**RECTORS REFLECTIONS** 



Who's that lying in the Manger?

Picture the scene. There's the stable, with Mary and Joseph. There are the animals, the

shepherds and the kings. There is the manger, and in the manger, a figure. No need, surely, to ask who is lying in the manger. Perhaps the opening words of the Calypso Carol come to mind:

"See him lying on a bed of straw, a draughty stable with an open door;

Mary cradling the babe she bore, the prince of glory is his name".

But this time, things are a bit different. Looking a bit more closely, we see that the figure is not a baby at all. It is a fully grown human being. So what's an adult doing there, lying in the straw? Where's the baby gone?

It's easy to forget that at the heart of Christmas is God becoming a human being; becoming a little baby was only a stage in this process. Such was God's love for us human beings that creating us, nurturing us, and guiding us was not enough; He had to become one of us. And that's what He did. Human beings are, of course, born at a particular time to a particular mother. So God decided that He would be born at a particular time, and that He would be born to the woman we know as Mary. Ever since this time, God has never ceased to be a human being; He has also never ceased to be God!

This means that each one of us matters simply because we are human beings. Our value does not depend on what we do, on how economically productive we are, on whether we are beautiful, or successful, on whether we are easy to get along with, or even whether we are morally good people.

The problem is that we are often under pressure to treat some human beings as if they weren't human beings at all. Sometimes our own anger and fears are manipulated by others, perhaps without us even realising it, with the result that we allow some human beings start to be treated as if they weren't quite fully human. We need to be particularly careful about this at a time when the Government needs to find ways of saving public money. For example, when we are having to make tough decisions about cuts to the Welfare State, it is so easy to caricature particular categories of recipient, in a way which dehumanises them. The Welfare State should be about how we behave towards each other as human beings; it should enable us to be more truly human, not less human.

If we go back to the stable, and take a yet closer look, we're in for a bit of surprise. As we look at the face of the figure lying in the manger, the features become strangely recognisable. The human being we see lying there is not somebody else at all; the person is ourselves.

#### UPTON WINE APPRECIATION SOCIETY

Our November meeting proved to be one of the best we have had. Kevin and Frankie Jacklin arranged for Ryan O'Connell, a Franco-American winemaker from the Languedoc, to come over to speak to us and introduce his family's wines. Ryan's presentation, whilst very informative and entertaining, was very laid back and totally in keeping with the relaxed "Village Social" format that nearly all of our members prefer. The vineyard he and his parents own, O'Vineyards near Carcasonne, is some 60 miles inland and they produce wines of both the Southern France and Bordeaux blends but with a New World taste. One of the wines tasted was 100% syrah and was very rich and spicy and certainly would have been on equal terms with many from the more prestigious Northern Rhone. Ryan also provided three wines made at the same time and in exactly the same way except one was matured in stainless steel without any oak, one was matured in new American oak and the other in new French oak; the differences between them were very interesting and quite marked. As Ryan and his parents only make red wines one white aperitif was added plus a dessert wine, both of which came from neighbouring vineyards and Ryan is very keen to act as an ambassador for the Languedoc wines in general.

For a small village wine club to receive such a visit is quite a triumph and we are indebted to Kevin and Frankie for visiting the vineyard and arranging it.

Our next meeting will be on 8<sup>th</sup> December as we always bring the December meeting forward a week to steer clear of the Christmas build-up of commitments. Fiona and William Betts will be running this one. Fiona is going to start with a tasting of champagnes and other sparklers for Christmas and William will follow with a selection of dessert or pudding wines. The meeting will be heavily subsidized by the Club and at £5 will be fantastic value as was the November meeting.
