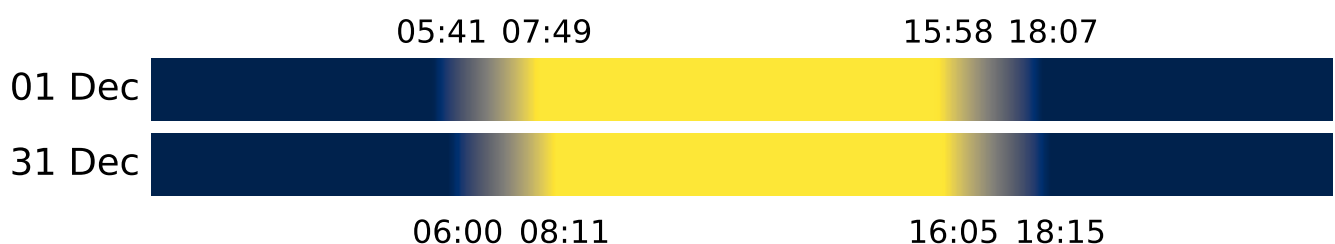

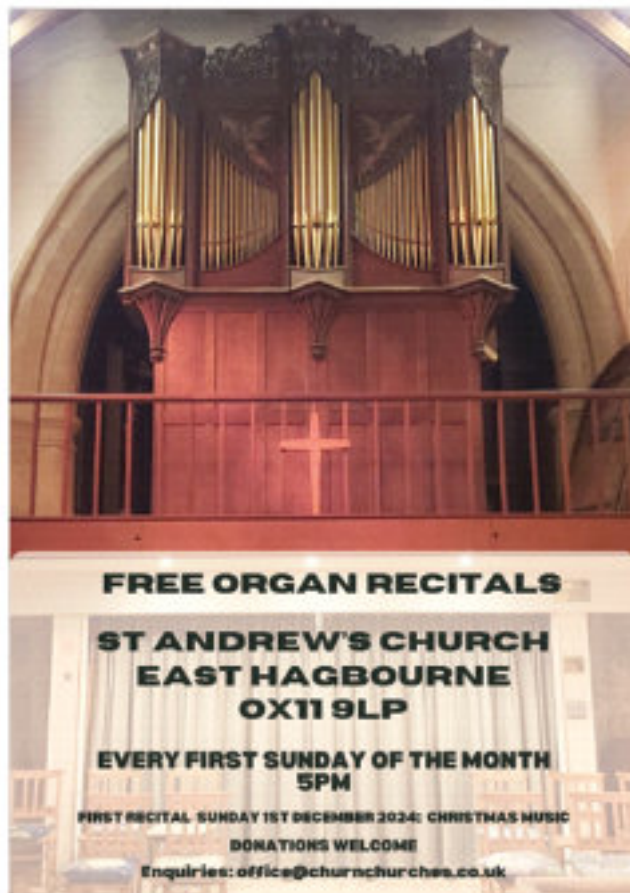
Father Jason writes ...

Before we know it, the Christmas season will be fully upon us. Christmas food is already in the shops, as well as a wide variety of Christmas cards. Perhaps you have already made plans for the Christmas period, and have begun your Christmas shopping? And of course there's the Christmas music. I am yet to hear my first Christmas carol, but I'm sure it won't be long. There's something about hearing a Christmas song which really gets us in the mood for celebrating the season.



But Christmas music can do more than simply get us into the festive spirit. It also has the power to help us connect with God, and the deeper meaning of the Christmas story. Different types of music will work for different types of people. I wonder what particular music helps you to connect with God? What music gives you a sense of mystery or purpose in your lives, or simply puts a spring in your step and smile on your lips?

