#### **Rectors Note**



Something we can all do.

Here's a question for you: what do human beings need to thrive? There are certain basics, of course: food, clothing, shelter. But we need more than this if we are to flourish. We need to feel that we are loved, and have worthwhile work to do, whether paid or unpaid. We need a source of hope and purpose in our lives. In short, we need to look after the whole of our needs, spiritual as physical.

I think one of these spiritual needs is the need for encouragement. Encouragement gives us the strength to learn new skills, and the resilience to endure the stresses and strains of life. If we are lucky, we receive plenty of encouragement from our families and our teachers. But generally, as soon as we become adults, the supply of encouragement often dries up, and we are left on our own. Again, if we are lucky, we will have friends who encourage us during the ups and downs of adult life. Again, if we are lucky, we will have an encouraging work colleague or an encouraging boss. But I think many people today have to face the challenges of life and work without any significant encouragement from others.

Looking back at my school days, I can remember very fondly those teachers who both encouraged me and challenged me. Challenge by itself can be a bit overwhelming; encouragement by itself can provide little incentive for growth and the development of new skills. But challenge and encouragement together: what joy!

You might wonder why I am writing about the value of encouragement. Well, at this time of year, many Christians are reading a book of the bible called The Acts of the Apostles. It tells the story of the early Church, from Jesus's resurrection from dead, in c.30AD or so, to the time when St. Paul arrived in Rome, in c. 60AD or so. The book is full of stories of how Jesus encouraged the early Christians, both in his own person and through the Holy Spirit.

So encouragement is very much on my mind at present. We owe so much to the men and women who have encouraged us, both in the past and in the present. I wonder: who are we encouraging? Encouragement is something we can all do. It costs little, but its value is beyond words!

# **Wine Appreciation Club**

Spanish Wines - not just all about Rioja!

This month we were extremely lucky to welcome Abingdon's Majestic Ben to present a selection of Spanish and Iberian wines. This so happens to be a specific area of interest for Ben and that really came across in his very drinkable and excellent value choices.

Spain, in particular, has undergone a wine revolution over the last couple of decades and now produces some brilliant wines. It's not just all about Rioja! And for us it was a good opportunity to pair with some popular tapas dishes.

First, a lovely fruity complex Cava with some delicious salted roasted almonds and olives as aperitif. We then enjoyed a selection of light, balanced and very refreshing fruity wines from Spain and Portugal paired with some delicious garlic prawns and Spanish tortilla. Wines included a white Rioja, a crisp Albarino and a young Portugese Vinho Verde. They were perfect wines for a very sunny evening.

Next, we enjoyed a selection of very interesting drinkable reds from some great producers. Of course, there was a knockout Rioja Reserva and some very complex and rich reds including a noble Pétalos Bierzo, a moreish Douro red and a deep, dark, intensely fruity oaked Ribera del Duero. Spanish meatballs and delicious chorizo were our tapas choices.

We also managed to squeeze in a quick review of the recent Wine Club survey results and to hold the prize draw (well done to our winner!) We are obviously happy that members seem to overall love the club but we're always interested in feedback and will revisit the suggestions at next month's meeting.

Speaking of next month's meeting, our next one is Member's Wines. We are excited to see what wines will be presented by our own members. Please come along on Wednesday 16th May for this popular event!

#### **Theatre Group**

In March, 15 members of the Upton Theatre Group visited the Watermill Theatre near Newbury to be entertained by a performance of Richard Brinsley Sheridan's play, The Rivals.

This was Sheridan's first play, written in 1774 when he was just 23 and, being recently married, in need of a little ready cash. After an inauspicious first night and some hasty rewriting it became a great success and set Sheridan on a course to be not only one of the best-known playwrights of his generation but also a theatre-owner and MP.

The play is set in Bath in the 1770s, when that city was a hot-house of fashion, society and scandal. Driven from Dublin by debt, Sheridan's family had settled in Bath in 1770 and as a young man-about-town, Sheridan would have had first-hand knowledge of the foibles of contemporary society. A comedy of manners, it's a throw-back to the Restoration comedies of a century before. Beth Flintoff's skilful adaption included a new prologue to transport us in rhyme back to 18th century Bath and back to 21st century Berkshire at the conclusion.

To set the scene.....Jack Absolute, a dashing army captain, is in love with Lucy Languish, but adopts the disguise of the impecunious Ensign Beverley, pandering to Lucy's fanciful notions of a lifetime of romantic penury. His father Sir Anthony, in the meantime, is doing his level best to arrange a suitable marriage for Jack and as luck would have it has chanced upon Lucy as a suitable candidate via her guardian, the moralistic Mrs Malaprop. Jack forcefully spurns his father's suggestion, blissfully unaware that his beloved and his father's proposed bride are one and the same....

