St Mary's Churchyard

Passers-by will have noticed that the churchyard has appeared in need of a trim at some times during this summer. This was the result of an experimental policy to allow the growth of grasses and wild flowers to encourage the insect population, as is being done elsewhere in the village.

At its meeting in June, the PCC reviewed the position in the light of comments received from villagers. It was decided that the parts of the churchyard fronting Church Street and the lane which runs down to the fields on the south side would be regularly cut as before, while the area to the rear (north) of the church, and on the east side, should be allowed to grow during the summer and cut back later in the year. The areas of longer grass will have paths cut through them to allow access for people to enjoy what we hope will become an area containing a variety of attractive meadow flowers growing in the grass.

The cemetery (the separate area surrounded by railings to the east of the church) will be regularly cut throughout the season as this is in active use and graves are regularly visited. As ever, we are grateful to Roy Locke for his great work in keeping these areas cut and tidy.

The currently unused cemetery extension to the rear of the existing cemetery is owned by the Parish Council which has its own plans for managing this area as a wildflower meadow.

We hope these policies meet with the approval of Upton residents but as ever, we would welcome comments and feedback.

With Covid case numbers increasing more people are finding themselves having to self-isolate as a result of a positive diagnosis or close contact with someone who has tested positive. It's so important to self-isolate in either scenario to help stop the spread, but we know this is difficult for people and it's tempting to just pop out to get the shopping or run an errand.

That's where the community hub comes in - we're continuing to help link residents up to food support, either by signposting to help organising shopping, arranging for a click and collect shopping order to be collected or getting an emergency food parcel out. Local News

Valley Park Update

We (Hayleigh and Sarah) continue to meet regularly with the Planning officers at the council to stay up-to-date with the progress of Valley Park. It is very clear that the application will not come back to planning committee for further consideration until all of the reasons for deferral back in February have been addressed. One of the main reasons for deferral was the proposed roundabout design, and the issue with it prioritising car users over all other modes of transport. The developers have since issued a new design with traffic light-controlled crossings closer to the junctions of the roundabout, which is a step in the right direction. Our latest meeting with Vale planning officers, county highways officers and our new county councillor Sally Povolotsky was also attended by the county council cabinet members for Highways and the Environment. They are now fully briefed on the situation with the Valley Park roundabout and it is very encouraging that the senior leadership of the new county council administration are taking an active interest in this key issue for Valley Park.

Another key area to be addressed was the lack of healthcare provision at Valley Park. The good news is that the Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group are now engaging with the developers and have requested the following:

- £2.841m from the Valley Park development is secured towards the proposed GWP healthcare centre; and,

- Should the GWP healthcare centre not proceed, £3.261m is secured from the Valley Park development which will enable OCCG to secure land elsewhere and build a healthcare centre or extend an existing health centre; or,

- 0.25 Ha Land is provided at Valley Park for a new GP health centre at nil cost and £2.841m capital is provided towards its

This information will be published on the [planning application webpage](#) shortly, and a response is awaited from the developers as to whether they will agree to this request.

Proposals for new Parliamentary constituency boundaries

The Boundary Commission for England (BCE) has published its initial proposals for new Parliamentary constituency boundaries and launched an eight-week consultation, which closes on **2 August 2021**. People can comment on a range of issues such as where the proposed new boundary lines are to the names of the constituencies. You can view the proposed changes for the south east on [the Boundary Commission website](#). In particular, we would draw your attention to numbers 28 and 41-45 which detail proposals for Oxfordshire. In summary, these include:

- significantly reconfiguring the Wantage constituency, which would become more compact. It would also be renamed Didcot and Wantage to reflect its two main population areas.

- increasing the number of constituencies in Oxfordshire from six to seven
- making relatively minor changes to the Henley and Oxford East constituencies

Note from Hayleigh and Sarah: these proposals only affect our parliamentary

constituency (currently Wantage), in which residents vote for an MP during General Elections. The proposals do not change anything about the current parish, district or county council boundaries.

Council Meetings

Due to the recent legislation change regarding council meetings, this meeting will be held in person at 135 Milton Park. However, the new hybrid format will still be used, where the meeting is conducted via video conference and broadcast online, and members of the public can choose to attend remotely or in person. Councillors can also attend remotely but are not permitted to vote unless present in person.

Environmental Note

Welcome to Blighty

Ever wondered why the UK is nicknamed Blighty? I have a theory, based on the loss of my tomato crop for the second year running to a fungal infection called late blight. It likes wet, warm weather - whenever you get temperatures above 10 degrees C and 6 or more hours of 90% humidity on 2 consecutive days, there's a serious risk of blight. (This is known as a 'Hutton Period', which gets its name from James Hutton, one of those Scots enlightenment brainiacs who thought up modern geology while on a break from being a farmer.) The point - made more directly elsewhere by meteorologists - is that the climate is changing dramatically.

So when thousands of scientists and politicians finally make it to Glasgow for COP26, the international conference on climate change, there'll be more pressure than ever to do something immediate and meaningful. Setting quotas won't cut it. Relying on yet-to-be-invented technologies won't either. And since the UK government has already done the easy stuff like phasing out coal-fired power stations, only hard yards remain.

One way to get near the 2050 net zero target might be to tax carbon. But our political parties have been so successful in weaponising the notion of increased taxation that even environmental levies which get huge public approval when implemented, for example the plastic bag tax, turn ministers into sweaty messes. Surprise, surprise, a consumer tax on goods and services was recently rejected by the UK government in favour of a trading system for industry.

In the absence of serious financial levers, it falls to individuals to make low-carbon choices. Most emissions that we control personally come from heating and transport, so that's where the biggest carbon savings can be made. Air source or ground source rather than oil or gas, EV rather than petrol engine. Initial outlay will be higher, but the risk to tomatoes - and other living organisms including ourselves - will be considerably lower.

Upton Nature Garden

Exciting finds on the nature garden site next to the village hall last month: a pyramidal orchid, several field voles, and a slow worm!

We're aiming to prepare the ground in September ahead of planting in October and November.

We haven't been given the final grant figure for the garden by Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment yet, but we know there's going to be a shortfall in the amount of funding we receive for shrubs and plants. So we need your help! Could you donate any of the following native species:

Foxgloves (*digitalis purpurea*); honeysuckle (*lonicera periclymen*); ivy (*hedera helix*); sweet briar rose (*rosa rubignosa*); wild privet (*ligustrum vulgare*); spurge laurel (*daphne laureola*); guelder rose (*viburnum opulus*); spindle (*euonymus europaeus*); barberry (*berberis*); juniper (*juniperus communis*); dogwood (*cornus sanguinea*); holly (*ilex aquifolium*).

We'd prefer smaller plants - ones grown from cuttings or seeds of your own stock would be ideal - because these can adapt and establish themselves to the conditions in the nature garden more easily than mature plants.

We'd also like your logs or stumps to provide high-spec homes for insect families. If you're planning to fell a tree, please call Brian or Kieron, or email us at support@nature-garden.co.uk
