

#### Father Jason writes ...

I wonder if you have plans for a Summer holiday?




Some years ago, I went on a short holiday with a group of friends to the island of Iona, a small island off the west coast of Scotland. We drove up to Oban, and then took the ferry over to Mull. We then crossed the island, and took a second ferry over the short stretch of water which separates Mull from Iona. We happened to take the car, but it is possible to get to and from Iona by public transport.

Iona is a small but beautiful island, with plenty to see. Back in 563, an Irish missionary, St. Columba, visited the island and established a monastery, which became one of the centres of Celtic Christianity. Missionaries were sent out from Iona to mainland Scotland and to the North of England. The abbey survived until the 16<sup>th</sup> Century. In the 1930s, an inspirational Scottish minister, Revd George MacLeod, had the vision of rebuilding the abbey buildings, and using the buildings as a base for a new type of Christian Community, which would seek to empower and inspire Christians to serve the needs of contemporary society. This community is known as the Iona Community, and it continues to flourish.

There are many places to stay on the island. My friends and I booked ahead and were able to stay in the abbey buildings, but there are other places to stay as well. Because the island is so well known, it attracts visitors from around the world, so it is best to book well in advance.

The island has been described as a "thin" place. What is meant by this phrase? It is meant to describe the sense of being in a holy place: many people who visit Iona feel that being on the island brings them close to God. It feels as if there is very little separating us from God – the boundary between earth and heaven feels very "thin" on this Scottish island. In short, it is a holy place.



I think it does us all a lot of good to spend some time in a holy place - a place where we feel that we might almost stretch out our hand and touch God. We don't have to go as far as Iona to find a holy place - there are holy places all around us. I do hope you will be able to spend some time in a holy place over the next month or so - a place where you can feel close to God, and can rest in God's love. It does us all a world of good.

### **Upton Parish Council**

Upton Parish Council held its most recent Parish Council Meeting on Wednesday 27<sup>th</sup> June 2025 at the Village Hall. A summary of the main points arising is given below

Upton needs one more parish councillor - could you help? We meet once a month and do our best to help keep Upton the lovely village it is to live in. It's very important that we have a full quota of councillors because if we do not, the parish council can be replaced by the district council who will not have a focus solely on Upton. Please help us have a full team and a strong village by volunteering to help. Contact the chair <a href="Francoise Yates">Francoise Yates</a> if you might be interested.

We also need volunteers to help raise money for playground maintenance. While RoSPA 's inspection of the playground was very positive, there is some rotten wood that will be expensive to replace. We would be really grateful if a group of villagers, with the time and interest, could help apply for grants to cover the upkeep of the playground.

In the unlikely event of a major emergency in Upton, perhaps flood or major storm, we would like to compile a list of villagers who are qualified, trained or retired, in any kind of medical/first aid discipline. Whether you are a doctor, nurse, or have had first aid training in your workplace we would be grateful if you could contact us so that we can organise an emergency first aid list and respond swiftly if ever needed.

We would like to say a huge "thank you" to the generous villager who has offered to use her considerable experience to produce and undertake the village survey. She will need some assistance with this so please contact us if you could help. We are very grateful and look forward to seeing the results of her hard work. Thank you!

Some villagers have asked if they could reinstate community speed watch. We are very grateful for this but they they need four additional volunteers to operate the scheme.

#### **Upton Wine Club**

Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> June was a special day in the Upton Wine Club calendar because it marked the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of our club. For the past 20 years we have averaged an overall annual membership of 50+ residents from our village and have sampled over 1,600 wines! Although many members keep coming because they have an interest in wine, either just enjoying it or looking to try something different or even wanting to learn a little more into what makes a quality wine, I believe that a key factor in the club's success is its social side.

During each monthly meeting, we always allow time between tasting wine for our members to catch up for a social and this Saturday we took that to the next level. Upon arrival, members enjoyed a cocktail, a Bellini made from mixing peach juice and prosecco. This is a great welcome drink for small or large parties. After some celebrations, where we thanked past chairmen Mike Collins and Will Betts and secretary, Fiona Betts for their support in setting up and its continual running over the years, we settled in to a wonderful BBQ. We enjoyed the food with two whites, a Coral-do-Mar Albarino from the Rias Baixas region, which had characteristics of stone fruit and a wonderful citrus flavour and a Buitenverwachting Buiten Blanc, a crisp, medium-bodied Sauvignon Blanc from South Africa. For the red we had a Codici-masserie Primitivo from Italy, a beautifully red berry/dark fruity, jammy wine which is great on its own but amazing with some food! We finished the evening with some amazing chocolate brownies and a dessert wine called Elysium black Muscat Quady. If you have not tried this and enjoy sweet wine, do try it: it's simply wonderful with any sweet dessert!

And what better way to finish the evening than a line dance! A first for the wine club but so popular it wouldn't surprise me if it didn't become a candidate for another Upton club! A massive thank you to all that came along and enjoyed the evening and to all those who made it such a fantastic celebration. The wine club is off now for the summer months but will be back again on 17<sup>th</sup> September 2025 for a new Season. #### Uptonogood? 2025

Thank you to all those that participated at this year's Uptonogood? Whether you rode or volunteered and helped in one (or more) of the many capacities required, the event could not happen without you, so thank you, Upton's thriving community, for your support.