Thus we embark on a romp of comic misunderstanding and mayhem, incorporating secret notes, unbridled passions and even a duel, or at least a coward's attempt at one, but readers will be relieved (though probably not surprised) to hear that it all ends happily ever after.

This was my first visit to the Watermill which, for those who have not yet had the pleasure, is an absolute delight. The theatre has been built within the old mill building and is an intimate space seating 200 in a small stalls area and a gallery. The stage apron spreads generously into the auditorium and literally to the very feet of the Upton contingent, for whom Malcolm had secured seats in the front row. Hearing aids and glasses were quite superfluous! From such a vantage point we were able to observe the cast in close-up; woe betide anyone who might have briefly dozed after the splendid meal we enjoyed in the Watermill's restaurant before the play began.

In a strong cast, Ncuti Gatwa was an ardent, impassioned Jack Absolute while Julia St John hammed up the gift of a role as the Mrs Malaprop - she was absolutely encouragable, or should I say incolourable? Daniel Abelson was memorable in the role of the hapless Bob Acres, up from the country and outwitted by his urbane companions, while who from Upton could have failed to observe the startling similarity between Jack's chum Faulkland (James Mack) and the Rev. Jason St John Nicolle?

All returned to Upton thoroughly amused and exceptionally well fed - a splendid night out!

#### Citizens Advice

If you are have recently had your Personal Independence Payment (PIP) reduced after a reassessment and need help to get it restored , your local Citizens Advice Office will be pleased to help you.

The first thing to try is the process known as "mandatory reconsideration", which involves asking the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) to take a second look at your assessment decision.

You'll normally need to contact the DWP within a month of your assessment decision being issued, and it's best to do so in writing. Your letter should list all the reasons why you think your PIP award should not be reduced.

Once the DWP has looked again at your assessment decision, you'll receive a Mandatory Reconsideration Notice, which states whether your request has been successful or not. If it is successful, your original award will be reinstated and your payments backdated.

If you are unsuccessful, you could appeal against your assessment reconsideration by taking your case to tribunal. For help filling in the tribunal form and preparing for your hearing, contact Citizens Advice.

Already in 2018 Citizens Advice South Oxfordshire and Vale has helped at least two clients to win appeals against the reduction or cessation of their PIP benefits.

## Wildlife Surveys

If you are a wildlife enthusiast you have the opportunity of helping out the People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) by taking part in two surveys that they are currently running.

The National Water Vole Monitoring Programme is an annual event that this year is running from 15th April to the 15th July.

Affectionately portrayed as Ratty in childhood favourite *Wind in the Willows*, water voles were once a common sight along UK riverbanks and waterways. However, over the last century water voles have experienced the most severe decline of any wild mammal in the UK as they face threats from invasive mink, habitat loss, agricultural intensification and river pollution.

Volunteers are asked to survey one of the nearly 900 pre-selected sites across the UK, recording all sightings and signs of water voles along a 500m length of riverbank once during the course of the two-month period. Sites that are already being surveyed can also be registered with the NWVMP. Though no prior experience is required, volunteers will need to learn how to identify water vole field signs. A survey pack, including clear instructions on how to do your survey and a field signs ID guide, will be provided.

Stag beetles are Britain's largest land beetle with males reaching up to 7.5 cm in size. They are also one of the most spectacular looking insects, with a males' huge mandibles (antler-like jaws) making them easy to spot!

Between June and July, PTES is asking for families, individuals or groups of friends in the UK to record sightings of stag beetles, as part of an ongoing European study into these impressive, yet endangered beetles. Taking part in the European Stag Beetle Monitoring Network couldn't be easier; all volunteers need to do is walk 500m, six times during June and July on warm, summer evenings, counting and recording any stag beetles they see. So whether you're on your evening dog walk, a post-work jog, popping to the shop or walking to your local pub, you can help!

# **Planning Appeal**

Many of you will recall that in October 2017 there was a planning application to build a housing estate on the field on your right as you drive into Didcot from West Hagbourne. The proposal was turned down by South Oxfordshire District Council Planning Committee, but the developers have appealed and a public inquiry is to be held in Upton Village Hall from 22nd to 25th May, starting at 10.00am on Tuesday 22nd. The inquiry is open for anyone to attend, in whole or in part. The Planning Inspector will open the proceedings by presenting the agenda and asking who wishes to speak during the inquiry. It will be very disappointing if the appeal is upheld as the field is an important part of the green barrier between Didcot and villages in this direction. The field forms part of the Green Gap advocated in the Didcot Garden Town Plan so development is not supported by that plan. It is one of the rare fields where you can still see the remains of the old ridge and furrow farming method and everything possible must be done to protect it from the relentless Didcot sprawl.
