this part of the process please notify your views to Geoff Summers, our Passenger Transport Representative, who will coordinate this on behalf of the Parish Council.