We had some 550 riders on the day, cycling 5 different routes, looked after by 52 Marshals and 7 Sweepers. Once the riding was over, we had 3 fantastic bands, 1 DJ, 387 burgers flipped, 80 sissling sausages, and approximately 1000 pints of beer and cider consumed!

On the downside, we had a broken chain, broken derailleur, a nasty case of gravel rash, and a broken collar bone. Fortunately, they were all taken care of by Safe Hands and Mountain Mania, our first aid and mechanical support providers.

For once the sun shone throughout the day and although hot, it was not the "hottest day" forecast, with a third of the 648 litres of water purchased for the feed stations being returned unused.

We are please to say all our efforts have resulted in approximately £13.5K raised which will now be apportioned according to volunteer/marshal requests but with the majority staying right here in Upton to support the upkeep and improvement of the wonderful facilities we have. Full details will appear on our website in due course.

## Upton Neighbourhood Watch

As they say: "no news is good news" and nothing was noted in Upton this month.

To raise our profile within the village, we are hoping to install some signs and to have a presence at the Village Fete on 6<sup>th</sup> September.

The latest edition of Which? ScamAlerts highlighted fraudulent QR codes, known as quishing scams. QR codes are two-dimensional patterns of small black and white squares that can be created by anyone. While many are harmless, some act as gateways into a scammer's trap.

Fake codes are most commonly found in car parks as sneaky stickers placed on payment machines, according to Action Fraud, the national fraud and cyber crime reporting centre. Scam QR codes have also been found on online shopping platforms, with sellers receiving dodgy QR codes via email to verify their accounts or to receive payments for sold items. Some reports revealed scams impersonating HMRC and other UK government bodies. Action Fraud issued a warning after revealing that £3.5m was lost to reported QR code scams in 2024.

Before scanning a QR code, you should:

- look for tampering does the QR code look like it has been stuck over something? If you're not sure, enter the website address manually and avoid scanning the code;
- preview the website address before following it.
   When you scan a QR code, you should see the
   address pop up before you're redirected to it.
   Check the address to make sure it corresponds
   to the address you were expecting;
- avoid scanning QR codes in public places, such as car parks. Look for alternative ways to carry out the task. If it's a car park, there should be information about other ways to pay;
- try to avoid using a QR code to make a payment;

- avoid QR code scanning apps, as they can increase the risk of downloading malware or being redirected to a misleading advert. Most mobile devices have QR code readers within the phone's camera, so use that to scan QR codes instead.
- avoid scanning QR codes in emails, as these could be used by scammers to disguise phishing links.

If you lose any money to a scam, call your bank immediately using the number on the back of your bank card and report it to Action Fraud.

#### Blewbury School Report

The staff, pupils, and community of Blewbury Church of England Primary School are celebrating a glowing report following a recent SIAMS (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools) inspection. The report praises the school for living out its Christian vision and creating an environment where both pupils and staff flourish.

At the heart of the school's success is a clear and deeply embedded Christian ethos based on the parable of the sower. The values of love, courage, forgiveness, and resilience guide every decision, nurturing a warm, inclusive culture where all members of the community are respected, supported, and encouraged to grow.

Inspectors highlighted the school's "culture of respect and care," the strength of its partnerships with the church, local community, and the Oxford Diocesan Schools Trust, and its commitment to helping every child succeed—academically, socially, and spiritually. Pupils were commended for their thoughtfulness, empathy, and environmental awareness, with inspectors noting how children are becoming "thoughtful and proactive advocates for positive change."

Collective worship, pupil voice, strong relationships, and inclusive classroom practices were all recognised as central to the school's success. The curriculum was praised for encouraging deep thinking and spiritual reflection, with Religious Education described as well-resourced and improving rapidly.

#### **VoWHDC News**

Hello from Hayleigh and Debra



6<sup>th</sup> June was the anniversary of D Day, and on Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> June we attended the ceremony at the Harwell Stone to lay a wreath on behalf of VoWHDC to honour the memory of those brave men that took off from the Harwell site 81 years ago to take part in the Normandy landings. It is always an honour to take part in such an event. Thankfully the weather held off just long enough. It was also very nice to see the new memorial sculpture inspired by the Horsa Gliders, to honour the 6<sup>th</sup> Airborne Division, the No. 38 Group RAF, and the Glider Pilot Regiment.

In the first week of June, the Joint Local Plan for South and Vale was undergoing examination by the planning inspectorate at the Bee House in Milton Park and the sessions were live-streamed. The next steps are for the Inspectorate to consider what they have heard and seen and then make their decision whether to proceed to the next stage of the examination.

Local Government Reorganisation is still in discussion amongst Local Authorities as we begin to gather evidence for our submission to the Government; the deadline is November. The councils have opened a consultation with the public here.

