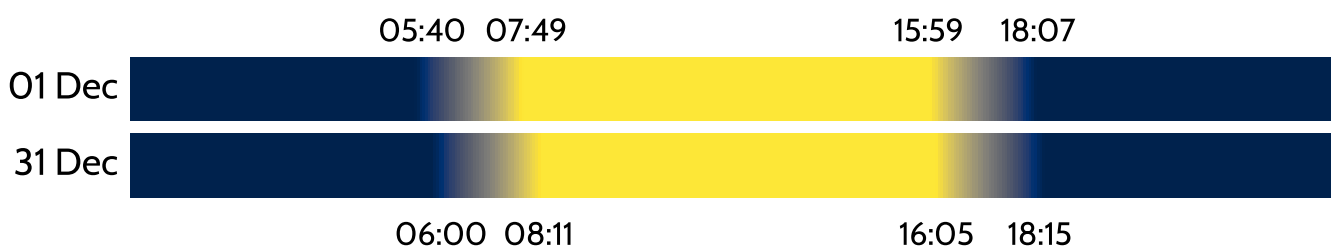

# Upton Parish Council

An Extraordinary Meeting of the Parish Council was held on Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> December 2025. The main item on the agenda was the resolution to seek the approval of the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities to apply for borrowing of up to £103,202 for the Chapel Furlong land acquisition, comprising:

- an interest-free private loan of up to £90,000 over a borrowing term of 10 years; and
- commercial borrowing from PWLB or alternative sources of up to £13,202 over a borrowing term of 15 years (only to be drawn if necessary).

The annual loan repayments will be £9,000 for the interest-free loan, and ca. £1,324 for the commercial borrowing (if fully drawn), giving a total of ca. £10,324. This will be financed by an increase of £10,350 in the council tax precept; this is the equivalent of an additional £45 per annum for Band D properties, representing an increase of approximately 38%.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on **Wednesday 28<sup>th</sup> January 2026** at 7:00 pm in the Village Hall. It was an absolute delight to see 40 or so members from our village come and join in the Christmas celebrations this December at the Upton Wine Club. Hosted at the village hall, we stepped up the razzle and put on an amazing Christmas evening!

Upon arrival we were welcomed with a white port and tonic cocktail, along with a twist of orange, some mint and plenty of ice. If you are looking for something a little lighter in alcohol then a standard G&T to kick start your Christmas morning then give this a go!

The main event was some amazing pate starters, followed by a platter of meats, potatoes and salads! Dessert has become a bit of a tradition now, with the famous (but not so secret recipe) Sticky Toffee Pudding – washed down with some Pedro Ximenez Sherry – Christmas in a glass! It didn't stop there, as there were some amazing home made chocolates, mince pies and special raffle prizes - all for just £20 per head – not bad!

The celebration was great but it was also a wonderful reminder of just how special our village really is. It was genuinely lovely to see so many people and remind ourselves that it's not always just about the wine (in fact it is often very rarely just about the wine), even more important was the kick-start to Christmas .... and it could not have gone better! A huge thank you to everyone who came along and joined in the celebrations and a very special thank you to the wine club committee for making it all possible!

In January, we are looking at the influence of music on wine ..... yes that really is a thing! We will be listening to some specific music and seeing if you really can pair wine with a song! ## Upton Full Fibre

You may recall that in last month's Upton News, we published a short email exchange between Brian Rippon and Olly Glover MP about the poor broadband speeds currently available in Upton. There was a follow-up Zoom call with Craig Bower (OCC Digital Infrastructure Programme Director) in early December, which a few of us joined. Craig was sympathetic about our wish to improve broadband speeds in Upton but told us that the two most recent programmes (one by Airband to improve broadband speeds in rural businesses and Gigaclear's Project Gigabit) were now closed. However, it appears that the government department responsible for broadband – Building Digital UK (BDUK) - have advised that some communities in Oxfordshire could be selected in early 2026 for the Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme.

In short, this is a way of using public funding to support the extension of an operator's network; for example, to all/most premises in Upton. We understand that there will be a competition to select the best community bids. This may be similar to the "Reach For Infinity" scheme run by BT in 2010. Upton bid successfully in that competition, which resulted in the installation of the current broadband connection; our community had a 100% signup.

