BUS UPDATE

We have more time, so let's use it to save our buses!

The Downland Transport Action Group have just heard from a Thames Travel representative that, while the County Council voted to cut bus subsidies, our buses will continue until at least 20th July, as the timing for deciding on contracts has been moved back. This gives us more time to work with Thames Travel to save our buses.

The best way we can do this is to use the buses and to encourage others to use them. If you have a bus concession card please also consider occasionally paying the fare instead of using your card, as that will increase revenue ... and the key to showing that our services can be maintained at a high level is showing that they can be commercially viable.

The Downland Transport Action Group includes representatives from the seven parishes on the route (Blewbury, Upton, East and West Hagbourne, North and South Moreton, Aston Tirrold and Aston Upthorpe). We are in contact with our county councillors, Oxfordshire County Council's manager of fleet services, and the finance and commercial director of Thames Transport, all of whom are being encouraging of our efforts. We hope to have another meeting with Thames Travel as soon as possible.

We are starting to survey the parishes to find out not only who is using the buses, but also to find out what people want from our buses and what would encourage further use. For example, are there timetable improvements that would increase your use of the service? If you are asked to complete a survey form, please do so - we need up-to-date, solid evidence to support our case . Please pass this information on to your neighbours.

We will attempt to keep you informed, and remember... if we want to keep our buses for all in the community, we must use them. Even if you are not a regular bus user, please consider using the service occasionally as a way of helping to maintain the service for all.

Notes from the Allotment

We must have had a severe frost up at the Allotments in early February, because when I visited recently I discovered my remaining celery and chard plants had been completely decimated! I hadn't realised they were not that hardy. However, the celery plants were not very successful as I had neglected to bind them up to promote blanching and ended up with hundreds of short green stems with very little edible parts, at least not to me, although the slugs loved them.... But still ok to flavour soup!

The weed killer in the raspberry patch seems to have worked; I must now give it a little (careful) dig over and then give it a mulch of manure or compost; also cut down the autumn fruiting ones which I have failed to do so far, before they start sprouting. I've noticed the gooseberry bushes are already in leaf!

A straw bale has appeared on my plot, a legacy of Blewbury's first beer festival where they were used for extra seating; I will use this on the strawberry patch but I have more than I need, so please feel free to take some! Plot 23A...Although of course I can also sit on it when needing a break from the hard labour that will need to be done shortly.

Gathered a few leeks yesterday, surprisingly the ground was not frozen after a hard frost the night before, as it was followed by warm sunshine, a welcome experience. Again, bins strewn around the site, it does catch the wind there, but not too much damage - a squashed onion stem or two, but they will recover.

A bit of a mystery, one of my transplanted clumps of rhubarb has been completely eaten away - I didn't think anything ate rhubarb except us hardy humans! Any thoughts? It was under cover.

I've still not got round to ordering seeds, despite all the advice pouring in through the letterbox and Internet. Too much choice! But I think this year I will concentrate on producing a decent quantity of climbing French beans rather than runners, as I still have a freezer drawer full and they really don't defrost well. I'm going to have another go at carrots and parsnips after limited success in a raised bed, and try to produce enough onions to last me more than a month!

Upton Wine Appreciation Society

February saw one of our favourite speakers, Mike Collins (village resident and founding Chair of Upton's Wine Appreciation Club), return to present wines from Australia.

Mike explained that Australia is a significant exporter of wine worldwide, both in bulk and bottle, with the UK representing Australia's second most important market by value after the US. Having reassured us that Australia is experiencing strongest growth in the export of premium and ultra-premium bottled wines, Mike then settled to the arduous task of leading us in tasting a carefully conceived selection of whites and reds. With wine produced in every state, from an impressive selection of grape varieties, grown on different soil types and benefitting from a range of topographies, we were introduced to Eden Valley Riesling (a personal favourite for its vitality, extract and punchy lime notes) and Barossa Semillon (still too often underrated and overlooked as a pure varietal). Cool climate Tasmanian Chardonnay

was well received, before we moved on to taste four reds including an exceptional Victoria Shiraz from the Wine Society and a massive Shiraz / Mourvedre blend produced by the ever-reliable Penfolds wine company.

Rector's Reflections

What's so special about Easter?

So you're in the queue at the supermarket checkout, and the person in front of you asks: "Well, you're a Christian - what's this Easter thing all about? Why do Christians keep celebrating something that happened 2000 years ago? Why do you bother?"

I wonder how you might respond? Of course traditionally we don't tend to talk about what we believe, especially to a stranger in a supermarket! But if we felt brave enough to actually try and talk about the meaning of Easter, what might we say?

For me, Easter is about more than Jesus dying and rising again to new life. It's about God's agenda for our lives and the life of our world. It's about new beginnings. It's about God's power to bring about a fresh start in our lives, in our relationships and in our world.

It's about a life giving message which challenges the assumptions of our world.

We sometimes assume that a situation is so bad that there can't be a new start. Sometimes this is because we assume people don't or can't change for the better. Sometimes it's because we look at a situation and are overwhelmed by its seriousness and complexity.

But Easter says that there is always hope. God is bigger than the biggest problems which we face, as individuals and as a world. God raised Jesus Christ from the dead. So He can certainly raise us from the dead. He can bring new life into the most desperate of situations.

Easter also says that this gift of new life is something that comes from outside of ourselves. It is a gift of God, given by God simply because He loves us. As human beings, we try our best to bring about new beginnings, using the skills and resources available to us. But we can only get so far. There are times when the effort of bringing about a new start seems beyond us. Perhaps the problem is simply too complex or we simply lack the resources. Perhaps we lack the belief that a new beginning is possible. We spend so much of our time swimming in a world of cynicism and disappointment that it becomes impossible for us to believe that things could be different.

Easter says that things can be different. God is ready and willing to intervene in our lives and our world to bring about change for the better. There is hope!

Fostering with Oxfordshire County Council

In line with a national trend, the number of children coming into the care system in Oxfordshire has increased in recent years. There are currently more than 600 looked after children in the county, most of whom will at some point require a foster placement. As a result, the needs of our fostering service are continuously changing and currently we are especially keen to hear from people who can consider Unaccompanied Asylum Seeker Children (UASC) and teenagers.

UASC

As I am sure you are aware, 2015 saw the shocking and saddening events of Europe's Refugee Crisis unfold in the British media. The influx of refugees and migrants to Europe from Syria reached staggering new levels, dominating headlines and prompting stormy political debate.

Although to date we have not seen a direct increase in the number of Syrian children seeking asylum in Oxfordshire, we have seen the number of asylum seekers arriving from other countries rise.

As a result, we are urgently trying to find more fostering families who are able to make them feel as at home as possible and who can ensure they keep good links with their heritage. This is so important because they've already had to leave a family, a home and a country.

Teenagers

We have a great need to find people who are interested in caring for teenagers. Fostering teenagers can

be a challenge but there's nothing more rewarding than using your skills to help a young person turn their life around.

To foster teenagers you may not need to be at home all the time, so you can work and foster. What is important is that you do have the time to spend with the young person on a one to one basis to give support and be there when necessary.

If you think you have the time and skills to help support our young people, please get in touch by calling the number below.

Additionally, there are many other fostering opportunities available with Oxfordshire County Council, such as:

- Sibling groups who need to be placed together rather than on their own
- Babies and toddlers who need to be placed with foster carers who are at home full time
- Disabled children who need people with the skills and experience to care for them
- Children with specialist fostering needs - who are among our most vulnerable children and young people and are part of specialist fostering schemes.
