Services at St. Mary the Virgin

The Harvest Festival will be a service of thanksgiving not only for our farmers, producers and suppliers but also to those who share so generously. With many in our community continuing to support the local food bank throughout the year, since this custom was started at Harvest Festival last year, all gifts for this year's service will once again be given to the food bank. They are now able to accept fresh produce as well as tinned and preserved food, so surplus garden produce would be very welcome. Please leave all contributions for the service in the church porch.

Following advice from the Diocese, we will continue to encourage people to wear face coverings and to observe social distancing while in church. Communion will be in bread only. Congregational singing will be allowed when it is safe to do so: as the virus spreads via droplets, to be able to sing will depend on the numbers attending and the ability to be socially distant from others.

Parish Council

The Parish Council held a meeting on Tuesday 21st September in the village hall. The next Parish Council meeting is scheduled for Tuesday 16th November at 7.30pm also in the village hall. All parishioners are welcome to attend the meetings. The Clerk asks that anyone who wishes to attend makes this known at least 24 hours before the meeting, so that sufficient space can be made for all attendees.

The upkeep of the recreation ground continues to take considerable thought and action. The mowing rota is working well, but all other work has temporarily been taken over by members of the council, led by Ben Shaw. Ben has given a tremendous amount of time of late to ensure that the ground was ready for the summer fete and now other remedial work is taking place. However, the council still needs volunteers to come forward and form a rota for keeping the recreation ground in good order. The council is looking at placing a fence round the play areas. Initial quotes run in to thousands of pounds, so considerable thought and planning is required. In the meantime, and one of the reasons why a fence is required, is because people allow their dogs to relieve themselves within the play areas. Dogs are not permitted in the play areas, so please keep them out and clear up after them.

The Parish Council would like to give notice that the gates of the recreation ground will be closed at 9.00pm every night and reopened at 7.00am every morning with effect from Friday 1st October.

Dear Garden Waste customers,

We regret to inform you that garden waste collections in our districts will remain paused at this time to ensure we can continue to provide core waste collections - rubbish, recycling and food - without major disruptions. The garden waste service was suspended last month due to our contractor, Biffa, struggling with the national shortage of HGV drivers, and during that time we have been working hard to encourage Biffa to find solutions to reinstate the service.

We continue to work closely with our contractor, Biffa, to provide us with further information as to how they propose to reinstate their contracted services as soon as possible. As soon as we are able to, we will update you on when the service will be resumed. Until that time we are asking you to continue to remain patient and thank you for your understanding.

Please could we ask you pass the news onto neighbours, especially those without access to the internet or social media. We are extremely sorry for the inconvenience we know this is causing, and we apologise that this service has fallen beneath the levels you have come to expect. We have asked Biffa to provide options so they can make it up to anybody who doesn't receive the service they should this year.

Village Produce Association

Well, it looks as though the Indian Summer is over and autumn is well on its way. The date and venue for the VPA Annual General Meeting will be announced in the November issue of the Upton News and Blewbury Bulletin. A notice will also be in the Blewbury Post Office. It doesn't look as though Covid is going away any time soon - so please keep yourselves well and safe. We won't be holding our Christmas Social, given that so many people are still observing social distancing.

Meanwhile, this is the time to start putting the allotments to sleep. It's been a bit harder this year because I've given up trying to compost. The problem is there's not enough variety and mixture of vegetation to help with the composting and it therefore takes a long long time to decompose. The problem is it also becomes a nesting site for rats (not my favourite rodent). We all know that rats are commonplace on allotment sites but I do try to keep them away from my plots.

Despite the strange weather pattern we had this season, the allotment has provided some pretty good produce. Unfortunately, the tomatoes were hit with blight but I had managed to pick some green ones beforehand and made a few jars of tomato chutney. Surprisingly the potatoes were not affected. I have dug up four rows of potatoes this weekend (last weekend of September) and was delighted at the size and quality - if I store them properly I should have enough to see me through the winter. I have three more rows to dig - the ground is so hard because of lack of rain it's taking longer than usual.