If our application for the new Gigabit scheme were successful, we would have access to full fibre connections, with download speeds of 100-900 Mbps compared to 30-80 Mbps available currently. The monthly broadband cost would likely increase by £5-10 per month for a 300 Mbps Full Fibre connection, which would have a connection speed around 10 times faster than the one we currently have in Upton. We're not getting too excited just yet but thought it was worth giving Upton residents an early "heads up".

We are aiming to find out very soon exactly what we will need to do to submit a formal bid.

There are two competition themes based on an overall theme of "Winter":

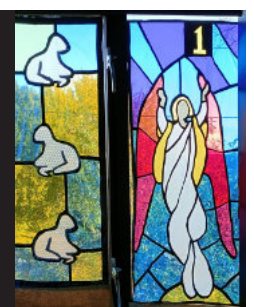
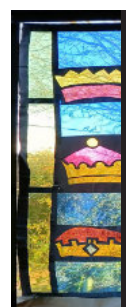
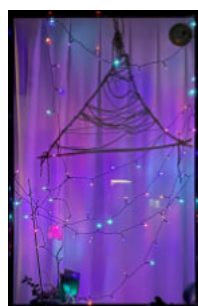
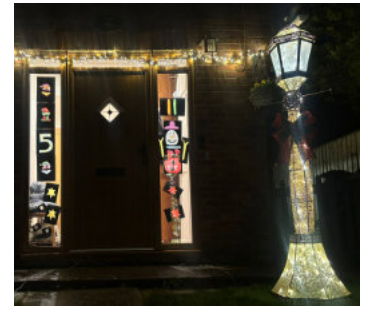
1. Upton and Surrounding Area (in winter)

