Field and Fountain, Moor and Mountain

These words come from the first verse of one of the traditional hymns sung at this time of year: "We three kings of Orient are, bearing gifts we traverse afar, field and fountain, moor and mountain, following vonder star". The verses go on to list the three gifts brought by the Kings to the baby Jesus: gold, frankincense and myrrh. The story is found in Matthew's gospel, and the word used for "king" in this passage can also be man". translated as "wise "Magus"; hence sometimes they are known as the Wisemen, or the Magi (the plural of Magus).



You might be thinking to yourself: what have words from a Christmas carol got to do with the month of January? The answer lies in a Church festival which always falls on 6th January: the Festival of the Epiphany. This is the festival when the Church remembers the visit of the Kings to the baby Jesus. The word "Epiphany" comes from a Greek word meaning "appearance" or "manifestation", and the "manifestation" in question is the "manifestation" of the baby Jesus to the kings. The significance of this is that the kings were non -Jews, and Jesus's appearance to the Kings shows that his life and teaching is relevant to all the peoples of the world, Jew and Non-Jew alike.

And what of the gifts which the Kings brought? Why were they chosen? Did they have particular significance? The gift of gold is often seen as signifying Jesus's kingship; the gift of frankincense, the fact that Jesus was God as well as Man; and the gift of myrrh, the fact that Jesus was to suffer and to die.

And what happened next, after the Kings had begun their homeward journey? We don't know. Did they become Christians themselves? Again, we do not know. All we do know is that the story of their visit was important to the early Christian community, and it was important enough to be included in Matthew's gospel.

The Kings had had the courage to journey into the unknown: to follow the star, not quite knowing what they would encounter. I wonder what is on our hearts and minds as we journey out into the year that lies ahead? Where might God be leading us?

Parish Council News

Temporary Road Closure

Hagbourne Hill will be closed between 09:30 and 15:30 starting on 09 January 2023 to facilitate the reinstatement of all road markings including centre lines and rumble strips at the top of Chilton road. Diversion is via Rowstock roundabout.

CCTV

The cameras which appeared mysteriously in the village in December were apparently part of a wider survey on behalf of the Didcot Garden Community Cycling, Walking Investment plan which aims to justify upgrading pathways such as Coffin Way.

The parish council chairman and our county councillor will be meeting in January with those responsible to stress the need for informing parishes in advance and for seeking permission before the exercise is repeated. Any data obtained from their four days of use in the recent freezing weather will be totally unrepresentative!

Upton Speed Watch Update

As you may have noticed we have not been too active over the last four months with Speed Watch.

This is due to the installation of the cycle path and Toucan Crossing on the A417 between Station Road and Chilton Road which has automatically slowed down traffic. My observation to date is the construction works have slowed cars speeding apart from the odd idiot who continued to speed and then brake hard and the idiot who sped through the lights when they were red.

When the temporary traffic lights were installed, traffic from Rowstock had to slow down before entering the village but traffic from Blewbury on the A417 still sped round the bend before the turn right into the High Street and left into Hollow Way. There are still more works to continue in January 2023 but all should be finished by mid January.

My proposal is to observe and receive comments back from you, the parishioners, as to what you are seeing and experiencing. From this we can decide if we need to go out with our speed-watch guns.

Village Consultation & Communication Meeting

On 15th December 2022 a Parish Council (PC) Consultation meeting was held in St Mary's church and, in spite of the village being in the throes of very cold weather, was well attended. Thanks to all those who took the trouble to turn out and to Paul Batho for opening the church for us. The following is a summary of the discussion points at the meeting and also from emails sent to the PC Clerk by villagers who could not make it in person.

The purpose of the open meeting with Parishioners on Thursday 15th December 2022 was to solicit their opinions and thoughts on the options for expenditure by the Parish Councillor for the financial year 2023/24.

 Opening the meeting, Neil Thorp explained to the audience the PC budget and options for expenditure which the attendees then discussed and gave their views.

2. Stock Proof Fence at end of recreation ground

- a. A long discussion was had covering many options, the legal necessity, and the timing of installing a new fence. This conversation was stopped as it had taken up a lot of time and there other more important items to discuss
- b. General acceptance that it was expedient to consider installing a new fence in the future but not in financial year 2023/24.

- 3. Maintenance and repair of the apparatus in the children's playgrounds.
- a. General feeling was the PC should not spend large sums of money on new equipment or major repair and maintenance.
- b. The PC should repair apparatus where it was economical and take out of commission if it was too expensive.
- c. The PC should budget for new equipment but survey the village as to whether the money should be spent before expenditure is committed.
- d. The PC should accrue funds for repair & maintenance, but replacements should be funded by grants if possible (e.g., the Magnox socio-economic fund which reopens in April).

