17 for Christmas

You're probably thinking to yourself: 17 what? 17 around the table for Christmas Dinner?

Well, in the paper today I've read a report of the results of a poll conducted by Amazon. The paper didn't report the sample size, or the date and circumstances in which the data was collected. So the figures are doubtless to be taken with a touch of salt. But according to the poll, 17 is, on average, the number of gifts which an adult will

buy at Christmas. And, of course, as well as giving gifts, we receive them -but what do we do with unwanted presents? Apparently, 47% of people living in London are likely to repackage the gift and give it to someone else. And what do we say to the person who has given us the unwanted gift? Well, it appears that in some parts of the country, 81% of us are likely to pretend that we like the gift. Little white lies make social interaction so much smoother, and I'm sure in most cases they do little if any harm.

Christmas gift giving can be a very stressful experience. We can feel under pressure to spend more than we can afford, assuming of course we can afford to spend anything at all. Then there is the hassle - or the joy - of choosing appropriate presents. What will he or she like? What did I get them last Christmas? Should we give a physical gift at all, or would it be better to make a donation in their name to a charity of our choice?

Gift giving is hard enough for us humans, but what about for God? If you were God, what present would you give to us human beings? What do you think human beings need?

For Christians, Christmas is about celebrating God's decision to give a gift, and not just any old gift. God decided to give the gift of his own self. He did this by becoming a human being, taking a human body, spirit and mind, in Jesus Christ. God chose to do this so that he might share his life with us, so that his love and light, and joy and peace may shine in us and through us.

What a gift! May the wonder and joy of this gift be ours this Christmastime and always!

Eight generously proportioned "tastings" of gorgeous Italian wines, oodles of delicious nibbles and all while learning about the origins of screw cap bottles and the most pungent chemical known to humankind. What more could you want for only £5 per head!

In case you're wondering, this was the great night out experienced by all those devotees who came along to the Upton Wine Club on Wednesday 15th November at the Upton Village Hall, where Brian Rippon of Strictly Wine (our



friendly neighbourhood wine merchant) gave a first class evening of practical education on all things Italian wine.

The wines tasted came from all over Italy, covering a range of wine types from chilling-in-the-sun-with-friends whites, through lively sparkling wines, award winning, mouth watering reds, to a succulent but light (5%) wine to go with Italian desserts of all kinds.

Brian also took us on an exhilarating tour of the country and the vineyards, explaining the techniques used at each, the grape varieties grown (of which there are several hundred), the terrain (stunning) and the history. We also had a whistle-stop tour of what causes a wine to taste corked and how different bottle stopping methods have been invented in attempts to improve how well wines keep in the bottle, together with what effects this year's adverse weather conditions around the globe have had on levels of wine production (stock up!).

The wines tasted during the evening were:

Colomba Bianca Zibibbo Vitese 2016, Pignoletto Colli d'Imola Frizzante 2016, Falanghina Albente Feudi di San Gregorio 2016, Pinot Grigio Alto Adige 2016, Tramin Montepulciano d'Abruzzo Feudi d'Albe 2015, Bove Tenuta di Castiglioni Toscana 2014 Frescobaldi, Collezione Cinquante San Marzano Vino Rosso, and Michele Chiarlo Palás Moscato d'Asti 2016. More details of these great wines appear in the Wine Club section of the village website.

15th Dec. for Austria, Denmark, Iceland, Portugal, Netherlands, Norway, Slovakia, Spain and Switzerland.

16th Dec. for Belgium, France, Ireland and Luxembourg.

The last posting dates for Inland Mail are:-

21st Dec. for First Class and Special Delivery.

22nd Dec for Special Delivery (Saturday Guaranteed).

All airmail must have a blue AIRMAIL sticker attached, and any non-printed paper to non EU destinations, must have a customs label filled in BEFORE you come to the counter please. (Printed paper to Japan and Canada also needs a customs label, they are quite pernickety). All parcels need to have a senders name, house name or number and post code, please also tell us what's in your parcel, as sometimes we have to put special stickers on some items, and some items will not be allowed to be sent at all. (Lists are on the Royal Mail website and on posters in PO, and on leaflets).

The Blewbury Garden Market continues in the Post Office on Saturdays, bread and cakes, eggs available most days.

We will be open on the Saturday morning before Christmas, closed on the Monday and Tuesday, open Wednesday morning, Thursday and Friday, closed on Saturday before New Year, and the Monday.

Oxford to Cambridge Expressway

Last month, largely based on information given to me by the CPRE (Council for the Preservation of Rural England), I was pessimistic about the possibility of part of this Expressway coming through our parish. During the last four weeks Stuart Fraser, on behalf of the Parish Council, and myself have been beavering away to find out a lot more information about the proposal and I sent out an update to most of you two weeks ago.**

To add to that information the NIC (National Infrastructure Commission) have just issued a further 90 page update which can be found at: https://www.nic.org.uk/publications/partnering-prosperity-new-deal-cambridge-milton-keynes-oxford-arc/

Having waded through all the information now available I am very pleased to report that in my opinion there is a very much reduced chance of this road coming our way. Whilst no proposed routes are likely to be available until the summer of 2019 in his comments on the latest report, Lord Adonis (Chairman of the NIC), has urged the government to work with local councils to deliver new and improved infrastructure to unlock opportunities to deliver one million new homes and jobs by 2050 - including the country's first new towns in 50 years - tackling the area's housing shortage, improving local transport connections and creating new jobs.

He has highlighted that these measures can be taken while at the same time protecting and enhancing the natural environment of the area, and without making changes to existing Green Belt protections.

I am not sure about the number of new houses in the area but his comment on the environment is very relevant as I cannot see if they aim to protect the natural environment that they will propose part of the route to run through our area of outstanding natural beauty.

In their report to Stakeholders, given in early November, Highways England put forward their proposed program for the Expressway:

Central corridor selection July 2018 (the corridors are possible areas for the central section of the Expressway)

Proposed route within selected corridor July 2019

Shortlist of route options selected for Public Consultation Autumn 2019 Preferred route announcement Autumn 2020.

As you can see no further information is likely to be available for a long time so I am not expecting to mention the Expressway again for many months but if either Stuart or myself become aware of anything significant to report I will keep you informed.

Police Advice

The Wantage and Grove Neighbourhood Police team are able to offer a free crime prevention survey on your property and are able to give advice on suitable products and tips, to reduce the chances of being a victim of burglary. If you would like a survey please call the non-emergency number: 101 and ask to speak with someone from the Neighbourhood Police team.

The festive season can mean burglary season. At this time of year you can be so busy it's easy to forget things and become distracted. Don't leave presents in your vehicle it takes seconds for someone to grab them from your vehicle, never leave your keys in the car. Keep presents out of sight in your home, displaying them under the tree could attract an opportunist thief.

If you are going away do not advertise an empty house on Facebook or other similar sites. If you're not at home during the hours of darkness you may be at an increased risk of burglary. If no light is on in your home, curtains are not drawn, and no car is in the drive, it's an obvious sign to an opportunist burglar that nobody is at home. Use timer switches on lights and ask a neighbour to keep an eye on your place or even park their car on your drive. Over the festive season, drink sensibly and if you are out, stay in touch with your friends, keep your belongings with you and your valuables out of sight. Do not drink and drive.
