# **A Significant Number**

Are you interested in numbers? Sometimes numbers can express something very particular and precise, but on other occasions numbers serve to express a more general idea. For example, if someone said to you, "I'll be with you in 5 minutes", does this mean that they will be with you in precisely 5 minutes' time, or does it mean that they will be with you shortly? Clearly, the meaning of "5 minutes" depends on the



context. The same is true of references to time in the Bible: sometimes the reference to a period of time should be taken quite literally, and on other occasions, it needs to be interpreted more loosely.

You may well wonder: why have I chosen to write about time? The reason is that this month will see the celebration of Ascension Day, which is by tradition celebrated 40 days after Easter. This year, Ascension Day falls on 18th May, and in our group of churches we will mark the occasion by a special service at Blewbury. Ascension Day commemorates the occasion when Jesus was "taken up to heaven": "he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of ... sight". The fullest reference to this mysterious event is found in the first chapter of the Acts of the Apostles. I describe the event as "mysterious" because something mysterious happened to Jesus' resurrected body, and the event has been remembered ever since. In terms of when it happened, the account in the Acts of the Apostles points to it happening 40 days from Easter Day. However, in the Bible "40 days" is sometimes used quite loosely to express an indefinite but significant period of time. So when we read that the Ascension took place "40 days" after Easter, the reference to 40 days does not necessarily have to be interpreted literally.

Why is the Ascension celebrated? In essence, it's because it is the companion festival to Christmas. At Christmas, we celebrate Jesus coming down from Heaven, being born as a human being; at the Ascension, we celebrate Jesus returning to Heaven, but still retaining his human nature. It's a way of saying that although we no longer have sightings of the risen Jesus in our day to day lives, he remains alive, fully human and fully divine. He is still present, caring for us and for our world - not just today, but for all time.

This is good news indeed!

#### Parish Council Meeting Date

The Parish Council has The next meeting is the Parish Council's AGM which will be on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> May at 7.30pm.

#### **Elections**

Six villagers put their name forward as candidates for the Upton Parish Council. There being six vacancies, the election was uncontested and all will become Parish Councillors from the 8th May.

#### Chairman's Chatter

It's a new financial year and a newly elected Parish Council is almost upon us! There have been some other developments this year too, such as the trial of a grounds maintenance company (with the appropriate machinery) to keep Upton looking at its best. We have had some concerns raised via direct text and WhatsApp as follows:

"Are the contractors meant to cut beneath the trees?" - Tracey "Have you seen Tracey's message about mowing beneath the trees? If true = biodiversity vandalism" - Brian "Critical time of year for wild flowers. Hence No Mow May" - Bob

"Yes unfortunately razed to the ground" - Tracey

In answer to these points, the contractor was asked to do one full cut back in April for the start of the year. Ideally this would have taken place at the end of the season but it didn't happen last year so it was decided that one would be done at the start of this year before No Mow May. Due to the weather, this took part across two cuts in April as the ground was too wet for the longer The Parish grass. specified that there be a wildlife corridor left which as you can see from the pictures is definitely the case.



The outgoing council previously held discussions regarding wild spaces and came to the conclusion that there should be a reasonable distribution of the amenity space between children's play area, sports space for games such as football, and nature. This has equated to roughly a third each. I will raise at the next full council the need for further public discussion covering biodiversity and conservation and how it should balance with the other needs of the village but, as you'll see from the wild life corridor to the







nature garden, there is more opportunity than ever for biodiversity in Upton's recreation ground.

There are two new waste bins installed in the recreation ground; thanks to Peter for helping to install these.

We are all looking forward to the Jubilee and a big thank you to Judy Robertson for getting leaflets delivered door to door for all those not online. We are looking forward to seeing you all there!

# Didcot & Villages Healthcare

The Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Berkshire West Integrated Care Board, with the support of officers from Vale of White Horse District Council and South Oxfordshire District Council, has been considering options to provide more GP consulting space in Didcot while longer term plans are made for delivery of new GP premises at Great Western Park.

Options reviewed included the conversion of some rooms in the Great Western Park District (community) Centre to be used temporarily for primary care or creating temporary space or a permanent extension on the existing Woodlands Medical Centre site to provide more space for patient care.

All options present some challenges. However, a decision has been made by the ICB to seek to increase the space in the short term on the current Woodlands Medical Centre site. Work is underway to assess the viability of this.

# **The Annual Parish Meeting Of Upton Village**

Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting of Upton held in the Village Hall at 7pm on Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> April 2023, facilitated by the Parish Council.

Present: Mr B Shaw (Chair / BS), District Cllr H Gascoigne (HG), County Cllr S Povolotsky (SP) and 14 Upton residents.

Welcome and opening remarks -

Parish Council Chairman Ben Shaw thanked everyone for attending. He noted that reports received from various groups were available on the village website (advised via Upton News Bulletin) and hard copies were available to anyone present.

Apologies for absence

Apologies were received from Peter McLaughlin, Ann Parham, and Jenny Slatter.

Chairman's Report

BS covered the main points of his Parish Council Chairman's report. He thanked all who had actively supported the village and noted the improved village communications via Facebook, WhatsApp, Upton News, the website and new notice boards. Following the UPC open consultation in St Mary's, contractors were being trialled for maintenance of the recreation ground.

District Councillor's report

HG spoke about the Valley Park development with its outline permission for 4,000 homes as this would have an impact on the whole area. Much discussion ensued about the impact on the area's infrastructure and healthcare in particular. The meeting made clear its dissatisfaction about the lack of performance of the Integrated Care Board and the performance of the District Council, who hold the \$106 funds, to expedite things. Childcare, also sadly lacking, does not come under \$106.

