Burglaries in Upton and West Hagbourne

Thames Valley Police is appealing for witnesses following burglaries (non-dwelling) in Upton and West Hagbourne.

Between 4pm and 5pm on Sunday (22/11), offender(s) gained entry to an outbuilding at a property in Church Street, Upton. It is not known how entry was gained. An Apple Imac Computer was stolen. Offender(s) broke into a shed at the same property sometime between Thursday (19/11) and Sunday (22/11), and stole a Makita table saw.

Offender(s) also broke into an outbuilding in Stream Road, Upton, and stole power tools and a mountain bike.

Between 8.30am and 6pm on Thursday (19/11), offender(s) gained entry to an insecure shed in Foxglove Lane, West Hagbourne. A chain saw and a mountain bike were stolen.

If you see or have seen any suspicious looking people or vehicles in the area or have any information relating to this message, please call the police on the 24 hour non-emergency telephone number 101.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Council met on 15th September and welcomed Ms Karen Marshall, who had been co-opted onto the team. Karen agreed to help Stuart Fraser with planning matters and also take over inspection of the Play areas from Chairman Bob Lott.

Also recently appointed to the Council, Mrs Kathryn Fletcher agreed to take on communications, including assembling articles for the Upton News and responding to District and County Council consultations.

County Cllr Lilley reported that work on both the Chilton Road and Hagbourne Hill improvements had started. He confirmed that the original suggestions of one chicane and realignment of the junction at the bottom of Chilton Road would be installed, together with a new roundabout at the bottom of Hagbourne Hill. Chilton slip roads were also underway but were 10 months late due to unavoidable legal delays. Milton interchange work was also six weeks behind. A further complication at Milton was the finding of an old nuclear pipe under a footpath between Milton and Didcot. The footpath cannot be reopened until the pipe has been removed. Cllr Lilley also warned of further budget cuts looming which would have an effect on local parishes, including probably cuts to waste recycling and bus services, but that childcare and asylum applications would have to be protected. Cllr Lilley suggested economies could be made by combining authorities, or even Parish Councils!

Councillor Rob Traynor reported on the progress with the Parish Plan, which had been delivered to all households in the village and that so far he had had a 50% response. Results would be communicated to the village once the results had been analysed.

During Public Forum, a parishioner complained that refuse collection lorries were damaging the grass verges in the narrower Upton streets and requested the Parish Council raise the subject with the Biffa, suggesting that the smaller vehicles be used. It was also thought that the refuse lorries had damaged the concrete bags in Stream Road installed to protect against flooding. Initially the contractor had responded that this was already the case, but it has since come to light that the larger lorries are being used. The investigation continues! In the meantime, residents might like to consider putting up a NO THROUGH ROAD sign where Stream Road becomes a private road to lessen the traffic.

Both play areas have recently been inspected by ROSPA for safety, and various small improvements are being undertaken by members of the Council. If anyone has concerns about any of the equipment, please contact a member of the Council or the Clerk.

Oxfordshire County Council hosted a town and parish council event to discuss the future delivery of local services in Oxfordshire at the Kassam Stadium on Monday 21st September; Cllrs Norman and Fletcher attended.

The Council responded to the Vale's consultation on the reduction of waste recycling sites, expressing its strong wish that Drayton be one of the three (out of five) facilities to be retained, as it served all our local villages as well as Abingdon and Didcot.

An incidence of Japanese Knotweed was reported in Frog Alley; we are advised that the tenant farmer has treated the weed and will repeat if not successful. Please keep an eye on this when you are walking your dogs and let the Council know if you spot any further outbreaks.

Recent Planning Decisions:

14/V2550/FUL The Gate House, Reading Road - planning permission granted 17/7 with conditions; subsequent application P15/V1772/FUL for larger building, no objections. Vale granted.

