## Father Jason writes ...

Have you ever wondered why Good Friday is called Good Friday? And why do Christians keep Good Friday as a special holy day?



For Christians, Easter is not only about Easter Day itself: it's also about Good Friday, when Christians remember the last hours of Jesus' life, leading up to his death on the Cross. The four gospels all contain accounts of the events leading up to Jesus' death, and these accounts form an important part of Christian worship on this day. In the past, many churches have put on a three-hour service, starting at 12 noon and finishing at 3pm, the traditional hour of Jesus' death. However, these long services have fallen out of fashion in recent years, and so many churches nowadays put on a shorter version, lasting an hour. There are readings and music, and opportunities for quiet reflection. If you have never been to a Good Friday service, I would heartily recommend coming along to one. We have several such services happening in our group of churches, including an online service so you don't even have to leave the comfort of your own home!

So why is Good Friday called "Good"? How can the Friday on which Jesus died be called "Good"? The short answer is that since the days of the early Church, most Christians have believed that Jesus gave his life "for us and our salvation": in other words, through Jesus' death on the Cross, we have forgiveness of our sins and the gift of new life. Christians have differed over the theological details. Some Christians have interpreted Jesus's death on the cross as a sacrifice for sin, offered up to God on our behalf. Other Christians have seen Jesus' death on the Cross as the ultimate illustration of the principle of loving self-sacrifice, and an encouragement that we should follow his example, willingly giving of our ourselves for the benefit of others. However Good Friday is interpreted, Christians have felt that Jesus' death on the Cross is actually good news, for us and for our world. Hence the name "Good" Friday. Hence also the widespread use of the Cross as a Christian symbol. God has used the suffering of Jesus on the Cross as a means of bringing new life and new hope to our world.



And this is what the celebration of Easter is all about: God's gift of new life and new hope to our world. Happy Easter to you all!

## Upton Parish Council

Upton Parish Council would like to remind all residents that the Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> May at 19.00 hrs in the Village Hall. It would be helpful if you could [email](#) the Clerk if you are planning to attend by Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> but all will be welcome and it will be a prompt start.

The Council would like to remind villagers that they are looking for two qualified First Aiders who would be prepared to have their names on the Village Emergency Plan who would effectively be 'on-call' to residents in a moment of crisis. This 'moment of crisis' is not the day-to-day attending of casual accidents but is strictly limited to large scale Emergencies, for example: major flooding where residents need to be evacuated from their houses. Applications are still invited from residents who would be prepared to attend a First

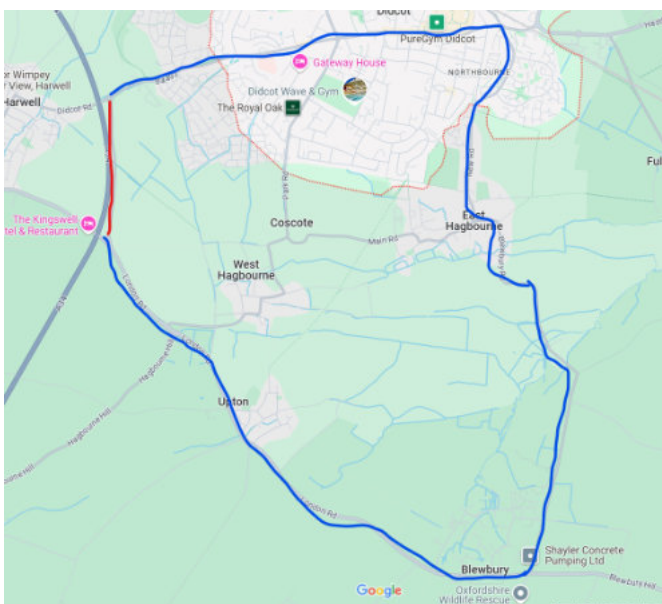
Aid Course, arranged and paid for by the Council, who would then be prepared to assist in such events and have their names and telephone numbers included on the plan for a minimum of two years. The plan is not for public circulation. If you would be interested and willing to participate, please contact the Clerk by [email](#).

The Council would like to draw your attention to the following temporary road closures to permit resurfacing work:

- Hagbourne Hill from 27<sup>th</sup> April 2025 up to and including 1<sup>st</sup> May 2025, between 09:30 and 15:30 hrs;
- Hagbourne Hill from 8<sup>th</sup> May 2025 up to and including 11<sup>th</sup> May 2025, between 04:00 and 18:00 hrs;



- Harwell Link Road from 08 May 2025 up to and including 11 May 2025, between 04:00 and 18:00 hrs



Maps showing the closed section (in red) and the diversion routes (in blue) are shown above. Please note that Notices for urgent works can last up to 5 consecutive days only. (*Editor's note: it is not clear from the OCC website whether both Hagbourne Hill closures will take place, so please be prepared to change travel plans if necessary*).