HG noted that there may be grants from the community infrastructure levy (CIL) which might be applicable to Upton.

County Councillor's report

SP's discussion centred on roads and the hazards presented by the gullies on Hagbourne Hill; these have been raised with the highways authority. BS reported that the imminent temporary closure is to permit close examination to assess the remedial work required. General repairs are still on an emergency fix only so it is important to continue to report defects via "Fixmystreeet".

Healthcare provision was covered too and SP advised reporting issues to "Healthwatch Oxfordshire" the county's independent health and social care watchdog as they can pressurise the ICB to take action. SP advised that her priority fund would re-open next month and that the Oxfordshire Volunteer Fund may have grants for which the village hall

could apply.

Other reports

No other reports were delivered in person and there were no reports from the PCC, the Nature Garden Group nor from UVHAT. The meeting felt strongly that UVHAT was not transparent in its operation and wanted governance meetings to be better publicised so that villagers could attend. Concern was expressed that there was a lack of involvement with the village and it was failing in its role as the centre of the community and was merely a "room for hire".

The open forum covered:

Access/fencing at the north side of the recreation ground Hazardous parking on Fieldside Cyclists exiting Chapel Furlong dangerously Conversion of Coffin Way footpath to Blewbury into a bridle path The cost / condition of the nature garden

The Chairman again thanked all for attending & brought the meeting to a close at 9.30pm.

# **Upton Wine Club**

#### April - Wines of Bohemia

It was really good to see such a large number of members and some new to the Upton Wine Club come along to the village hall for a presentation on wines across the Czech Republic. Known perhaps more for its consumption of beer, it was good to hear Alzbeta (Betty) Sutera from Wines of Bohemia take us all through a fascinating tour of some excellent wines that we may not have thought of trying.



We started the evening, as we sometimes do, with a sparkling wine called Chateau Radyne. Made with Welshriesling and Gruner Veltliner grapes, using the traditional method (second fermentation in the bottle - just like champagne), this wonderful wine was a great opener for the evening. Dry and crisp, it is a great alternative from perhaps your normal go to sparkling wines.

Our first white, from the Cech Winery, was called Veltlinske Zelene. Made from 100% Gruner Veltniner, a grape variety mostly grown in Austria. It came with some wonderful fresh green apple, peppery flavours that would make it a great summer wine.

The next wine was a white from a winery called Svoboda. They had produced a wine from a variety called Welshriesling, not to be confused with the more common Riesling grown worldwide. The same grape as used in the sparkling wine produced a lovely wine tasting of gooseberry and clean minerality, created by the chalk soils where the vines are grown.

Our last white divided the audience, which was great! Some thought it was the best wine of the evening, whilst others found it a little too powerful! The Castle Winery and vineyards have produced a wine from the Palava variety grape called Herbium. The result was a complex wine with hints of

rose petal and lychee. A great wine to try for your next curry, rather than perhaps the usual Riesling?

Our first red of the evening was called Rulandske Modre and came again from the Castle Winery and Vineyards producer (ZVB). As soon as it was poured, it looked and smelt like a Pinot Noir. We were not disappointed, with very familiar flavours of strawberry and cherry jam. It was a light Pinot Noir and those wanting the more complex deeper flavours of a Burgundy may be disappointed. However, for the price, it could not be beaten and was a firm favourite across all members.

Our next red was a Neronet grape from the Cech Winery. It was great to try some different grapes and again this one did not disappoint. Neronet is a cross-bred grape from several dark grapes, producing a rich dark red fruit wine, rich in sour cherries and cassis flavours. Definitely worth a try if you want to have something different.

Our next red was produced by the Horak Winery and named Svatovavrinecke. The grape, St Laurent, is the most popular grape grown across the Czech and is from the Pinot family. The wine was a lovely deep red, which had been aged in oak barrels for 24 months.

Our final wine for the evening, was Frankovka, produced by Tanzberg winery. A wonderful deep red with notes of forest fruit and plenty of depth. Definitely one that goes better with food and a great wine for a special with friends.

There was plenty of interest and on this occasion, orders, from our members. If you are interested in any of the above wines, check out Betty on www.bohemiawine.com.

For May, we will be bringing some high-end wines for our members to try and asking - "are they worth the extra ££££?"

**Football** The School has several very successful football teams. In recent games the year 4/5 team beat Harwell School 2-0 in an away fixture and also held on for a 0-0 draw against Whitchurch School. Not to be out-done the boys team has also had some good results and this report comes from Kian in Picasso Class: "On Tuesday, the boys played at home against Sutton Courtenay. We won 3-0. **Choir** We are very fortunate that our Headteacher loves singing and she has been working with a School Choir, and taking them to sing in some great venues. At the Cathedral they joined other ODST schools for the first ever ODST



singing event, and by all accounts they did very well and the whole of Blewbury village should be proud of them and Miss Reader of course.

We're closed for the Bank holidays Monday May 1st, Monday 8th and Monday 29th, allowances usually paid on a Monday will be paid the previous Friday.

Please remember that customs labels must be filled in before getting to the counter, and must include every item in your international mail if it's not just a card, letter or personal document. We now have to do an 'online data capture' which corresponds to the barcode on the customs label OR the barcode on a 'tracked or signed for' label. Hopefully this helps the customs departments and gets your post through quicker.

You may discover new staff in the post office when you pop in over the next few weeks, I'm breaking them in gradually!
