Parish Council News

Following this year's AGM the Parish Council is now made up of Stuart Fraser (Vice Chairman), Bob Lott (Chairman), Stuart Norman, Lesley Shaw and Rob Traynor. This leaves us one member short, so we would love to hear from anyone who would be willing to join us and help with "village business". Typically this involves dealing with village planning applications, responses to District or County consultations, and general upkeep of the village, its surroundings, and amenities. It is important that the PC keeps a full and active membership. Should it not, control could be removed to county hall resulting in a loss of local influence, concern and interest in our village affairs.

As a reminder the PC meets every other month and residents are invited to attend to raise any issues of concern to them. Details of our meetings are available on the village website and notice board, including the dates, the subjects under consideration (Agendas) and the outcomes of the meetings (Minutes).

Ten years on from the last Parish Plan we will be developing a new plan under the leadership of Rob Traynor. Again if you would like to take an active role in the development of the plan please contact Rob as he will be forming a team to help undertake the task over the coming weeks.

A fund has been established to support the village hall kitchen project. £1000 has been allocated directly from PC funds and we would welcome any further donations towards this worthy cause. Please note that donations given to the PC for this purpose may have VAT reclaimed, while those gifted directly to UVHAT will be liable for 20% VAT. Full control over how any monies are spent will remain with UVHAT.

Two 12m x 6m marquees have now been purchased by the PC thanks to funds raised by and donation from "Uptonogood?". These are mainly for use at village events such as the Church Fete and "Uptonogood?", but they are also available for private hire to local residents.

Once again we have had a clear indication from OCC that our bus service is under threat. The message is use it or lose it, therefore please consider leaving the car on the drive once in a while and take the bus. Apart from anything else, kids love it, and you may be grateful for it when you can no longer drive for whatever reason and come to rely on what remains of our public transport system.

Rectors Reflections

Journeys

Well, summer is here. Sunshine, warmth, and, for many, a time of journeys - days out with the family, holidays at the seaside, trips to foreign parts. Easy journeys, difficult journeys; busy motorways and quiet country lanes; crowded airports, and anonymous departure lounges.

Journeys can, of course, be about much more than simply getting from A to B. The image of a journey is often used to describe a spiritual experience, and many people go on journeys with the intention of connecting with some deeper reality. Sometimes we know where we are heading, and what we will find; but sometimes we set out without any real sense of our ultimate destination at all, and are open-minded about what to expect. Sometimes it's the travelling itself that matters; at other times, the travelling is an inconvenience, which we want to be over with as soon as possible.

If you see your own life as a journey, I wonder whether you're the sort of person who focuses on simply enjoying the journey, or whether you're the sort of person who can't wait until you get to the destination? Perhaps you are a mix of both.

Describing life as a spiritual journey is a commonplace. But it begs an interesting question: if our life is indeed a journey, what sort of journey might it be?

Some spiritual journeys are about travelling to an entirely new place. We set out from where we are, and travel to a new place. This new place might be the place to which we had intended to travel - or it might be somewhere which we had never dreamed we would visit. (There is an old joke along these lines. How do you make God laugh? Tell Him your plans!).

Other spiritual journeys are about coming back to where we started from, but finding that things are different. Perhaps the place itself has changed during our absence; or perhaps the place has remained the same, but it is we who have changed. We have gone on a journey, and have come back a different person- perhaps with a different view on life, or with different values.

Where does God fit in with all of this? Where ever we're going, God is there at the beginning of our journeys, He is there at the end, and He is our companion on the way, as a friend and as a guide.

We never travel alone!

Notes from the Allotment

I'm glad I was late planting my second early potatoes, several of my neighbours at the allotment have had the haulms badly frosted, but they will recover after a couple of weeks. Mine were still underground when the frost hit.

You may notice that your rhubarb is sporting large flowering spikes; these are only going to sap energy so whip them off quickly and compost them.

The broad beans will also be flowering now and it will be time to pinch out those juicy tips to make them less attractive to blackfly that seem to materialise out of nowhere. This also encourages the flowers to set, and the tips themselves make a tasty vegetable when lightly steamed like spinach, delicious! A good idea all round.

My second crop of broad beans are sprouting nicely now to follow on from the winter-sown ones, and I'm hoping to plant out some French and runner beans soon - we are promised a warm spell and hopefully no more frost - but you can never tell with British weather. Also in the ground are some beetroot seedlings, they always seem to struggle to get going so I've kept them in the seed tray until quite sturdy, I hope they make it this time.

In my raised bed I have radishes, spring onions and a second row of carrots - the first row was completely eaten, I presume by slugs, when they were barely an inch high. I've sown another row and sprinkled them with perlite, which I'm hoping they will find uncomfortable to crawl over; it's a better alternative than slug pellets. Whilst on a recent to the Centre for Alternative Technology in Machynlleth, I bought a lovely little book all about slugs, highly amusing and guite useful. In addition to the aforesaid pellets there are parasitic nematodes, which don't seem to work for me. Other solutions offered include sprinkling salt around the plants, ditto bran, crushed (baked in a cooling oven) eggshells, coffee grounds and sawdust. Another idea is to spread comfrey or cabbage leaves on the ground - the slugs gather underneath and you then pick up the whole lot and throw them in the compost bin, where they munch away happily on stuff you don't need any more! And finally, I saw in a local health food store that slug slime is apparently good for the skin - someone has made a body cream out of it! And you thought slugs were only a nuisance...

Harwell Village "at risk of losing its identity"

More details have been unveiled for a long-awaited 2,550-home development on the edge of Didcot.

Developers behind Valley Park, near Harwell, will hold an exhibition on its masterplan at Didcot Civic Hall next Tuesday.

The plan - mooted since 2009 - also includes three schools, a neighbourhood centre, shops, a community centre and sports pitches.

Yet there are concerns Harwell will lose its identity as work is underway on 3,300 homes at nearby Great Western Park, to be finished by 2026.

Harwell Parish Council chairman David Marsh said work on Valley Park should not start until work is completed at Great Western Park.

He said: "The parish is roughly about 1,000 homes, with 900 in the village itself, but if all the housing proposals are allowed to go ahead there will be 6,000 additional houses in and around the parish.

"We will lose our village status and become a quaint little suburb of Didcot." He added that he was hopeful that a Harwell link road, from the A4130 east of the Milton interchange to the A417, would eventually be built despite funding concerns.

Tuesday's public exhibition will take place at the Britwell Road hall from 2pm to 8pm.