Our lives are so busy, but I would encourage us to find some time to enjoy the music of the season. Speaking personally, at this time of year I always make a point of listening to Handel's Messiah. If you have never listened to it, or have not done so for quite a while, let me recommend it to you. I would also recommend listening to some seasonal organ music played on a traditional pipe organ. Most of our local churches have pipe organs, and there's something rather special about hearing them played, especially at this time of year – why not pop into St Andrew's Church on 1st December and listen to the organ recital? And nothing quite compares with the sound of a brass band playing carols on a Winter's day. Locally, we are so fortunate to have the Blewbury Brass Band, and it

Upton Parish Council

Upton Parish Council has removed the broken fencing from the end of the recreation ground and is looking at options of replacement fencing in keeping with the deed of covenant for the area. In particular it is worth noting that the fencing has to be stock-proof and the Council is doing all it can to find appropriate fencing at a good price.

Trimming and cutting back of the hedge/tree line of the Nature Garden along Station Road is due to be done in early December with the date TBC.

Many parishioners have raised concerns over the development work taking place at Wattle Farm and the adjacent areas in the AONB. The Council has been in extensive contact with the planning department who have asked to be continually updated with all ongoing work done at the site. All residents are asked to send their concerns and evidence directly to the [planning department](#) quoting Case Reference Number: 754851. The Council would like to encourage all villagers to support bringing this blatant disregard of planning law and policy to a halt.

Last, but by no means least, the Parish Council would like to extend a huge thank you to Bob Lott and Mike Tibbets, the organisers of Uptonogood?, who have made a tremendous donation to the Council funds this year of over £5500. This generous contribution will help the Council maintain the Recreation Ground and Play Area which, with constantly rising costs, are a major commitment for the village. There can be few villagers who are unaware of this superb event, but the Council would like to encourage everyone to get involved in the 2025 event whether by digging out their bikes, brushing off their cycle kit and entering one of the rides, or by stepping up to be one of the many volunteers needed and without whom the event simply could not happen. It is fantastic that Upton is the centre stage for an event that attracts 1000 cyclists! Roll on Uptonogood? 2025

Upton Wine Club

November is often a time when we often turn our thoughts to Christmas and look for something to help celebrate the occasion. It has become a bit of a tradition that we look at a few special wines to try at this time of year and this month was no exception.

We started the evening, tasting two Cremants: one from the Loire and the other from Bourgogne. There are a number of Cremants available from across France now and they have grown in popularity, with approximately 100 million bottles being produced each year. These wines give you a sparkling wine that is made in the same way as your typical Champagne, but at a fraction of the price and with the ability to use many different grape varieties. This gives a them wider range of flavours to suit different tastes and they are a refreshing alternative to Prosecco or Cava: if you have not tried Cremant yet it is definitely worth the a sip or two!

We next tried two Champagnes. It's very easy to head to the "safety" of a Grand Marque bottle such as Moet & Chandon, Veuve Cliquot or Bollinger. These offer great Champagnes with the consistency of knowing what you are getting but do have a price tag associated with them which can be a little eye watering! If you are looking for something a little different then look out for a bottle with the initials "RM" (Recoltant-Manipulant) on it. These are wineries that are independent and produce Champagne made from grapes from their own vineyards rather than being bought in, which is the norm for the well known brands. They do not have the marketing funds to promote the wine heavily but all effort is put in to making some exceptional, smaller volumes of wine that can be much better value than some of the well know brands.

Port is an absolute classic at Christmas. We tried 2-, 10- and then 20-year old Tawny Port. The first was served cold and the others at room temperature. Chilled port enhances its crispness and highlights its fruity notes, whilst serving it at room temperature brings out its rich, nutty and caramel flavours. Why not start off with a cold port and see how it changes over the course of the evening?

Sherry is another Christmas special but as at least one of our members will advocate, it's not just for Christmas! The amount of effort that is put in to making sherry is not always appreciated: it often takes 5-20 years to produce an Oloroso or Ximenez and the price point doesn't really reflect this. Some sherries therefore provide exceptional value for money. We tried a Romate Maribel medium dry Amontillado. Try it, and you might find yourself drinking it well beyond Christmas!

Finally, we tried a dessert wine from a lesser known grape called Tannat. If you are not a fan of Christmas pud, then look out for this grape, get yourself some dark chocolate, sit back and enjoy!