I have a bit of sad news. Pumpkin, my little white hen was taken ill last month. It was all very sudden - she was very quiet on the Sunday and I put it down to it being because it was one of the very hot days. On the Monday morning she didn't run up to me like she always did and I could see that she was having a problem breathing. I took her to the vet and was given the news that Pumpkin had a respiratory infection and there was nothing they could do for her. She is now in chicken heaven. Fortunately, the other three girls didn't catch it and are all fighting fit. I think they missed her initially but have now settled down as a threesome.

On a happier note, I picked 6lbs of plums off my tree yesterday and will be making some jam when I finish writing this newsletter. They're not Victoria plums and I need to find the label to see what variety they are - the tree is only three years old and this is the best crop I've had.

I'm hoping the weather holds so I can put the plots to bed before it gets really wet - the soil is clay so you can probably imagine what it's like!

Rector's Note



Offering a Prayer on 13th October

Most days of the year are associated with a particular saint. The official saints of the Church are a curious mix of men and women from different countries and cultures. Few Saints have lived perfect lives, and many Saints have been controversial figures. But there has been something about their lives which the Church has felt to be worth celebrating.

An interesting case in point is St Edward the Confessor. Edward was King of England between 1042

and his death in 1066. He developed a reputation for holiness during his own lifetime, and some hundred years later the Pope gave him the official status of a Saint. His body was placed in a magnificent shrine in Westminster Abbey; the shrine was despoiled at the Reformation, but it has been subsequently restored, and is a splendid sight. Perhaps you have seen the shrine for yourself, on a visit to Westminster Abbey.

I'm writing about St Edward in part because it is his Saint's day on 13th October. But I'm also writing about St Edward because I'm thinking of our royal family today. What do we want from our Monarchy? Do we want members of the Royal Family to behave in different ways from the rest of us? Would we be happy if our Monarch developed such a reputation for holiness that people started to regard them as a Saint?

Edward was regarded as a Saint in part because he made himself available to his subjects, and he was also generous to the poor. Well, that was back in the 11th century, and the world was a very different place. It was a society which seems to have taken the existence of Kingship and aristocratic privilege for granted. We are a much more democratic society, and we tend to want our leaders to have earned their place on merit, rather than by accident of birth. Of course we are very fortunate in our country at present, in that our Monarch is a truly remarkable woman, who would be exceptionally well-qualified to be our Queen on merit alone. It is hard to imagine anyone else who would be able to carry out her roles and duties to a similar level of competence.

Whether we approve of the idea of Monarchy or not, I think we could all agree that our Queen deserves our respect and our support.

I wonder how we might best support our Queen? And how might we best pray for her, and for her family?

Wine Club

15th September marked the beginning of the Wine Club year with 36 members signing up for the evening, which kicked off with the AGM. Our Chairman Ian gave thanks to Ros Caffyn who has resigned from the committee (albeit she will continue to assist), and Brian Rippon was voted on.

The theme of the evening was blended wines, and members were treated during the AGM to a glass of Pinord Seleccion Brut Cava (Xarello, Macabeo and Parellada grapes), a light sparkling with refreshing citrus notes.

The first wine was an interesting and popular Italian white from Puglia, a Paolo Leo 'Renèe Bianco Organic' by Majestic. A blend of Chardonnay, Fiano and Sauvignon Blanc, the tropical fruit notes made it a good summer drinking wine. We followed with a Portuguese Selected Harvest White, available from Majestic or Strictly Wine, from the Santo Isidro de Pegões cooperative on the Setúbal peninsula near Lisbon - good with food, a full flavoured wine with aromas of orange blossom and fresh fruits which worked in harmony with the oak spice. This pushed the blends to the limits with no fewer than five varieties, Fernão Pires, Antão Vaz, Verdelho, Arinto and Chardonnay.

The final white, also from Majestic, was the St Cosme 'Micro Cosme' Sauvignon-Viognier from the Rhône valley - aromatic and refreshing, with notes of apricot, lychee, grapefruit and mango.