July 2025

On 14<sup>th</sup> May, Vale of White Horse had its Annual meeting. A new chair and vice chair were elected – Cllrs Oliver Forder and Jill Rayner respectively. The leader, Cllr Bethia Thomas also announced changes to the cabinet. Cllr Hayleigh Gascoigne is the new cabinet member for Environmental Services, Climate Action and Nature Recovery, having previously been Chair of the Climate Emergency Advisory Committee.


Several residents have asked about the new stickers for garden waste brown bins. The Vale of White Horse District Council introduced a new garden waste subscription on 1st April 2025, changing the way that you pay for your garden waste collection. It will make it easier for you to keep control of your payments – for example, if your bank details change. You now require a permit sticker on your bin, which will be sent to you when you pay. This identifies to the waste crews that you have paid for that year, and they can empty your bin. The colour of the sticker will relate to the year that you have paid for, so will change each year (it's yellow this year). If have any queries please see here or get in touch with us.

#### Olly Glover (MP)



July marks one year since being elected as the MP for our constituency. Learning how parliament operates, establishing a constituency office and recruiting a team took some time, but I can now reflect on our work over the last 12 months.

Since the election, my team and I have opened over 7,000 cases and responded to 12,500 emails to constituents. Some involve directing local people to the services they need, but others are more complex and take time to work through. Cases cover many topics, from health and care, to immigration and international trade.

Alongside helping constituents on a personal level, I have been able to use cases and local issues to inform efforts to drive national policy changes. I've been asking questions of Ministers in the House of Commons, speaking in Westminster Hall debates, securing one-to-one meetings with Ministers and taking part in cross party groups: the Transport Select Committee, and the Planning and Infrastructure Bill Committee. These are just some of the ways I have been able to voice your issues to the people with power to influence them. Recent successes include getting a decision on an export licence for local business which saved several jobs.

There has been some progress, too, on the big issues affecting our constituency: I secured a meeting with the rail minister to make the case for Grove Station; the County Council has started work on a feasibility study. I have presented a bill to ensure infrastructure targets accompany housing targets, which the Housing Minister has taken an interest in. Finally, after being rescheduled and delayed by the minister's office, I have secured a meeting with the Water Minister

about the SESRO reservoir to make her aware of all local concerns. Of course, on all these and many other local issues, there is more work to do.

Recently, I have had the pleasure of visiting the Cornermen project, based in South Moreton, doing fantastic work to support men's mental health; discussed ideas to get people taking action to reduce their carbon footprint with trustees of local charity myzerocarbon.org at a recent constituency surgery in Wallingford and attended the South East RFCA Armed Forces Briefing at RAF Benson to learn about the relationships between defence and the wider community, and the critical role in our communities and our future defence played by cadet and reservist schemes.

During the summer, I will be undertaking many visits and holding regular surgeries around the constituency. June was a busy month and I've been getting to grips with Parish Council meetings, a lot of council training, and councillor enquiries. The first full council was held on 20<sup>th</sup> May, at which committee places were confirmed. I will be sitting on the People Overview and Scrutiny Committee.

We will be looking at all services provided to and for adults in potential need of social care or safeguarding, and holding the council to account on providing the best care possible for this vulnerable group of people. It also includes some public health matters (if not covered by the Joint Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee).

At the council meeting, we also gave tribute to and signed a book of condolence for the two firefighters and member of the public who gave their lives at Bicester Motion last month.

## Thames Valley Police Commissioner

Fly-tipping is more than an unsightly mess, it can be big business for criminals.

From rogue traders claiming to be properly licensed, to large scale Matthew Barber

organised criminal gangs who will use threats and intimidation to illegally dump hundreds of tonnes of waste, the impact on victims and the environment can be huge.

In the last year alone there were more than 100,000 incidents of fly-tipping across the South East and it is estimated that the cost to the economy in England is nearly a billion pounds.

Responsibility for waste dumping falls across several agencies. Local authorities are responsible for investigating, clearing and taking appropriate enforcement action in relation to small scale flytipping on public land. The Environment Agency is responsible for dealing with large-scale fly-tipping (more than a lorry load), hazardous waste and flytipping by organised gangs. Too often responsibility can be passed from one organisation to another.

So I have joined forces with Police & Crime Commissioners in Hampshire, Surrey, Sussex and Kent in an attempt to get police forces, specialist police units, the Environment Agency and councils to work together to tackle the problem. We held our first meeting in Kent in early June.

Many people don't realise that often criminals who are involved in waste crime will also be responsible for vehicle thefts, money laundering, drug trafficking and a wide range of other offences.

Victims are often hit twice. Not only will rural and industrial businesses be affected by having waste dumped illegally on their land or in their buildings, but they often have to pay for the cost of the clean up - or face stiff fines themselves! This needs to change, and I will be working to put pressure on the government to protect victims.

Thames Valley Police's Rural Crime Task Force have had some successes in tackling organised waste gangs by working with councils and the Environment Agency, but there is more to be done.

We can all play our part. If you discover fly tipping (large or small) please report it to Vale of White Horse District Council. They can investigate offenders. If you see someone in the act of illegally dumping waste, call 999 - it's a crime in progress!

If you pay someone who is unlicensed to take away your waste, you could be fined £600 if they dump your waste! So it's always worth checking the Environment Agency's website to see if someone is registered.