P15/V1649/O 14 Houses next to Horse & Harrow; UPC objected (as also did WHPC) on grounds of unsustainability and lack of infrastructure, as well as a potential increase in dangerous traffic. Application withdrawn.

New Applications

P15/V2406/FUL Owlscote Manor Farm, High Street Upton - removal of existing non-historic buildings, removal of modern additions to existing dwelling, erection of 3 new dwellings with gardens and garaging.

It was unanimously agreed to object to the application on the grounds including the flood alleviation measures shown on the plans not being consistent with the measures in the risk assessment and the proposed two-storey houses being considered excessively tall (9+m) and overbearing. However, much of the application was considered praiseworthy.

Ash Dieback

Ash dieback has recently been confirmed at the Earth Trust's Paradise Woods, near Long Wittenham, just 6 miles from Upton!

Ash dieback, also known as Chalara, was first recorded in the UK in 2012. Since then it has spread to most areas of the UK. The latest information from the Forestry Commission shows that the disease has spread close to Upton, with records to the North, South and East of the village.

Chalara is a serious disease of Ash trees and is caused by the fungus *Hymenoscyphus fraxineus*. Symptoms include leaf loss, crown dieback and bark lesions. Once a tree is infected it is usually fatal and unfortunately we have many long established trees in this parish. The spaces left are likely to be similar to those left in this parish when the Dutch Elm disease struck in the late 1970s.

Please see the Forestry Commission's website for the latest advice on management and identification <u>forestry.gov.uk/ashdieback</u>. The Winter Symptoms video towards the bottom of the page is excellent, and also see <u>chalaramap.fera.defra.gov.uk</u> for the latest records of the disease.

Waste and Recycling

If bad weather like snow or flooding disrupts waste collections in the run up to Christmas this winter, Biffa will try to catch up the following day. Leave your bins out for three days - if they're not emptied after three days, bring them back in and put them out next time they're due with any side waste.

Keep food waste out of your recycling wheelie bin. This includes recyclable food trays with food stuck to them. Biffa are checking recycling bins - if they contain things that can't be recycled, Biffa won't empty them and will leave a note to explain why.

Please rinse out your food trays before you put them in the green bin - if our recycling is contaminated with food waste, the people who take the recycling off our hands might reject it and send it to landfill.

You can check what bins things go in at www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk/recycleit or by calling 03000 610610.

You can now recycle small electrical items by leaving them in a small carrier bag tied up next to your grey bin when you normally put it out for collection. You can recycle old clothes and textiles that are too tatty for charity shops by leaving them in a small tied carrier bag next to your green bin. Huge thanks to Upton residents

We are expecting DEFRA to confirm shortly that the Vale has once again achieved the second best percentage of recycled waste in the country and just behind South Oxfordshire District Council who for the second year have taken top place.

UPTON VILLAGE THEATRE GROUP

The Ladykillers

Watermill, Bagnor, Tuesday 27 October 2015

The production of "The Ladykillers" at the Watermill Theatre just outside Newbury was as enjoyable for the environment as the performance; the Watermill is a lovely 220-seat theatre and restaurant located in a disused corn mill dating back from the 1830s. The restaurant offers an excellent preor post-theatre hot and cold buffet; in the summer, dinner in the conservatory or outside on the lawn would be extremely agreeable. As it was, on the cold and drizzly Tuesday that the Upton Theatre Group visited, the Watermill Restaurant provided a warm and sociable environment for dinner.

The play was staged on a tiny, precariously sloping set which managed to ingeniously host an ailing parrot, four murders, two car chases, a string quintet and its audience, a rooftop chase and a railway line. The small stage area required almost balletic choreography as the cast dodged and ducked around each other, cramming themselves into tiny spaces and juggling an improbable amount of luggage. There were many elements of classic farce in the production blended with the character-based comedy.