The reds started with a wine found in most of the supermarkets, on offer at £7. '19 Crimes Red' by Treasury Wine Estates topped the list in a recent survey as the UK's favourite supermarket wine, also the UK's number one millennial wine brand. "It's a taste you'll never forget", says the website, and some members agreed, preferring a little less sugar in their wine. Members heard about the app which brings the label to life when you point your phone at the bottle; the cash prizes for finding special corks, and the pop-up 19 Crimes tattoo parlour in London offering free tattoos...

The tone became a little more serious with a Buzet from Strictly Wine, 'Sans' without added sulphites. A Bordeaux blend of Merlot, Cabernet Franc and Cabernet Sauvignon from south-west France, it represented a good value option to similar Bordeaux wines a bit further down the Garonne river. This was followed by a Strictly Wine Rhône red - an opulent unoaked Grenache/Syrah/ Mourvèdre (GSM) from Domaine Combe Julière in Rasteau.

Members then heard about some of the challenges facing the wine industry, including global problems with shipping and haulage not to mention delays with customs clearance. Frost, hail, mildew, and fire damage have resulted in the worst French harvest in 50 years, while the New Zealand Sauvignon Blanc harvest is 20-30% down at the same time as global demand has dramatically increased. In consequence this most popular of wine varieties will become more expensive and harder to find in the coming months.

The evening finished with a lovely Ribera del Duero Reserva (also Majestic) from the Bardos winery. This is a high altitude blend of Tempranillo and Cabernet Sauvignon, with complex notes of dark fruit, chocolate and vanilla spice, a perfect end to a most enjoyable evening.

Upton Nature Garden

Over the weekend of 25-26th September we started the landscaping work on the nature garden site. The grass was removed to leave earth for the woodland shrubs, perennials, and native ground cover. The massive concrete foundations from the old playground equipment were dug up and removed from site. Smaller hardcore has been retained to form the base for the seating area and some paths. Some of the rubber matting from the slide area was also re-purposed as path base.

There are two sets of trenches where hedges will be planted. One hedge is between the meadow (bus stop) end and the seating area, and the other is the new boundary behind the village hall. NB there will be a gate in the hedge there too, even though the trench is continuous for now. The big pile of wood chippings next to the nature garden site will be used as toppings for the paths through the woodland area

So, what is the plan?

The Upton Nature Garden project aims to create a haven for wildlife and people that is a focal point for community activities involving biodiversity and the environment. Walk through the woodland glades; spot insects, fungi, flowers, birds and the tracks of small animals. Sit and relax whilst youngsters try out the log trail and babies enjoy the flickering sunlight through the leaves and branches. Enjoy the wildflower meadow spectacle in summer.

Inside the nature garden site, we already have

Mature copper beech, horse chestnut and field maple

Well shaded bank with hazel, willow and hedgerow beech

An area that has been dog excrement free for many years

Oxfordshire Conservation Charity recommended we plant blossom and berry bearing bushes, shrubs, and wildflowers; that we renovate the hedge along the roadside; and that we include boundary hedges that have edible fruit for birds (and people) to eat.

The final garden design has three areas that wrap around the village hall.

- (1) In the **Forest Sub-Canopy** there are native shrubs and woodland bulbs around the perimeter, and perennials and ground cover over a mound in the centre. The winding paths and log trail loop around the trees, and log piles and dead hedges return nutrients and encourage fungi, bugs, and insects.
- (2) The **Open Glade**, where the slide used to be, is bounded by new native hedge for seclusion. Part of the existing concrete base has been re-used for the seating area, which is surrounded by flowers and berry bearing shrubs. There will be shallow rooted plants near the hall and two clusters of fruit trees between the seats and the road.
- (3) In the sunniest part of the garden nearest the bus stop, in the **Meadow**, there are wide mown paths for pushchair and wheelchair access, and a wide

variety of meadow flowers to support pollinators like queen bumblebees who need that early nectar for the energy to find a nest site.

The garden will develop over the next few years and increase in interest as the plants grow and the wildlife moves in. There are information posters about the planned work schedule and design pinned to the boundary fences. More information and pictures on nature-garden.co.uk