To receive garden waste collections from 1 April 2025, you must purchase an annual permit. This will replace your direct debit.

# Upton Wine Club

During April, we explored a topic that is one reason why many of us have an interest in wine. We looked at how food and wine can work together. Having dinner with our partners, or simply going out with friends, often will involve opening a bottle of wine. If you like your wine and food, they can work very well together, complementing each other to help enhance your experience. The challenge, of course, is choosing a wine that makes it a pleasant experience rather than a less pleasant one. When sitting at the restaurant table and looking through the wine list, how many of us focus more on the price than the wine itself to decide which one to buy? As a side note, the restaurant owners know this and often put the most margin on the second wine on the list (which is a commonly selected wine on the list)!

We tried to unpick this dilemma and followed some general rules of food and wine pairing to see if the principles worked. The first thing to say is the “rules” are only a guideline, whatever works for you is right! During the evening we looked at some wine “enemies”...food that is very sweet or rich in taste will make most wines taste a little dull, so you need to find a wine that is sweeter than the food to bring out the best in both. We tasted a Sauternes with a wonderfully rich chicken liver pate and this enhanced both wine and food. We also tried chocolate with Port (which also went really well with some blue cheese). Another wine “enemy” is the umami taste, which you find in foods such as olives, tomatoes and mushrooms. You can either try to complement the food, and enhance that strong flavour by choosing a heavier wine such as a Barolo, or as we did, try a contrast and choose a light, fruity wine. We served a mushroom risotto and selected a pinot noir from Germany, which cut through the deeper taste of the mushrooms.

We next tried a creamy dish - spinach and ricotta pasta – and paired the creamy sauce with a “creamy” wine: a lovely Chardonnay that had strong buttery flavours. The combination was exactly what we were looking for! We also tried a wonderful champagne that was paired with some exquisite salmon blinis; a pork pie with a lovely fruity Cote de Rhone and a beautiful acidic dry white that was balanced with some salty almonds.

All the pairings were excellent and well received and made for a very special night, made even better with contributions from some of our members!

## Upton Neighbourhood Watch

Following several recent events in Upton, a group of villagers are forming a new Neighbourhood Watch team. It’s early days but we are already seeing the benefits of working together.

For example, only a few weeks ago, many of us woke to find red grease smeared on our bins. By messaging on the “Upton Help” WhatsApp group we were quickly able to ascertain that this had happened to multiple households. The police advised us that they would be unlikely to visit and investigate if only one person reported it, so we passed this message on and 9 villagers reported the incident. This was great as it meant the police arrived, that morning, to check the safety of the substance and investigate. Thank you to all who helped.

---

Our local PCSO (Tom Walcott-Smith) came and spoke to our Neighbourhood Watch meeting in St Mary's Church on 20<sup>th</sup> March. Some highlights of his talk were:

- Recent incidents (car theft, bin grease etc) are isolated and we live in a very safe area;
- use 999 to report an emergency but report non-emergency incidents online rather than using 101. Please provide vehicle number plates where possible. (*Editor's note: the Thames Valley Police Commissioner highlighted problems with using 101 in last month's Upton News*);
- Use [Smart Water](#) to protect your valuables. The DNA in the water can be registered and can then be used for identification of recovered items;
- Car theft is reducing although 2 cars were stolen from Benson on 23<sup>rd</sup> March. However, theft from parked cars is on the increase, particularly at local beauty spots and the starting point of walks on The Ridgeway;
- There was a recent heating oil theft in Blewbury - owners of oil tanks may want to consider fitting a tank alarm or padlock;
- there is an increase in fraud targeting the elderly and vulnerable (please see also the [TVPC report](#) later in this edition);
- PCSO Walcott-Smith uses Blink CCTV and a Ring doorbell. He was not recommending these products but gave them as a suggestion for a cost effective solution to anyone thinking of installing something similar
- a pony and trap from Wattle Farm (behind The George) was seen recently on the road to Harwell. Despite having no lights, this is not illegal but is a safety hazard in poor light. Please take extra care when pulling out of Station Rd onto the A417.