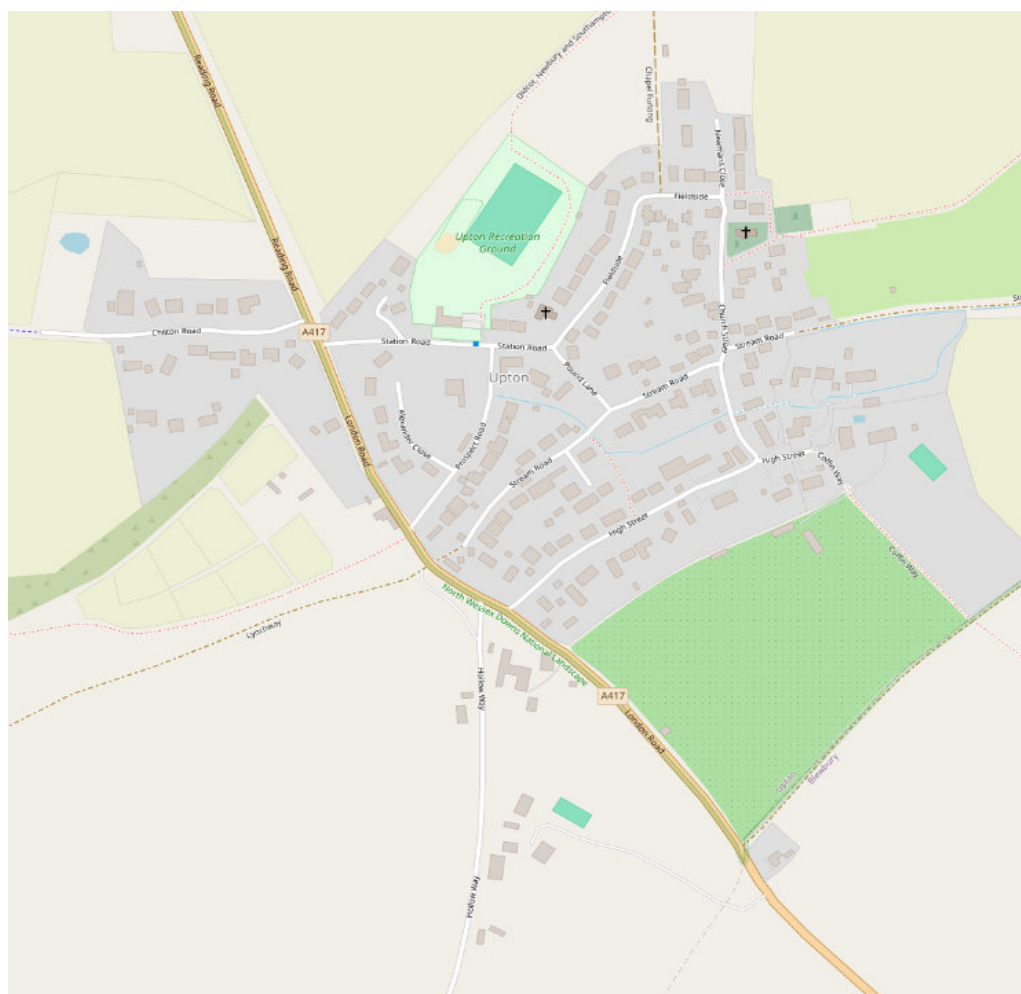

## Olly Glover (MP)



This past month has involved lots of visits throughout the constituency, where I have spoken with many constituents in surgeries and on visits. I was delighted to visit Didcot Railway Centre, where I had the pleasure of meeting Chief Executive Clive Hetherington to learn more about the incredible work taking place there. I attended an event at Grove Business Park around its expansion plans, celebrating progress on the new Sigma building, and even enjoyed a fantastic evening at the Letcombe Tennis Club fundraiser, which had a brilliant 007 theme! It was also great to meet Ian, Dave and Robin from the Earth Trust who showed me around the beautiful Wittenham Clumps, and shared their passion behind everything they do. I've also had the chance to visit several schools, including Fir Tree Junior School in Wallingford, where I faced a wide range of thoughtful questions from the School Council and the brilliant Year 5s, and King Alfred's School, where it was a pleasure to meet staff and students.

With the consultation on Thames Water's reservoir drawing to a close, I have been meeting with concerned local residents to hear their views. A parliamentary debate on Thames Water has been secured, where I will endeavour to speak on this and represent my constituent's concerns. Looking at progress on Great Western Park's promised GP surgery, I received a response from the Health Secretary, after asking him to investigate the delays via a House of Commons question. The Health Secretary confirmed that the local Integrated Care Board is responsible for the stalled progress and is seeking a new developer. I will continue to push on this in the coming months.

Recent highlights in Parliament have included taking part in an e-petition debate on Parkinson's, where I spoke about two constituents who have been in touch with me about their experiences. I also sponsored the Oxfordshire Innovation Showcase, which was a fantastic opportunity to meet and celebrate a number of brilliant local businesses. I also pressed the Government on the lack of support for small breweries and other small businesses following changes to beer duty, and challenged the Secretary of State on the poor affordability of rail travel. I highlighted that an annual season ticket from Didcot to the London Travelcard area now costs £7,780 - representing a terrible value for money for my constituents. I also raised concerns that passenger services have still not begun on the new railway between Oxford, Bicester and Milton Keynes, despite the line being open for over a year and already running freight and charter trains. In committee, I questioned the Secretary of State for Transport on how the Government is ensuring the efficient delivery of infrastructure, including public transport services, and how it is encouraging active travel.

# Thames Valley Police Commissioner

I wrote about fly-tipping some months ago so I will not repeat everything here. Nevertheless the recent discovery of the colossal (and illegal) waste dump at Kidlington has brought the issue to the fore again.

We know that in this case the Environment Agency has been far too slow to act. They only took action months after it was reported to them and only really when there was national media interest. Although the Environment Agency is the body responsible, Thames Valley Police has assisted with making one arrest (so far) in the case.

This is at the extreme end of the scale of course, but I have raised the concern that changes to our own local recycling centre by Oxfordshire County Council significantly increase the risk of fly-tipping. **From 14<sup>th</sup> January 2026 you will have to book in advance to use the tip, as well as new charges and restrictions being imposed.**

This is not just an inconvenience for residents but risks pushing people into the arms of illegal waste carriers. Remember fly-tipping is a crime and if you pay an unlicensed waste carrier who goes in to dump your waste, you could be held liable! You can check whether your waste carrier is registered using this [link](#).

On an entirely different subject, many of our local pubs are really feeling the pressure right now. Behind the headlines of the budget there are real family businesses. Most acute at the moment is the change in business rates but this comes on top of the pressures of additional duty, National Insurance, minimum wage and VAT.

One publican I spoke to is seeing an increase in their rateable value of £22,400. Another local business is seeing their rateable value nearly double, from £62,500 to £120,000 overnight!

Pubs are a vital part of our community. If they close, many may never reopen. Add your voice to our campaign [here](#) and make sure you get out and support your local pub!