4. Maintenance of recreation ground, footpaths hedges and verges

- a. It was recognised by the attendees and PC that that the volunteers did a very good job but were not able to maintain all the areas which needed maintenance on a regular and continuous basis throughout the year.
- b. The volunteers were getting older with no new people coming through to replace them.
- c. Graham De Wilde who led the volunteers explained what equipment was required and the time needed to do a professional job. Sitting on a ride-on mower cutting the grass on the recreation ground was only part of the job. The verges, hedges, footpaths, recreation ground perimeter needed to be worked on to get to a satisfactory standard, and then continuously maintained throughout the year.
 - The PC explained volunteers using their own equipment may be okay but would not be appropriate for the regular maintenance of the verges, hedges, footpaths, recreation ground perimeter. Also, the PC need to verify with their insurance company whether the volunteer approach using their own equipment could continue and be covered.
- d. The PC explained professional landscape equipment and tools would be required for continual maintenance. Even if volunteers could be found, equipment would need to be purchased or hired and anybody using it would need to be trained, certified, insured, and suitable protective clothing bought and worn. An expensive process.
- e. Graham thought that contracting professional Landscape and Maintenance companies with the professional equipment needed to maintain the verges, hedges, footpaths, recreation ground perimeter was the best way forward. The PC agreed with him and shared with the audience the quotes from professional companies to do this.
- f. The PC position was accepted, namely that a professional Landscaping and Maintenance company needs to be contracted with to bring the footpath, verges, recreation perimeter and hedges up to a satisfactory standard and then regularly maintain them throughout the year.
 - The contract would have SLAs (Service Level Agreements), payment schedules, payments for work completed to an agreed standard which would be monitored and signed off by the PC.
- g. It was agreed a Working Group should be set up, made up of villagers, who would submit proposals and options to the PC for which paths, hedges and verges need to be maintained and which could be left to go wild.
 - Kieran Humphries volunteered to set up this Group with interested people from the village. Graham De Wilde and Brendan Heneghan put their names forward to be members.
- h. The PC informed the meeting that the PC had gone out to tender for a company to pick up the waste/rubbish bags left out from the recreation ground. All agreed the rubbish bags needed picking up and an outside company should be used because Biffa and the District Council had formally told the PC

they would not do this in future.

The PC informed the audience that they had gone out to tender requesting proposals from several companies but only had one reply which was from Organised Grime, owned by Ben Shaw.

The PC are pursuing discussions to reach a formal agreement with Organised Grime.

5. Trainee PC Clerk

- a. It was generally accepted that succession planning was a good idea, and a trainee should be found.
- b. The meeting discussed why a Clerk is needed. The PC explained a Clerk is needed to enable the PC to function and legitimise the processes and procedures e.g. submitting a request for the Precept.
- c. Stuart Frazer (an ex- PC Chairman) explained the Clerk's role and why they are so important. If the PC do not have a Clerk, the PC could not operate properly, would not have the necessary legitimacy, would fold, and be replaced by the District Council.
- d. The PC asked the audience for volunteers to come forward to be the trainee and eventual PC Clerk. This is left open.

6. Precept 2023

- a. Every member of the audience and e-mails from Parishioners had a different view as to the increase for the Precept for 2023/24; the range was from 0% to 15%.
- b. The majority thought it should be in line with the rise of District Council Rates of 5%.
- c. The PC agreed to pursue ways of supporting people in the village who were suffering hardship and may not be able to afford the increase. As part of the submission for the Precept increase reference would be made to assisting villagers who could not afford it.

7. Village Survey

a. It was suggested by Derek Whitmell that the PC should conduct a Village survey with regard to what needs doing in the village? What needs to be bought? Maintained? Repaired? Replaced? Or not replaced? The PC explained that such a survey could not be completed before the precept is set, which is mid-January 2022, but it would still be of great value.

Derek Whitmell to lead a Working Party to draft a Survey for the PC to consider. The timing for the draft would be asap.





Foundation and Parent Governors

The School Governing Board has extremely important responsibilities to perform in guiding and monitoring the work of the School. The governors work collectively and strategically in partnership with the headteacher and staff to manage the finances and general plans, staffing and policies of the School. This includes identifying the most important things that need to be improved, and approving plans to achieve that and ensuring progress. The full Board meets around five times every year and Governors also sit on one of two sub-committees, which also meet around five times per year.

The Parent Governor needs to be the parent/carer for a child currently attending Blewbury School. The Foundation Governor needs to be someone with a connection to St Michael's Church in Blewbury.

All adults who work within our School, whether as a paid member of staff or a volunteer, are expected to work and behave in such a way as to promote Blewbury School's aims, vision, values and educational purposes.

The School is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and expects all staff and volunteers to share this commitment. The successful candidate (s) will require an enhanced DBS clearance and appropriate references, and the School will support them in going through that process.