The script, adapted by Graham Linehan from the original film screenplay by William Rose, was similar in style to Linehan's most well-known works, Father Ted and The IT Crowd. The quirks and tics of the oddball villains were hilariously realised by the cast, particularly the winking, twitching Major (Dermot Canavan) and obsessively polishing Harry (Harry Katsari). The moral of the original screenplay, that "in the worst of men, there is a little bit of good that can destroy them", applied to all of the gang apart from the smooth, psychopathic ringleader Professor Marcus (played by the gangly and almost rubberised Paul Mundell) who was only undone by his choice of accomplices and scarves.

Having seen the 2004 Coen Brothers film which is quite good but is unfortunately rather less than the sum of its parts, I wasn't expecting the manic, laugh-out-loud, sometimes breathtakingly ingenious production that was the Watermill Ladykillers. Combined with the very enjoyable (albeit a little expensive) dinner, it was an excellent evening and I will be keeping an eager eye on the Watermill What's On web page for future opportunities to repeat the experience.

Friends of St Mary's

For the second year the Friends of St Mary's held a quiz night in the village hall in October and it was once again a resounding success with over 60 people in attendance. Carl Pettman was a splendid question master, delivering the questions set by Alan Davies with aplomb and a little magic, and a mountain of pizzas, delivered for the interval, soon disappeared along with the wonderful salads prepared by Jessie and her army of helpers.

Competition amongst the eight teams was intense but in the end the combined wisdom of Chillup (as it had members from Chilton and Upton!) outshone that of runners-up Grand Union by just one point and they were declared Brains of Upton for 2015!

Not only was it a fun evening, it also raised £357 for the Friends scheme. Our sincere thanks to all who worked so hard to make the evening a success.

The final Friends event for 2015 will be Carols and Readings on a Christmas theme to be held in St Mary's at 4.00 on Saturday 12 December. This will be followed by mulled wind and mince pies - it should be a great start to the Christmas season, especially for those of us who don't really get going until a couple of weeks before! Last year the church was packed, and we look forward to seeing a big gathering of Friends of St Mary's once again this time.

NOTES FROM THE ALLOTMENT

The weather is still extraordinarily mild, which is making all those autumn planted vegetables grow rather too fast, including broad beans which are already several inches high. I hope they don't catch cold when the frost comes; I have some fleece handy to protect them from the worst, although they are very hardy vegetable.

And still no frost to sweeten the sprouts, although I'm not sure it makes any appreciable difference. Rather too much rain though, making the ground extremely claggy and difficult to work. Alongside the sprouts, I have some spinach beet which is producing masses of succulent leaves at the moment.

It is much lighter on my side of the allotment now that the hedge has been trimmed, it makes quite a difference to the plants trying to grow in the shade of it, especially during the darker winter months when the sun has to struggle to clear the top of the hedge.

If you haven't yet cut down your legumes, their roots can be left in the ground when you are clearing the foliage, so they can return nitrogen to the soil for the next crop, ideally brassicas.

I made a tasty soup recently using two autumnal products, pumpkin and apple juice; peel and chop some onions and garlic and fry in a mixture of oil and butter, together with a couple of torn bay leaves and some mace (or grated nutmeg) plus a cinnamon stick. After five minutes add the peeled and chopped pumpkin and cook for a further 10 minutes. Then add a pint or so of vegetable or chicken stock and a similar quantity of apple juice and simmer until all the vegetables are soft. Remove the whole spices and then liquidise. Reheat and check seasoning, serve with a swirl of plain yoghurt or crème fraiche on the top. Delicious! (courtesy of Reader's Digest Cookery Year).

Compost Corner: if you haven't already done so, now is the time to tip over your composter and make use of that lovely compost residing at the bottom. Put a large plastic sheet on the ground in front of the bin, tip the bin over and remove it, leaving the recent additions on the sheet, then dig out the finished compost from the bottom, sieve or remove any large twiggy bits, then mulch your beds with it. Replace the bin and put back the unrotted material.


You will be able to catch Blewbury Brass Band at various local locations in the next few weeks.