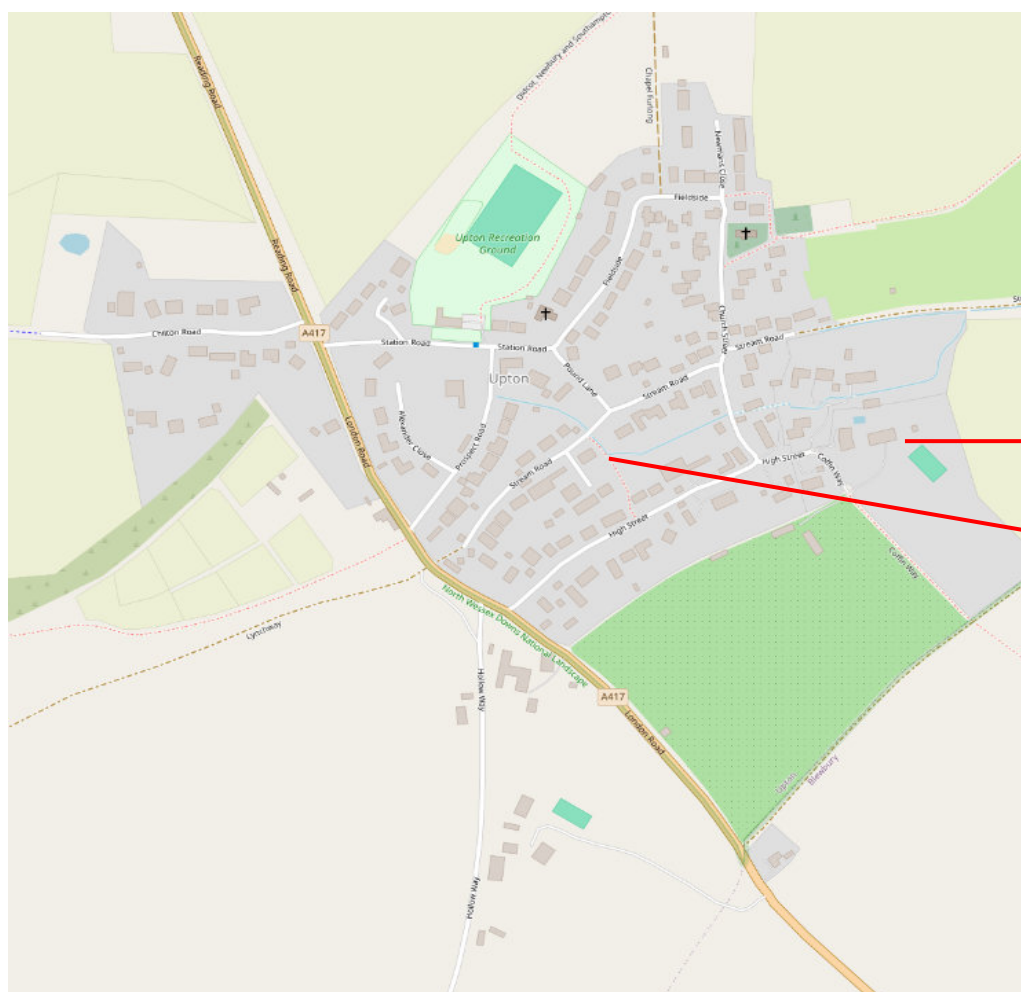

# News from afar

## Thames Valley Police Commissioner

Whilst many crimes are falling, such as burglary - down by a third since before the pandemic - sadly we are all more at risk online. We can all feel the benefits of living our lives in a more connected way, but with the convenience that technology brings, there are also risks: however, a huge amount of cybercrime and fraud is preventable. Scams can take place online, on the phone or in person. Here are some of the ways fraudsters may try and target you and the signs to spot to help you protect yourself:

**MAIL SCAMS** Common types of postal scams include fake lotteries and prize draws, offers of investments and inheritance windfalls. What to look out for: irresistible offers that are too good to be true; unfamiliar branding; not using your name; bad spelling and grammar.

**TELEPHONE SCAMS** Common telephone scams include investments, pension or computer support scams. The person calling often sounds professional and may pretend to be from a trusted organisation such as your bank, the police or a company you recognise. What to look out for: callers asking you to share

personal or financial information or a passcode or PIN; callers asking for remote access to your computer; callers trying to rush or pressure you into making decisions.

**DOORSTEP SCAMS** Criminals pose as legitimate business people selling goods or services that are faulty, overpriced, poor quality or non-existent. What to look out for: being asked for money upfront before providing any goods or service; No ID or proof of who they are; telling you they're doing work for neighbours to try and gain your trust.

**EMAIL, TEXT AND WEBSITE SCAMS** In what is known as Phishing, an email or text may appear to be from your bank or other company in order to trick you into revealing personal details. You may be asked to click on a link which takes you to a fake website where you will be prompted to enter your details. What to look out for: spelling or grammar mistakes in emails or texts; they may not use your name; an unusual email address which may be similar but doesn't match the company email; strong encouragement to click on a link.

Remember, anyone can be a scam victim.

If you spot a scam, always report it. You can also look out for other people who may be vulnerable to scams by joining [Friends Against Scams](#) to help raise awareness throughout your community. For more information about stopping online fraud please visit the [Stop! Think Fraud](#) website.