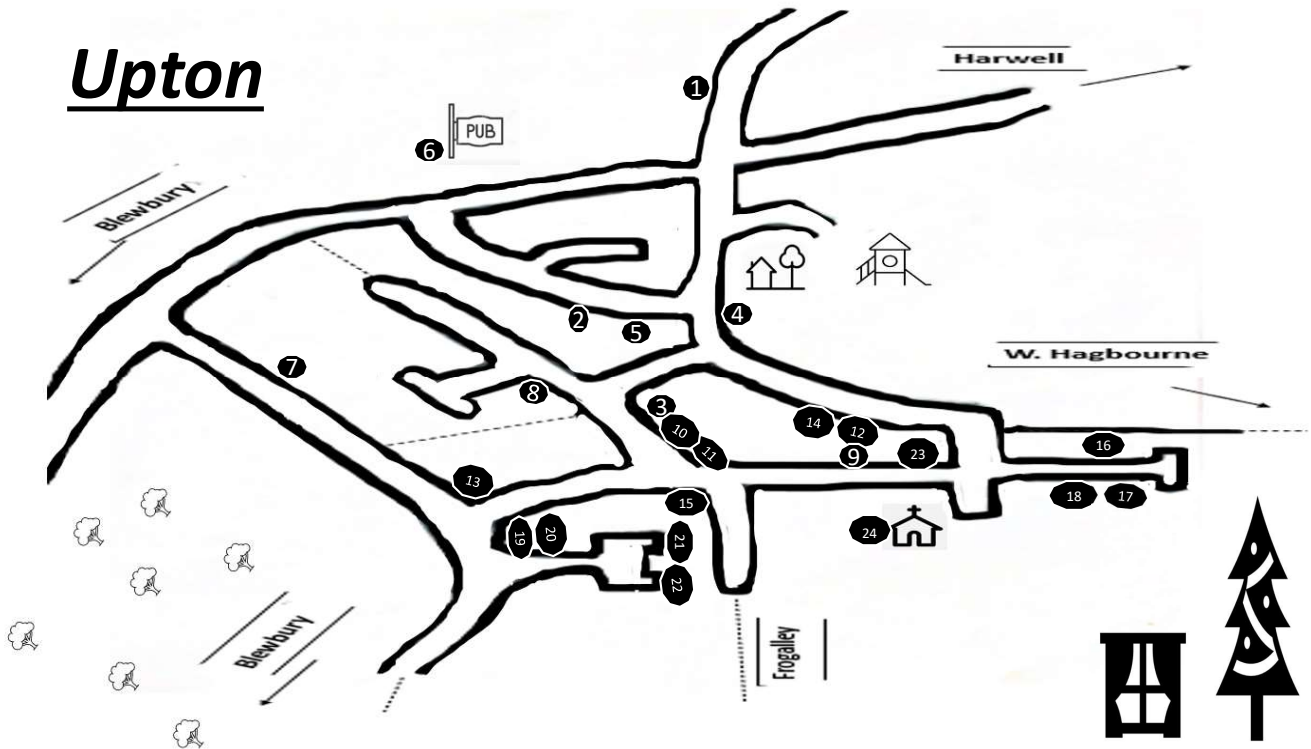

service in Harwell is a well organised and attended event taking place each year. Thank you to the RBL volunteers and members of the community who put everything into it to make it what it is.

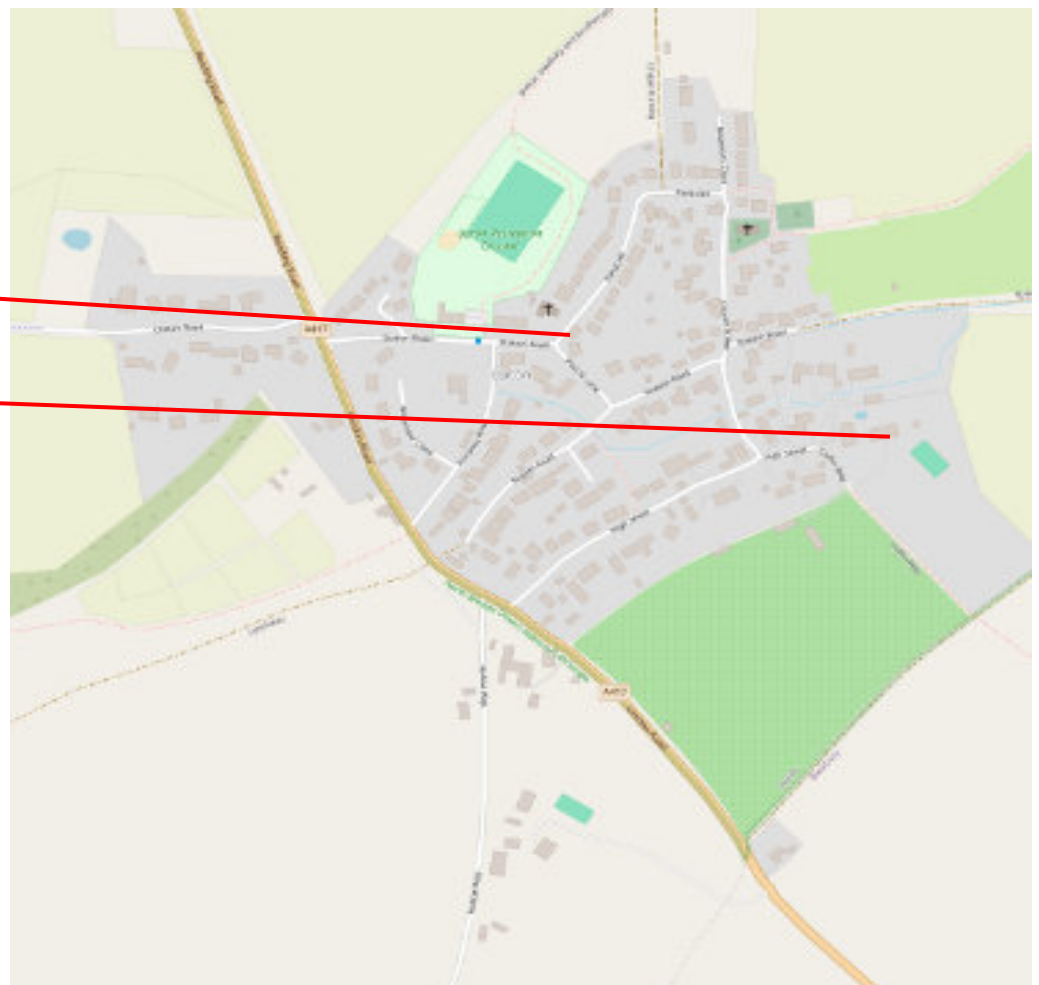

Thames Valley Police Commissioner

I'm Matthew Barber and I am the Police & Crime Commissioner in Thames Valley. Part of my role is to engage broadly with local communities and I am hoping to produce a regular column about local policing issues. This month, I would like to explain how we are tackling shoplifting in southern Oxfordshire.

One of the common myths about shoplifting is that it is linked to the cost of living. Whilst there will inevitably be some exceptions, we see that a significant amount of shoplifting is related to addiction (drink and drugs); however, the biggest rise is actually from organised crime. Sadly some retailers have been targeted, even in our more rural areas, but help is at hand. The new Retail Crime Strategy that I launched earlier this year makes supporting retailers a higher priority for the police.

Over the last year across South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse the number of charges for shoplifting has more than doubled (up by 106% so far this year), showing that the work to tackle prolific offenders is paying off. The police have identified the top suspects locally and as a result many are now behind bars.

Part of the effort to work more closely with shop staff is to increase reporting. We know that all too often shoplifting or assaults on staff can go unreported. Sometimes people feel the police won't act: if it is never reported, they certainly can't act! To help encourage reporting and information sharing I have funded a new system called *Disc*, which is being rolled out free to any retail business locally that wants to sign up.

The app allows them to report more easily to the police and, crucially, to share images from CCTV and mobile phones of suspects: of course, if you're watching a crime take place always call 999! The reports are shared both with the police and neighbouring businesses. I have been out with the police in Wantage, Didcot and Wallingford, talking to staff about their experience and getting them to sign up to the free scheme.
